On next Wednesday, November 9, at 6 pm is our next meeting. I will be proud to announce our officer nominations for 2023. They will propel the organization to its next level.

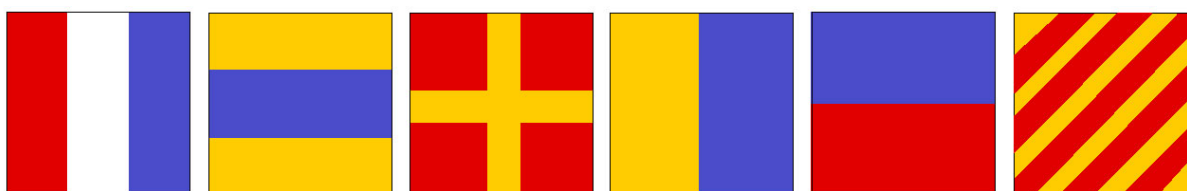

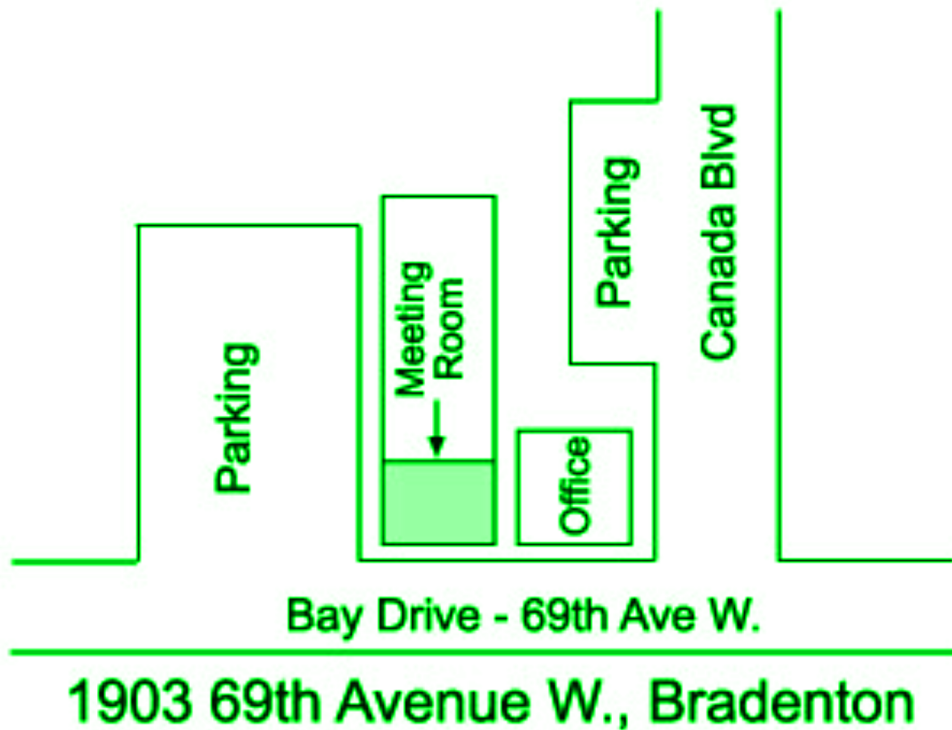

Kayaking South Lido Key and the Mangroves Tuesday November 29th, 2022

We have had in the past on our MSA Social Events calendar a kayak trip usually at Robinson Preserve at least once every year or two. I was thinking we should try something different! Let's pack a brown bag lunch and have a picnic at Ted Sperling Park at noon on Tuesday November 29th.

There are many picnic tables situated along the beach which are protected by large shade trees. Nearby are public restrooms for our convenience. Then after we have filled our bellies let's get some exercise. About 1 P.M. let's get into our kayaks and paddle for a few hours to explore this delightful area on the water. At the boat launch, you may bring your own kayak or rent one for \$45 plus tax for a single, \$55 plus tax for a tandem for a 3 hour window. Please email me at gailgordon56@gmail.com if you will be joining us and especially if you would like to reserve a kayak. This is a very popular place and rentals get booked up fast so don't delay. "Ted Sperling Park is part of the 152 acre section of South Lido Beach in Sarasota. The parks kayak launch serves as a gateway into Sarasota

Bay and to the beautiful mangrove tunnels a short paddle away. Spend an hour or so on a self guided tour of the outstanding Blueway trail. Mangroves and wetlands areas are important natural resources. As beautiful as they are, they are biologically essential and an integral component of the estuarine ecosystem. These habitats provide a number of essential benefits to

bay life..... food and shelter for marine life and wildlife protection from erosion and as filter for pollutants. The trail through the mangrove tunnels will lead you into Little Grassy Lagoon; a shallow body of water distinguished by its rich sea grass beds and considered one of the most diverse in Southwest Florida. You may also enjoy a leisurely paddle out to Otter Key or see the scenic view of downtown Sarasota". Let's spend a few hours discovering another aspect of the incredible area we live in.

The weather should be perfect for a little exercise and the scenery should be spectacular. Please join us once gain for an afternoon in paradise, right in our own backyards.

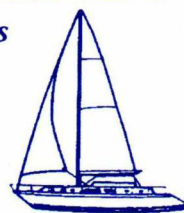

BUNKER HILL WINERY OCTOBER 27, 2022

Nope, there were no tricks on Thursday October 27th! But it was certainly a nice treat to have so many members attend the Bunker Hill Winery Tasting and Lecture, the MSA



Social Event for October. I thought for sure that the somewhat lengthy drive all the way out on State Road 62 almost to Duette in the middle of nowhere would be a deterrent. But I



guess I momentarily forgot that MSA'ers were tough and ready for anything..... especially if wine was involved. 26 members and guests were on my sign up sheet which was reminiscent to the good old times before Covid. At 11 A.M. the parking lot was full of cars and we were all seated at 2 long tables in a shiny air conditioned Quonset hut located amongst the vines which housed the tasting area and the showroom. On arrival I noticed



that the vines looked dead and the owners reported that a large percentage of their vineyard had been severely damaged by Hurricane Ian. Frankly, it never occurred to me to check to see if they were open after the storm since I had made our reservation so long ago. Apparently the farm was in fact closed to visitors for some time. We lucked out! Plus, to add to the excitement, we had special out of town guests who are in fact MSA members that joined us today. Diana and Richard



Jorgensen were here for a visit from their new home on the island of Granada. Another fabulous treat for us to savor!

Larry and Lenora Woodham, owners and entrepreneurs, planted their vines well over 20 years ago and bottled their first wines in 2009. And in 2010 they opened their doors to the public. They have crafted 43 varieties of 100% unfiltered natural fruit and grape wines by hand. The grapes they grow are a variety called Muscadine and these grapes can tolerate the severe conditions of the climate in Florida. For the non-grape wines, 97% of the natural ingredients come from Florida as well. Larry gave us the low-down about the wine industry and how they make wine and then he compared it to theirs. Most of our eyes got really big as we found out things we really didn't want to know about what we have been drinking for decades. He explained that 100% of Bunker Hill wines were unfiltered. We have all thought that anything filtered was the better choice but not so according to Larry. Filtering wine removed all the fruit particles that contained important nutrients like antioxidants. Unfiltered wines retained all the health benefits that come from fruit. Plus, the remarkable level of clarity that the Bunker Hill wines achieved was through a gravity based, intensive process that took a year to accomplish. We were rather suspicious of the whole concept. So after the lecture we were each instructed to select 5 wines from a large menu for tasting. The choices were most unusual! I particularly enjoyed the Black Coffee wine, the Spiced Apple wine (that everyone got to taste in addition to the 5) and the Orange Sparkling wine that was like a



yummy champagne. We sipped and snacked and savored the many different products of love that the Woodhams have created.

I think one of the most delightful aspects of our visit was that we discovered that this little winery stuck out in the middle of nowhere has earned a coveted Master Level of Certified Green. And the "term of

endearment" that the wine industry has labeled on the Bunker Hill Winery is "America's Greenest Winery"! The winery boasts that it has never once used a single new wine bottle. Every single one of their bottles in circulation is recycled. On the back door of the Quonset hut there is a number, 122,307. In the last 18

months, that many bottles have been kept out of a landfill. Pretty impressive! As a matter of fact, we helped to keep that tradition going. We brought empty, clean wine bottles and beer bottles to add to the production line plus a large bag or two of natural corks. I know that we have gotten used to the taste of the store bought wines we have had in our glasses for decades. So these unusual unfiltered wines were a bit out of the norm for most of us. But I must say that we all left the farm a bit wiser and a little happier as we toted large bags of home

grown wines to take home, to enjoy and share with friends.

After the visit to the farm, we drove to Riviera Dunes Dockside in Palmetto for some good food and great camaraderie. We sat outside although it was quite warm but took our time and relaxed within the view of the picturesque marina. Afterwards Pat and Patrick Dwyer took

us on a tour of the marina which just happened to be their winter home. We checked out the big yachts and selected a favorite vessel along the way. By a unanimous MSA vote, the most beautiful boat on the water was a 40 ft Marine Trader named Sans Souci. The Dwyer's invited us aboard to have a closer look and we all enjoyed more time together on this luxurious vessel.



Thank you all for making the day so remarkable.

Bridge Street November 2022



We had beautiful weather for our recent trip which was to the anchorage at the Bridge Street Pier on beautiful Anna Maria Island. Despite this we had some interesting challenges.

Adelia and I had not used our boat, "Free Spirit" in quite some time. We had a good start with the engine running fine and the two of us remembering how to operate it. After we got into Sarasota Bay, I told Adelia to pull out the Jib. It seemed to be stuck. Upon further investigation we discovered that the line I used to tie up the jib so Hurricane Irma would not unravel it was still attached. I would have had to stand on the top of the bow rail to get to it, so I decided to leave it be for another time.



We motored for about two hours, when the engine lost power and then died. We threw out an anchor and I proceeded to change the primary filter. After the traditional bleeding of the air from the fuel line, the engine started up easily and away we went for another 10 minutes of blissful motoring, but the engine lost power and soon died. Down I go to replace the



secondary filter, bleed the system, restart the engine and we are off to another 10 minutes of blissful motoring when guess what? The engine loses power and dies, and we throw out the anchor again. I tell my sweet wife that I do not want to fight with the motor and I am thinking of calling

Tow Boat US. "But I can see the other boats, the party is right over there!" she says in a pleading voice as she points toward Jazz and Aurora. I tell Charles, Mike, who is coming with Gina on their Boston Whaler and Denny of our dilemma. Everyone is keen to help out. Denny jumps in his dinghy and comes to the rescue. With a hip tow he takes us all the way to the anchorage and we throw out the anchor. We are ready to party and Adelia is a happy sailor. It sure is nice to have such good friends. We get a dinghy ride with Denny and Brigid to Jazz, and it's happy hour time. Mike and Gina arrive on their Boston Whaler, and Charles is on his boat with Debi, Chuck, and Gail. Saturday we hitched a ride to shore with Denny and Brigid. It was a perfect day to take a nice long walk on a shady side walk to the restaurant at Coquina Beach. We hung out around an outside table for a while and then headed back north where we bumped into Charles and his crew. We proceeded on to the Moose. After lunch we went back to the boats.
