I really want to Thank Chuck Fulton and Sal Alphonso for being our Cruising Capt.'s over the last 2 years. We had a lot of fun going to Apollo Beach, St Pete Harborage Marina and Bradenton Beach, The Shore, & Sarasota Basin by Hart's Landing. These guys and Gail of course, made these weekends memorable. And now we are accepting nominations for a new Cruising Capt. Please consider nominating someone for the role or better yet volunteering to take this role. Marinas and waterfront properties should be in better shape for us to visit next year.

MSA Membership Meeting – Our next Membership Meeting will be May 14th at 5PM at the Modern Chop Restaurant. We will have a quarterly membership meeting with updates from our officers and committee chairs. I have been working on getting a guest speaker from Mote Marine, Selby Gardens, FISH Preserve and CAPT Rick Hagan. Two have said yes but must schedule in the Fall. So, I will give a presentation on my trip to Lake Ontario 300 Ocean Race and Clayton, NY last summer.

Tom also has a DWBH set for Anna Maria Oyster Bar Ellenton on June 11 at 5 PM!

Florida Weekend Sail – I'd like to tell you about our sail this past weekend. Lynne and I chartered a Catalina 30, S/V Latitudes (that we have rented a few times before) for the Terra Ceia Regatta. We picked up the boat Friday at 9AM at a private home dock in Sarasota. (The home port dock SaraBay Marina has not been rebuilt yet from damage stemming from Hurricanes Debbie, Helene and Milton.) We motored 5 hours up the Intracoastal Waterway, through the 2 bascule bridges which open to let us pass at 1215 HRS Cortez Bridge and 1245 HRS Anna Maria Island Bridge to Terra Ceia Bay. Friends had warned that Green Can "7" was missing as we entered near Bird Island. So, we were careful to follow the GPS course on Navionics. We were also fortunate to have a nearly high tide. Having both my cell phone Navionics app and a Garmin Chartplotter on the boat (set at a different range scale) was excellent. Even so, the depth was only about 5 feet

at one point, and we draw 3ft 10in. We saw dolphins several times along the way and 3 large dolphins came right next to the boat as we entered Terra Ceia Bay.

We arrived about 3PM on the dock at the home of Denny and Brigid Vitton. Denny had just finished his new dock since the storm, and we were the first to use it. We



Crew of the S/V Latitudes Denny, Rick, & Jim got power sorted out on the boat, dock lines adjusted and had a cocktail. John Castellana and Sheryl joined us all for dinner with lots of stories of Terra Ceia Regatta's of years past, sailing on Lake Ontario and around the world.

The next day my crew of Denny and Rick were ready to leave the dock at 10AM as planned. We headed out to Terra Ceia Bay to learn the idiosyncrasies of this boat. I was at the helm. We had white caps just starting as we left the Tropic Isles Marina and decided to leave the reef in the main. We could shake it out later if needed. The traveler and main sheet seemed to work ok. Denny adjusted the blocks for the Jib sheets to accommodate a reef in the headsail. We threw in a few tacks in the building breeze. We spoke to the Race Committee on VHF and they had set out 4 race marks N, S, E & W on the bay. We kept pushing buttons until we figured out how to enter the race

mark points into the Garmin GPS. Four boats were entered in the Race: (2) S2's (John Castellana on PolyEster with the all female crew of Bobbie and Sue, and Marino Garci on Cohete with the young bucks and (2) Catalina 30's: (Latitudes and Zigzag with Ed Hartung and his crew.) Thank You Sue and Clay for setting everything up! Suffice it to say, the wind built to 18 Kts and gusted to well

over 25, so we had our hands full. We did two races and finished last in both. Darn. Even with all the (loud encouragement) <u>yelling</u> I did too! We rounded up a few times in the gusts but so did everyone else. Denny, Rick and I were a good team as it took heading up into the wind and hauling on the traveler lines to

move the main sheet block at all. We got an override on the main sheet winch a couple times which was not set up well on the boat. It can be interesting in winds that gusty when you can't let out the mainsail.

We got to the After Race Party just as it was hitting full swing with a food truck and music at the beautiful house of Candy and Todd right on Terra Ceia Bay.

We ended up third in the Regatta as John's S2 retired after the first race. Sue and Gail handled the awards and the Rubber Duckie drawing. I called high and luck would have it Lynne won the Prize

> with RD#50. Thank you both for putting all that together. Tom and Linda brought a power boat and encountered the rough and windy conditions. All in all though, it was a really great day on the water.

The next day Lynne and I returned the boat to Sarasota. The winds were even stronger, and we were fighting 3-foot

seas in fairly shallow water. By the early afternoon I had a little concern that we were running out of fuel in heavy winds in the Intracoastal Waterway. The fuel gauge was bouncing off E to $\frac{1}{4}$ tank. I

shut off the engine and rolled out the jib part way trying to conserve fuel. I called the boat owner on my cell, and he told me that ¹/₄ tank really means more than half full on that boat. Oh, that's good to know! Getting back to the dock was no problem.

Lynne and I are visiting Normandy Beaches in France, her brother and family in Portsmouth, England and more over the next two weeks. After the MSA Membership Meeting, we are heading back to NY 5/15/25. Looking to launch S/V Brewster in Watkins Glen, NY by 5/24/25.

right for a block on Palm River Road and entered into a different World. This was a world of colorful orchids hanging

savor the flavors of a faraway place. Could this be Thailand? No, we had just turned into the packed parking lot of Wat Mongkolratanaram Buddhist Temple in Tampa. Apparently, every Sunday morning of the year from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M., crowds have frequented this charming

religious temple for some of the best food at incredible prices around. The first stop after finding a parking space which was no easy task, was to stand in awe of the beautiful Wat shimmering in the morning light.

Then we gravitated over to a line on a long open porch. We asked a few people waiting how this worked. Along the side of a large building were the many food stations. Most items were prepared for take away. We had not brought a cooler so our only option was to eat there. There were spring rolls, wings, crab Rangoon, chicken satay and most of the traditional Thai street foods. There were also sweets although



the Mango cheesecake we heard so much about was sold out. We came too late. The next area was a Pad Thai station where they made your food to order. But the object of our attention today was to try the noodle soup that this community was famous for. There was beef, pork and vegetable choices served to go or to eat there. We chose the later of course. All food items were paid in cash. A

humongous bowl of soup was only \$12. We took our food to one of the tables set up along the banks of the Tampa Canal Extension under the shade of the many trees. The soup was steaming hot and delicious! As we looked around it was difficult to remember

where exactly we were in the world. It felt exotic and foreign. We had only just heard about this amazing place not far from home which is why I am sharing it with you. After our meal we visited the Temple. Shoes off and respectful clothing was required. And if you are lucky enough to be there on a Buddhist holiday, you will get to see a traditional presentation. After this exotic getaway, I was ready to get back to my old routine. I felt like I had been on vacation without stepping on a plane or suffering jetlag.
