



My sea story for this month describes a friend's experience in a unique marina on the east coast of Florida. Indiantown Marina is a protected hurricane hidey hole and a great spot to work on your boat. It's a jumping off point for heading to the Berry Islands and the Bahamas. Many sailors come to Stuart and the Jenson Beach area but our good friends picked Indiantown after looking at the options.

This marina is on the St Lucie Canal heading to the St Lucie Lock on Lake Okeechobee. We visited our friends Jeff and Claudia on their Nauticat 30. It's a beautiful 1975 pilothouse ketch with teak decks. At 7150lbs, ~ 40ft Air draft and 4.5ft draft, it is relatively Intracoastal Waterway friendly.

Jeff and Claudia also have 2 large dogs (English Setters). Lynne and I stayed at the Seminole Inn nearby. It's a historic hotel built in the early 1900's to take advantage of the new railroad station nearby. Socialites stopped there on their way to Miami. Wallace Simpson's uncle owned it. She invited the Vanderbilt's and other US royalty to visit. Yes, she's the one that married a prince and caused him to abdicate the British Crown in the 1930's. The hotel is historic but maybe not worth a visit today unless you are in the area.



The Indiantown marina office crew was terrific and encouraged cruisers to have packages and mail forwarded there for what appeared to be any amount of time. There was a pile of boxes and Amazon shipments that Jeff sorted through to find their engine parts, medicines and care packages from relatives. The marina has a large travel lift, plenty of parking and nice picnic area with a pool. Jeff had made good friends with a number of sailors in the marina working as a team on

Jeff had invited us to go for a day sail on Lake Okeechobee so we headed down the canal towards the lake. The bridge is only 48ft high so that's a limit for many coming through but not for us. Years ago, an enterprising guy set up a business using water barrels to tip sailboats over to fit under the bridge. Alas, he is not there anymore. (Probably a law against it now.) We went through the lock with about 25

jet skiers that were headed for a beach spot. That was noisy! We powered out of the lock and sailed the boat out into the lake. Depth varies from 10 to 13 feet in the channel across the lake. Lake Okeechobee is like the biggest pond you ever saw. There was fairly light air that day and the boat was crabbing sideways almost as much as going forward. The wind soon freshened and she began to track pretty well in just more than 8 knots. In early afternoon, we headed back through the lock and returned to the marina. At about dusk, Claudia started charging around the boat closing all the

screens. Mosquitos were soon thick in the air outside and she was looking for any holes that that might be letting them in. So beware. We had a terrific dinner on the boat and really enjoyed the day. When it was time to leave we said our goodbyes and ran down the dock ahead of the mosquitos and back to the Seminole Inn.



Important Information about a Future MSA Field Trip Weekend An MSA Weekend Field Trip to Tavares in the Mt. Dora area for the Antique Boat Show!

"The Sunnyland Antique Boat Festival is in its 44th year and is the largest classic wood boat show in the U.S. Our footprint is over a third of a mile long and we usually have 250 to 300 boats on display. Our gate attracts 8 to 10 thousand people and there is literally something for everyone at our event. Our nautical flea market has more than 80 vendors with many hard to find marine parts for sale. We will have several stunning outboard motors on display as well as numerous race boats. Our annual event is in conjunction with spring break as is the kick-off show for the boating season. People from all over the U.S. attend our show and we have representation from over 26 different states. We have several corporate sponsors that make our show a success and they offer many marine products to include new and restored vintage boats. The Sunnyland Chapter is the largest chapter in the Antique and Classic Boat Society (ACBS) and represents the entire state of Florida. Our show is run with all volunteer help. This is our 44th anniversary show and each year our show gets bigger and better. The



show started in Sanford, moved to Mount Dora and for the past 14 years the show has been in Tavares."

Folks, the dates for this wonderful MSA field trip are March 21st, 22nd and 23rd. As driving up and back home in a day would be undesirable, an overnight stay of at least one or preferable two nights in the Tavares/Mt. Dora area would promise to

make this event a delightful adventure. But it is imperative to make reservations NOW in order to find a reasonable hotel in the area. Most allow free cancellation close to the booking date so check that

before confirming your reservation.
Remember, this is prime season for snow birds, Spring Break time and there will be an influx of 80 vendors looking for a place to stay as well.
There is a gorgeous historic resort



MSA'S VICTORIAN CHRISTMAS STROLL AT THE PLANT MUSEUM DECEMBER 2ND

About 20 years ago I happened upon the Christmas tradition of a Holiday decorative version of the Plant Museum. I had been in Tampa on another mission and we noticed a festival in progress beneath the famous onion shaped turrets of the University of Tampa. I don't remember much about that experience so I was excited when I recently scheduled an MSA tour during the month of December.



I was not surprised when I had just a few participants that were willing to make the hour long drive to downtown Tampa let alone manage the street parking in the congested area. But I was happy to have 8

MSA members join me on what turned out to be a delightful day. We met in the lobby of the Plant Museum at about 11 A.M. and were welcomed by a volunteer, one of 500, who explained the course of action for our self guided tour. This was the actual museum area of the historic Tampa Bay Hotel built by Henry Plant in 1891 to the outrageous cost of \$2.5 million. The rest of the extensive complex is now the campus of the University of Tampa. We could see beyond the glass doors where students were collecting for classes.

The first order of business was to take a seat in one of the decorated hotel rooms and watch a film about the construction

and operations of this exclusive resort that featured electricity, air conditioning and heat and telephones in every room. That gave us a taste of the elegance that we were about to see as we wandered from



room to gorgeous room set up as it had been in 1891. The Christmas Trees in the video room were decorated with railroad memorabilia as homage to Henry Plants illustrious career.

Each of us found different items that interested us so we split up and explored on our own. The decorative theme of each room was inspired by 19th and 20th century practices, trends and traditions. Some of the Christmas trees in each room were decorated in authentic Victorian fashion with antique ornaments and other

ideas with 21st
century style.
The old hotel
was designed
in the style of a
Moorish Palace
and the exotic
architecture
accented each
and every
room. We
were privy to



experience the elegance of one of the recreated guest bedrooms located under one of the hotels signature turrets. We did not have access to the second floor as these rooms were now classrooms but



having a view of the gorgeous staircase was enough to recreate how guests must have felt in the opulent environment.

I will mention a few of the things that turned my head as we walked through

the historic halls. I was stunned with the antique typewriter in the library. My family has inherited an antique sterling silver typewriter from the 20's but this one particular piece on display was much older and far more interesting. Then in the sports room, there was a case that held a baseball signed by Babe Ruth. As I read the inscription, the first athletic venue in Tampa was right here at Plant Baseball



Field on the grounds of the hotel. Ruth hit a home run in this field that may have been the longest run of his career at an astonishing 587 feet, setting a record for a Spring Training Game! Who would have thought? The last item I'll

mention that was of special interest to me was in the last room on our tour. This piece of furniture was a monster! It was huge! It had to be! It was called an "orchestrion". Plant so loved this piece

that he put one in his home. Imported from Germany, the automatic musical instrument's ornately carved cabinet housed a masterpiece of modern engineering. Compressed air operated organ pipes, a bass drum



with cymbals, a snare drum and a triangle to replicate the sounds of a band or orchestra. We listened to a recording of how it sounded and apparently the museum sometimes offered live concerts on occasion. After we toured the exceptional Holiday expo we met on the veranda for warm cider and cookies.

We did not have far to go for our lunch opportunity in the form of another historic facility. The Oxford Exchange, built at the same time of the Tampa Bay Hotel, was just across the street. Originally this structure housed



several retail stores and businesses until 1920 when it was abandoned. Thankfully restored to a grander scale, we found this meeting place to be well attended and gorgeously furnished. We entered the Exchange to a boutique gift shop brimming



with wonderful items for purchase. To the left was a Champagne Bar where quests could choose their favorite bubbly. In the middle of that was a solarium room for an outside venue in dinning. There was an elegant coffee bar next to an Old World

library where one could read or even work in this peaceful splendor. At the far end was a book store that was touted as one of the world's best. And if that wasn't enough there was another bar that I mistook as a wine tasting bar but no! It was a place where one could design their own individual scented candles. Yes, indeed there was a restaurant and we did have a wonderful and unusual lunch there. It was very busy and I'm afraid noisy but we managed to communicate anyway. I must say that we enjoyed our Holiday experience today and felt the Christmas Spirit more intensely as a result. All our senses were involved in the journey. Thank you for joining me on this step back in time and Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all!
