
JAMES MUSEUM OF WESTERN AND WILDLIFE ART NOVEMBER 30, 2023

Over the years, I have been planning social events for MSA members to spend some quality time together with their friend's landside while exploring some of the incredible local sights and experiences in our own backyard. It has been a pleasure as I have probably had the most fun of all. Exactly 5 years ago this fall the Tampa Bay area welcomed a new arrival with open arms. We savored the experience ourselves and all of us were "wowed" with the introduction. Recently I

have had the pleasure of becoming a member of this amazing museum and I feel it's time to celebrate their successful 5 year anniversary with another MSA visit. So I invite you to join me for a private docent-led one hour long tour of the James

Museum of Western and Wildlife Art located at 150 Central Ave in downtown St. Petersburg on Thursday November 30th at 10:30 A.M.

If you were with us 5 years ago you know that this is a special place to explore but if you weren't......you are in for an amazing treat. First of all, just viewing the unusual architecture is worth the price of a ticket. As you enter the front door, you feel as if you have been transported to a gorgeous canyon somewhere in the remote West at another time long ago. The first thing in your view at the end of the lobby is a life size sculpture of an Indian and his squaw

wading in the shallow soothing waters of a hidden stream. The gift shop and café are just off to the left. Take a peek inside and see an authentic saloon bar that is artfully handcrafted and takes up the width of the room. Perhaps you might feel as I first did as I wondered what could be so interesting about "Western" Art. Oh my!

The huge paintings at the top of the stairs feature scenes of spectacular vistas of our amazing and beautiful country that will take your breath away! You again are transported. Each time I visit this museum I find some new treasure or gem that steals my heart away. And speaking

of gems, there is a room dedicated to some of the most stunning pieces of tribal jewelry you'll ever see. I hope I have whet your appetite and speaking of which afterwards we will have lunch at one of St. Pete's nearby eateries just steps from the museum. Parking is a breeze as you will find ample space above the museum on the 3rd or 4th floor for only \$1 an hour. CIVIL WAR REENACTMENT AND TRAIN RIDE OCTOBER 15TH

There is something romantic, nostalgic and mysterious about hearing the soft far away sounds of a train whistle in the



middle of the night when for some reason you can't sleep. It's as comforting as a creaky floor board in your childhood home. In the early morning on October 15th before the small gathering of

passengers started to arrive, I stood alone on the platform of the Florida Railroad Museum's station and savored the unusual vista in front of me. Large black giants of locomotion were parked on

wooden tracks not yet ready for the morning run. Several boxcars, some open to the fresh air and some with dew



covered glass windows waited patiently behind. Off in the distance were a line of



canvas tents
which housed a
collection of
soldiers and
civilians
beginning the
chores of the

day. I was so early that I had plenty of time to take a closer look. In the telegraph tent, young men waited in line to send a note to mom or their sweetheart saying they were alive and well and how much they missed them. Elsewhere, the preacher was tending a wounded soldier and giving him courage to recover. And

then over to the side I could almost smell the encampment's meager breakfast cooking and the aroma of strong coffee simmering over a open fire.



Yes, this was indeed

a play of sorts but none the less, it gave you a strange awareness of how it could have been a long time ago in the war of brother against brother.

As MSA members arrived they collected their tickets, checked out the small museum of train memorabilia, took their own tour of the Union Civil War campsite and then one by one gathered on the train platform for a train ride through the old Florida backwoods. At 10:30 A.M. sharp, the railroad conductor yelled "All Aboard"! We all headed for the open air cars as rumor had it that these were the best seats on the train to witness the unfolding drama and thank goodness some comedy of the day as well. We were accompanied by some of the Union troops to safeguard our

At 11 A.M. sharp, the train whistle screamed in our ears and slowly the black monster of an engine pulled the train cars out of the Parrish station into the back country. To our

surprise some of the passengers sitting among us (Roger Cappello's grandchildren) were suspected as sympathizers for the enemy and needed to be questioned and guarded. At several intervals the train had to stop as a raggedy enemy attachment from Alabama



caused havoc and threatened our further progress. Not without taking casualties were we finally allowed to continue. As products of the time, we took all the events of the day light heartedly as we were of

course totally safe and among our friends. But watching the skirmishes in the woods reminded us that the Civil War was not at all fun and games. Yet at 12:30 P.M. we all rolled back into the station laughing along with the actors of the day and were glad we came out on this stunning morning for a little history lesson and some camaraderie. Mary Lou Thompson somehow wangled a private tour of the train for a bunch of us after everyone else



got off. It was interesting to hear the age of each car and how each was obtained for the museum. My favorite was an open air car that had once been the property of the Barnum and Bailey Circus train and actually housed

the elephants. Wall cleats were still visible in the car where the huge pachyderms were once secured. We would have listened to more tales of the railroad but we had an appointment to keep. All 22 of us met at the Anna Maria Oyster Bar in Ellenton around 1 P.M. for a surprisingly good Sunday dinner. It had been several years since we had gathered there and we had forgotten why this restaurant was so popular. Thank you so much for sharing this day with me. Because of your incredible MSA enthusiasm this was a particularly delightful excursion!
