SAIL AWAY TO MARVISTA AND HARTS LANDING







AHOY MSA MEMBERS, FRIENDS, AND FAMILY,

This month's sailing story – Sail to Boca Grande

"Dolphins off the port bow!" We went sailing in February 2022 on a 40 ft Fountaine Pajot Catamaran chartered from Burnt Store Marina in South West Florida. This awesome marina boasts 525 wet slips & 300 dry slips, along with 27 holes of golf, the athletic club, tennis courts, pools, plus the excellent dining at Cass Cay Restaurant, Linkside Cafe, and the Ship's Store, "The Trading Post",) and belies its history as a spot of devastation.

The story goes that in 1839 the Seminole Indians were being pushed from their land. So one dark night, as the legend goes, an Indian Chief known as Billy Bowlegs, and his little band stormed the Trading Post and set it on fire. Some of the surveyors spotted the Indians on the run and fired at them, killing some. Several settlers lost their lives in the fire." Thus, the name "Burnt Store".

This area is just north of Fort Myers on the edges of Charlotte Harbor. It is a terrific

spot for a sailing charter since the opportunities for adventure are great, sailing is unlimited and it's all located in protected huge Charlotte Harbor where you can be sailing just minutes from the marina.



In the early 1500s, the explorer Juan Ponce De Leon is believed to be the first European to visit this harbor. Today,

Sanibel, Captiva and Cayo Costa are a fabulous chain of islands to the south of Charlotte Harbour. Gasparilla Island is to the west and has been made famous by the exploits of the notorious Spanish pirate Jose Gasparilla. (1756 – 1821 reportedly)

Heading out of Burnt Store having just topped off diesel fuel and freshwater tanks, we encountered a light chop and winds out of the South East. We were able to set the main and jib sails and set a nearly beam reach course direct to Cabbage Key. After a few hours we reached Cayo Costa and

entered the Intracoastal waterway. Hailing the harbor master on the VHF we told him

we had a reservation for a slip for the night. He directed us to the northern point on the west most dock where we tied up for the night. Dinner reservations at the Cabbage Key Inn probably weren't needed but we were

welcomed to the Captain's Table at the Inn and had a delightful dinner of catch of the day - Triple Tail. The owner regaled us with the history of the inn and some stories of famous visitors. The bar is known for having > \$80,000 dollars stapled or tacked to the ceiling from visitors.


A day later the weather cleared, and we headed out into the Gulf of Mexico in a north wind. We got the catamaran up to 10 knots with full sails in a stiff breeze which kicked up white caps on the Gulf. More dolphins approached the boat and seemed to keep tabs on us from time to time. Due to the haze and relatively low visibility, we were out of sight of land at about 10 miles from Gasparilla Island. After a great sail, we headed back into Charlotte Harbor, furled the sails, and

motored into Boca Grande Marina for the night. We rented a 6-passenger golf cart

to tour the island and visited the light house and a historical museum. We had a huge spaghetti and meatball dinner on the boat that evening and capped it off with a game of "Yacht Race". It's a 1960's board game from Parker Bros. that simulates a 6 boat sailboat race with



We sailed Charlotte Harbor and visited Useppa Island for a night before heading back to Burnt Store Marina. All in all, it was a terrific trip, and a great time was had by all aboard. I can't recommend the area enough for a fabulous cruising area close by!

CRUISING NEWS

Our next Sail-Away is planned for May 2. 3, 4, 2024 and the itinerary is to anchor in Mar Vista Bay the first night (Thursday) and have dinner at the Shore Longboat Key Restaurant (for you land yacht arrivals it's at 800 Broadway St. Longboat Key). Be advised this is an upscale restaurant and prices average between \$30 and \$50/ entrée, but the views are to die for and your own boat will be part of the scenery. We are to be seated in the Gazebo area (inside) and they will do separate checks for couples and singles. Unfortunately breakfast on Friday will have to be on your own boat because the few restaurants in the area do not open until 11:00 am.

The next day we plan to have another unofficial race down Sarasota Bay with the goal of anchoring in Hart's Landing Cove next to the Sarasota Ringling Megabridge. It's a fairly roomy anchorage with room for perhaps a dozen boats and plenty of water

are open to suggestions for an alternative if you would prefer.

For the race we will use Marker G "17" for the start and Marker G "13" for the finish line which will take us down the center of Sarasota Bay and the tides that day will be half-high to high between 0800 and 1900 so we will have plenty of water on the race course. The course will be a trapezoid (see attached chart) with the start being Point A (27 24.58N 082 36.78W), next will be Point B (27 22.46N 082 36.05W), to Point C (27 20.79N 082 33.73W), to Point D (27 22.97N 082 34.81W), to Point A (27 24.58N 082 36.78W), to Point C (27 20.79N 082 33.73W) and finish. The total course distance is 14 NM which should be about 3 hours depending on your speed. Please keep your own times and extra points will be awarded for honesty (just kidding). Sailors, unlike fishermen never tell tall tales.


