SPOILED MAYBE, BUT NOT TAINTED!

Shocked! I was totally surprised and shocked when 17 MSA members reserved tickets for the Juneteenth Celebration at the historic Tampa Theater!



I knew that the 1 hour drive to and from Tampa could be a deterrent. I realized that the MSA

June 18th 3 P.M. outing was in fact smack dab in the middle of Father's Day. Plus, I understood that we were all spoiled and we all knew it. We only watched movies in fully reclining seats in theaters that had the absolute latest high tech audio and visual abilities. And we preferred to reserve our specific seats so we could come in at the last second just before the movie started. Yes, we were spoiled! But lo and behold, faithful MSA members



came out and suffered all sorts of inconveniences to, of all things, see a silent movie! They arrived an hour early to get a good seats (front and center in the balcony); they paid exorbitant fees to park their cars after driving an hour in weekend traffic and they hadn't a clue to what it was that was about to happen. I didn't either!



Yet, being in the incredibly ornate Tampa Theater was almost worth the efforts in itself. The interior of the 1926 theater resembled a starry night in a courtyard of a castle somewhere in Europe. The movie tickets were free for the asking but no one expected that the popcorn and soft drinks would be complimentary as well. We settled into our old fashioned velvet opera style seats and twisted our legs to accommodate the minimal leg room, snacked on pop corn and waited. At 3 P.M. Jill, the host and director of the theater, introduced some important guests who welcomed us to this auspicious event. A representative of Norman studios, the company that produced this 1926 all black cast film, "The Flying Ace", gave us some background to how this film was made. It was the first film to feature

black actors in roles of everyday people, like a police officer, a railroad agent and fighter pilot instead of the traditional servants or slaves. We were also told

how the producer had created the "thrilling" flying scenes in the movie without ever leaving the ground. Then Jill introduced the real stars of this afternoon, the 1926 Wurlitzer Organ (with its 1200 hidden pipes) and organist and



composer, Dr Steven Bell (decked out in full tuxedo with tails) who had written the musical score to accompany the 1 hour movie. As the lights went down so did the huge organ through a mechanical panel in the floor of the stage to a lower level. Although the organ was still slightly visible (so Dr. Bell could see the movie), it was low enough not to block the view of the



stage. As we watched the characters unravel a mystery of who stole the payroll at the railroad station, the music became integral to the mood, the suspense and

the humor of the scene being played out. We particularly fell in love with Peg, a character who was the aviator's side kick. The actor only had one leg in real life and that's how he played his role in the film. He was absolutely hysterical as he

peddled his bicycle with his crutch. The film was corny, funny and most charming and we all loved it. We appreciated that this movie was quite an accomplishment for its time and we were proud to have this unusual opportunity to see it on the big screen and hear it with a live musical score. Yes, we knew this was something special and it was worth all the fuss.

Afterwards we walked just a few steps down the street to a casual pizza/pasta restaurant, Bavaro's. I had had a difficult time trying to find a place that would take our group, provide separate checks, etc.. And most places believe it or not, were closed on Sunday. So out of necessity I booked one of the only places that would work. Again we were surprised! The food was outstanding! Most of us agreed that they had prepared the best pizza we had eaten in years! Sometimes when you least expect it, a regular ordinary day can become very special. Thanks for joining me for this surprising MSA event.

set out from Pensacola Florida for a

10,000 mile journey on an old sailboat that they refurbished entirely by themselves to ultimately round the treacherous seas of Cape Horn. In spite of all the obvious problems, these

veterans suffered from PTSD and were attempting to send a message to the world of what is happening to many of their fellow servicemen.

I recommend this exciting and emotional movie. The production is well done and the photography is gorgeous. However, you might keep a tissue or two handy. Rating would be PG-13, I

guess, due to some language and sensitive subject matter. Enjoy!
