
## AHOY MSA MEMBERS, FRIENDS, AND FAMILY,

MSA Membership Meeting – Our next Membership Meeting is 2/12/25 at 5PM at the Modern Chop 1830 59<sup>th</sup> St W Bradenton, FL 34209 We will have a quarterly membership meeting with updates from our officers, committee chairs and a DRAFT calendar for the year. The highlight for the evening will be a slide show by Gail and Chuck on their bucket list trip from Patagonia to Cape Horn. They have promised to return from India in time. Tom has a DWBH set for March 12 at RJ Gators and we will have more details on the Calendar. On March 8<sup>th</sup>, MSA will set up a table for members to sell items at Cortez nautical flea market, located behind the Florida Maritime Museum in Cortez. Contact Jim McGinnis if you have items to sell or could take a 3 hour shift at our table.

My sea story for this month relates to the first time I chartered a sailboat. It was June of 1990. We had a group of friends at work at Corning in Wilmington, NC who liked to talk about the idea of an offshore sail. Eventually, we figured out who was

really interested and put together a crew list. One guy had been a delivery captain and was an experienced sailor and could play a guitar. So he was in. I had sailed several different types of small sloops but nothing over 20 ft. But I had recently completed the ASA 101-103 Bareboat Chartering courses. I made some phone calls and figured out where a decent boat was located. In Oriental. NC there is a small marina on the Neuse River which flows into Pamlico Sound, A




Oriental to Shaklefords Bank and the Bight

sailor was renting out his 1978 Morgan Out Island 30 "Saba Spice" for weekend Charters. (This boat is a smaller version of the classic 41 ft Morgan Center Cockpit that for years was the go-to charter boat in the Caribbean islands.) He recommended a trip from Oriental down the Intracoastal Waterway ("the ditch"" to Beaufort, NC and Morehead City. (BO-Fort" which is not to be confused with Beaufort, SC "Bew-Fort") We decided to go a little further to Cape Lookout and Lookout Bight. The Bight is located midway between Cape Fear to the south and Cape Hatteras 65 nm north. We drove up to Oriental on Friday night after work and the crew stayed the night in the boat in the slip. Motoring down the ICW was uneventful. The Ditch – the ICW is 20 nm from Oriental, NC to the Atlantic Ocean. We tracked our course on a paper chart and watched the channel markers carefully to make sure we stayed in the dredged portion. We headed east and anchored off Shacklefords Bank. After

> lunch, we headed into the beach to go swimming and surfing. We were immediately greeted wild horses that live on the island. They looked at us with an inquisitive stare. That was awkward. We headed back to the boat when we noticed a dark cloud heading our way. We decided to sail to Lookout Bight to get out of the weather. Pretty soon the wind was building and we could see the dark squall rain heading towards us. We dropped the sails and started motoring as fast as possible. In minutes, the wind was driving huge raindrops that blasted the

boat and were stinging us. Visibility was dropping as we entered the Bight and set the anchor in good sand and 30 ft of water. We sat out the storm and saw that there were about 10 boats in the Bight that were in a similar condition. It's 5 o'clock somewhere. That evening we cooked steaks on the grill and could see the Cape Hatteras and Cape Lookout Lighthouses winking. Inside Lookout Bight there is a nasty shoal. The depth on the chart goes from 26 ft to 3 ft in less than 25 meters. The area is aptly named Wreck Point and features a couple of wrecks noted on the chart. From where we were anchored, we could see a 40 ft house boat that had blown on to the shoal. I never heard if their anchor dragged, or they just hit the shallows that afternoon in all the

excitement. We took the dinghy to see what was going on and met a few people that were trying to help out. But the tide was still dropping at 4 PM and it was decided that by midnight everyone in the

Bight would come over just before high tide and see if we could push it off. Not sure if it was the tide, a favorable wind or the liberal application of alcohol on the happy crew but one way or the other it was soon floating again. A beach party ensued. The next morning we sailed offshore a bit and then headed back to Oriental. We returned the boat in by the end of the day. In 48 hours

we learned to sail that boat pretty well. We also got a few lessons in keeping an eye on the weather, planning the next safe anchorage and anchoring in a crowded bay. We were hooked.

around. But as we walked toward the beach and stood in front of the 1951 vintage Thunderbird Hotel, the damage and destruction was monumental. We wondered if the building could actually be saved. There were a few nearby hotels with

signs that read "open" but everything looked broken and bent. Even the access to the beach was restricted due to debris still scattered around. But as we looked up to the sky, kites were soaring proudly and there were lots of them. There were people sitting on the beach enjoying a day of slightly warmer temperatures. I talked without a formal festival, it was still fun!

But it was on the walk back to the car that I finally put 2 and 2 together. The actual infrastructure of Treasure Island is in a rather precarious state at present. None

of the metered parking lots were in working order and most of the government buildings like the city hall were




washed away or abandoned. I heard a rumor that plans were in the works for sometime in March as a new date of the Treasure Island Kite Festival. I'll keep a vigil but I think it will take a long time to get this beach town back in business. The most surprising thing was that the beach looked perfect! Oh well, I'll keep my fingers crossed! Behind the Curtain of the Van Wezel Theater From the Art to the Stage Monday February 24<sup>th</sup> at 11 A.M.

Some have you have seen the artworks displayed on the walls of the Van Wezel Performing Arts Hall on the way to your seats to enjoy a great show. Maybe you

even stopped to admire a painting. You may not have known these paintings and sculptures were created by noted Florida artists and are on loan from Arts Advocates, the Sarasota-based organization whose mission is to connect the community to the arts. Art Advocate is a membership organization dedicated to inspiring creativity and advancing education. Arts

Advocates has the foremost collection of works by Sarasota Art Colony artists on public view. The entire collection contains more than 60 pieces representing a wide range of media and styles dating from the 1930s to the present. Selections of the Arts Advocates collection are on display at the Van Wezel Performing Arts Hall, and at the Arts Advocate Gallery inside the Crossings at Siesta Key Mall.

A docent will take you on a tour of the paintings and sculptures at the Van Wezel Theater including those by Robert Chase, William Hartman, Eugene White, Ben Stahl, Julio de Diego, Thornton Utz, Frank Colson, and Dean Mitchell, to name just a few. Then after the art experience you will step onto the stage where a Van Wezel guide will give you a peek behind the curtain to learn about the many hands that create thrilling shows for your enjoyment. You will see the ropes and pulleys that "fly" the scenery on and off the stage, the movable orchestra pit, dressing room, and loading dock where traveling shows back up their 18-wheelers to move their shows onto the stage. All the while you'll be dazzled by stories and anecdotes around



the colorful world of show business!

Please join me for this private, docent led 1 hour and 30 minute tour of the special art pieces located in the Van Wezel Theater and a backstage look at how the theater operates when the big shows are in town. The price of a ticket is \$15 per person (with a minimum of 12) and the proceeds benefit the Van Wezel's Education/Outreach programs, Community Engagement and the Arts Advocates. As always we plan to have a fabulous lunch (TBA) near the Van Wezel in Sarasota after the tour at about 1 P.M. Please email me at gailgordon56@gmail.com with your

Weekend in Mt. Dora for the Antique Boat Show Friday March 21<sup>st</sup> to Sunday March 23rd


"The Sunnyland Antique Boat Festival is in its 44th year and is the largest classic wood boat show in the U.S. With over 250 boats. The nautical flea market has more than 80 vendors with many hard to find marine parts for sale.

The Sunnyland Chapter is the largest chapter in the Antique and Classic Boat Society (ACBS) and represents the entire state of Florida. The show started in Sanford, moved to Mount Dora and for the past 14 years the show has been in Tavares."

Folks, the dates for this wonderful MSA field trip are March 21<sup>st</sup>, 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. As driving up and back home in a day would be undesirable, an overnight stay of at least one or preferable two nights in the

Tavares/Mt. Dora area would promise to make this event a delightful adventure. But it is imperative to make reservations NOW in order to find a reasonable hotel in the area. Most allow free cancellation close to the

booking date so check that before confirming your reservation. Remember, this is prime season for snow birds, Spring Break time and there will be an influx of 80 vendors looking for a place to stay as well. There is a gorgeous historic resort directly on Lake Dora that I originally had my eye



on called the Lakeside Inn. But instead I booked a cottage walking distance to the Mt. Dora town center so we could use it as a gathering place for a Happy Hour or a cook-out for the group.

The boat show will be located in Wooten Park 123 South Joanne Ave in Tavares. During the weekend I will try to organize meeting points for getting together at local

restaurants and offer a few group activities other than the boat show.
