

Ahoy MSA Members, Friends, and Family,

This month's sailing story is about a trip I took this month. On Sunday afternoon 7/21/24, S/V Brewster arrived back in Watkins Glen after a 15-day trip to Lake Ontario. I had been working on preparations for over a year to join the Lake Ontario 300 Challenge. A long-term goal of mine had been to take my boat to Lake Ontario and go through customs into Canada. Entering the LO 300 Race gave us a specific focus for that goal. It was an epic adventure that required months of preparation, boat delivery from New York to Canada and a 300 mile sailboat race under offshore conditions.

TIME TO PREPARE



The preparation:

I had to complete the US Sailing Offshore Safety at Sea Training, This was a combination of 15 sessions of on-line training and a day onsite at the St Petersburg Yacht Club for inperson and in the water rescue procedures. The whole crew (my brother John and friends Kris West and Dave Dawson-elli) completed First Aid and CPR offered by American Red Cross. The crew also had to practice the Crew Recovery (Manoverboard) – I had to certify to 4 pages of check list items ranging from Offshore Life Jackets, Tethers and jacklines to EPIRB and PLB electronics. I installed an AIS B radio identification system on Brewster so that I could monitor the freighters, and they could see me. In fact, we saw many large freighters up to ~730 feet. In addition, about ¾ of the 55 boats entered had AIS so we could monitor the other racers progress when within VHF range.

The Transport:

On Tuesday July 2nd we took the mast

down and prepared/ provisioned the boat for the trip, On Saturday 7/6 at 0830 HRS we headed out for the transport trip which included 3 days of motoring through the Cayuga-Seneca and Erie Canals at 6-8 hours/ day. We encountered 11 locks going to Oswego from Watkins Glen and then made our

125-mile trip across Lake Ontario to Toronto. We spotted the Toronto skyline at 0908 HRS on Thursday 7/11/24 in a mix of rain and windy weather which were the remnants of Hurricane Beryl. We selected a spot on Hanlan's Mooring Wall in City Island and placed a call to Canadian Border Services Agency. We gave the officer our passport information and ship registration. The Hanlan mooring wall is in a beautiful park and sheltered from the

wind. (look up Ned Hanlan in the Ontario Heritage Trust – A Canadian World Champion Rower) We took a water taxi into Toronto that night for dinner at Amsterdam Brewing company right on the lake. The next day we sailed to Port Credit and found the Port Credit Yacht Club. My wife Lynne had just arrived by car from the US and met us at the PCYC. We had a day for the crew to practice reefing the main and setting the spinnaker and re-provisioning for the race. My sister Anne flew in from Tucson, AZ and joined us all for dinner in Port Credit that night.

The Race:

Saturday 7/13 was a beautiful day and we had 8-10 knots for our start at 1141 HRS.

My sister Anne and Lynne were on the seawall at Lakefront Promenade waving and cheering as we left the harbor. A Scottish bagpiper filled the air as each boat headed out on the lake. Nice touch.

All racers headed west to the Fogh mark and then turned south to Niagara Light just north of Niagara Falls where the wind died. We had

stayed high of the mark but with the shift we still had to tack west to get around it. Other boats spent a couple hours at this point attempting to reach the mark in light air. Once we headed east to Main Duck Island - 125nm at 070 Degrees T in a west wind. Overnight we set the asymmetric and kept pace with our group of racers. The next morning saw the wind clocking around to the east and we had to drop the spinnaker. The wind continued to build

and we were sailing well when we arrived at Main Duck and York Islands. Just after passing York we saw a boat ahead of us lay almost flat on the water. It was a sickening sight for a few seconds but soon they righted her. The gust of wind went from 8 knots to 30 in seconds. We furled the jib and reefed the mainsail but soon after that the extreme pressure was gone. We had west wind with 5ft seas on a close reach heading to Oswego. At 0422 HRS we rounded the Ford Shoal Mark and headed back to Port Credit. Winds continued to fade during the day until we were sitting in a flat sea with hanging sails being harassed by black flies. The weather indicated no relief for another 8 hours and we made the decision to retire. We headed back to

Oswego under motor and made good time on the flat water. But our race was over.

My brother John and I bid farewell to the rest of the crew at Oswego and headed to Cape Vincent and Clayton NY for a couple day sail. We met an extremely nasty squall south of Gallo Island. As we dropped the main a batten caught in the lazy jacks forcing the sail wide open in ~ 25 knots of wind. That ripped the mainsail which had dropped down and caught on one of the winches. We got into Cape Vincent at 1930HRS and a Canadian couple offered us half of their Meat Lovers Pizza - we added a few beers and dropped off to sleep. Clayton that day had very nice

weather. We ate breakfast at Bella's on the water and spent 4 fun hours marveling at the development of boating at the Antique



Boat Museum. The next day we headed again to Oswego to drop the mast and get ready for the return through the canals. My son Scott joined us for the 3 days motoring through the canal and transiting the locks. We saw a bald eagle in Montezuma swamp that was appearing as the lord over his domain.

We met a Canadian power boater in Baldwinsville, NY at the Lock. He said that he had once raced in the LO 300 and that it was notorious for wrecked equipment and some injured crew. When I told him that we had traveled from Watkins Glen through the locks and cruised across Lake Ontario just to get to the race, he said that was an epic effort – and that's what it seems to me now that we are done!

Hosted by Jared Walker, our Master of Ceremonies. and highlighted by some enchanting and amusing clowning around antics, 5 amazing acts will perform and thrill the crowd. If you haven't been to one of these performances, you are in for a treat! And even if you have....each year the museum travels the world over to bring us a new line up of breathtaking performers. Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$12 for

The New Chihuly Museum Tour and Lunch in St. Petersburg September 4th

The Chihuly Collection (720 Central Ave. St. Petersburg) is a stunning, permanent collection of world-renowned artist Dale

Chihuly's expressive artwork. This presentation is unique as it is the first installation of Chihuly art in a



building designed specifically for that purpose. Designed so that the art and architecture work together to create a visitor experience unlike any other exhibition of Chihuly's art. The collection is marked at the entrance by an

iconic 20 foot sculpture created especially for the site. We had an opportunity to visit the small Chihuly gallery several years ago that was located downtown near the Vinoy. So I am looking forward to seeing this new and much larger facility.

The collections at the museum includes Chihuly

spectacular large scale installations such as Ruby Red Icicle Chandelier created specifically for the collection along with several popular series works including Macchia, Ikebana, Nijima Floats, Persians and Tumbleweeds, which

have thrilled audiences around the globe. Each space has been designed individually to complement each installation producing unique visual experiences. In 2024, the Chihuly Museum was thrilled to introduce three exquisite Studio Edition glass sculptures, Blue Topaz Persian, Jeweled Macchia and Cherry Red Basket. Vibrant and dynamic, these editions celebrate Chihuly's creative spirit with quintessential compositions that span his career. Each Studio Edition is hand blown and signed by the artist. Just in case you were wondering these pieces are available for purchase so bring along your cresdt card. We have the opportunity to watch this art form

actually being created by resident glass artists in the Morean Glass Studio after our docent led tour. And if you are inspired by all this you are invited to enroll in a class for a one time hands on glass experience.

Before our museum tour we will meet at 12

noon for lunch at a nearby restaurant, Bonu Taverna (601 Central Ave), which specializes in delicious Italian Fare. Then at 2 P.M. we will be escorted by a docent to view and discuss the many collections within the Chihuly facility.

After being blown away with the vibrant art glass we will see how the special glass blowing process is achieved in the Morean Glass Studio (714 Central Ave) across the street at 3 P.M. Tickets for the museum and blown glass demonstration are \$18 for seniors and \$20 for adults. Please email me at gailgordon56@gmail.com with your reservation no later than August 28th.
