Clergy and Musicians as a Team February 27, 2023 · 6:00pm · Fletcher United Methodist Church



Kyle Ritter is Canon for Music at The Cathedral of All Souls in Asheville, NC. At All Souls, he oversees a comprehensive choral program involving children and adults. The Cathedral Choir has toured regionally to both St. Philip's Cathedral in Atlanta and St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Charlotte, and the St. Cecilia Youth Choir has toured to Atlanta, where they sang at Holy Innocents' Church, and Charlotte at Christ Episcopal Church. Prior to his appointment at All Souls, Mr. Ritter was Minister of Music at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Arlington, Virginia, a position he held from 1993-2002. He earned both bachelor's and master's degrees in organ and church music from Indiana University, where he was a student of Robert Rayfield and Marilyn Keiser. Kyle grew up in Evansville, Indiana, where he began piano lessons at age five with Jan Thornton-Irvine. He started organ lessons with Julian

Irvine at ten years of age. He has held various positions of leadership in the American Guild of Organists, including dean of both the Bloomington, Indiana and Western North Carolina Chapters and registrar for the District of Columbia chapter. For four years, he served the Guild as District Convener for the state of North Carolina. Mr. Ritter is Vice-President of the Association of Anglican Musicians, and has served also as a past regional officer, Placement Advisor, and on the editorial board for the AAM Journal. He was Adjunct Instructor in Liturgics at Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria, and taught in the Episcopal Dioceses of Washington and Virginia for the Leadership Program for Musicians (LPM). Mr. Ritter was for several years on the adjunct music faculty at Brevard College and as chair of the Liturgy and Music Commission of the Diocese of Western North Carolina. For five years, he served as Assistant Director/Accompanist for the Asheville Symphony Chorus, and is currently serving as its Interim Director. He is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda honorary music society.

Todd Donatelli retired in 2019 as the Dean of The Cathedral of All Souls, Asheville, NC, a position he held since 1997. Prior to his tenure at All Souls, he served as Canon at St. Andrew's Cathedral in Jackson, Mississippi and as Priest Associate at St. Bartholomew's Church, Atlanta. More recently Todd served as Interim Rector at St. Andrew's, Canton, NC. Todd was ordained priest in 1988. Other church experience has included serving on the Standing Committees of Mississippi and Western North Carolina, the Liturgy and Music Commission of WNC, The Executive Committee of WNC, and guest preacher on The Protestant Hour/Day1. He has led leading workshops and conferences on Conflict, Vestry Leadership, Parish Weekends, Parishes as Systems and Welcoming the Stranger. Dean Donatelli is also the author of articles on the Episcopal Church, marriage, arts



and transformation in congregations and co-authored a study guide to Rowan Williams "Writing in the Dust." Todd is married to Becky and they have two daughters, a son-in-law and one granddaughter. A native of Chicago, Todd is a graduate of the University of Georgia's School of Journalism and a graduate of Virginia Theological Seminary. Todd enjoys cycling, hiking, gardening, cooking, and blues music.

Discover new music on Facebook! After the pandemic closed many churches, organists and composers moved to YouTube and social media to share their latest performances and compositions. Two prolific AGO members in the AGO Organ Forum are composers Dr. Kris Rizzotto, Minneapolis, Minn., and Phil Lehenbauer, Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Rizzotto, above left, recently debuted "Fantasia for Organ" from a recital in California, while Lehenbauer's works have been championed and recorded by group members from as far away as Lithuania and Australia. You are invited to join the lively conversations on Facebook and other social media channels. AGO Organ Forum is a moderated group and subject to approval (to prevent spammers and scammers). AGO membership is not a requirement to join the group.



The history of keyboard instruments involves centuries of global exchange: patterns of performance, composition, manufacturing, taste-making, migration, conquest, and capital shaped by the traversal of geographic locales. In partnership with the Sigal Music Museum and its world-class collection of historical instruments, Westfield's Spring 2023 conference will probe such dynamics as they've persisted between Europe and other parts of the world from the eighteenth to twentieth centuries.

The richly varied program intersperses papers and lecture-recitals with performances intended to illuminate the wide range of information and experience afforded by the Museum's harpsichords, square and grand pianos, reed organ, and "liegende Harfe" clavier. The keynote speakers are Professor Nicholas Mathew of Berkeley, examining "Pianos in the Tropics," and instrument maker and conservator John Watson, offering "Vignettes from the Beginnings of American Keyboard Culture."

In addition, sessions on the themes "Uniquely American," "The Twentieth-Century Early Music Revival," "European Music in Africa and Australia," "European Music in Latin America," "Domestic Music in the United States," and "The Cosmopolitan Virtuoso in America" will investigate the many ramifications of exchange "Between Old Worlds and New." Topics brought to the fore encompass A. P. Heinrich's musical response to injustice, Bayard Rustin's involvement with early music, early keyboards in Ethiopia, Australia, and Latin America, the musical repertoire of Washington's granddaughter, the international virtuosi Gottschalk and Thalberg in America, the popularization of the harpsichord in the United States, and many others.

Rounding out the weekend, you will enjoy a tour of the Sigal Music Museum's "Sounds of America" exhibit, welcoming and closing receptions, a panel on the issues facing historical instrument technology, maintenance, preservation, and use, and opportunities to explore the lively and scenic downtown of Greenville, which The New York Times called "a national model for a pedestrian-friendly city center."

Choral Evensong & Organ Recital St. James Episcopal Church, Hendersonville NC February 19, 5:00pm



A native of Kansas, organist Tate Addis has been praised for his "deeply communicative musicality" leading the Kansas City Star to write "this young organist has the right stuff." His recent recital appearances have taken him to Atlanta, Boston, Cleveland, Detroit, Kansas City, Los Angeles, New York City, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., and the Bloomfield Organ Series at Wichita State University. Active as a church musician from an early age, Tate has held positions at New York City's Brick Presbyterian Church, at Second Presbyterian Church in Kansas City, and at the Yale Berkeley Divinity School in New Haven. Currently, he serves as organist at First Baptist Church in Asheville, North Carolina. Tate received the

Bachelor of Music degree from Wichita State University where he studied organ with Lynne Davis and Robert Town and piano with Andrew Trechak. He holds the Master of Music degree from Yale University where he

studied with Thomas Murray and obtained the Artist Diploma from Oberlin Conservatory as a student of James David Christie. Tate, his wife Laura, and their pet pig Virgil make their home in the mountains of western North Carolina. Tate's recital program *Transfigurations* focuses on music where a central idea is varied or transformed over the composition. It features Dietrich Buxtehude's setting of the Epiphany chorale *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern*, Francis Jackson's masterful *Toccata, Chorale, and Fugue*, and Healey Willan's monumental *Introduction, Passacaglia, and Fugue*. In Memoriam: Kathy McNeil Baldwin (1954-2022)



Kathy was born in Paterson, New Jersey to Rev. J. Roger and Nancy Geyer. She lived most of her life in NJ and enjoyed her years as a Preacher's Kid. She was a member of the United Methodist Church in Rockaway, where her Dad was pastor for 23 years. She played handbells, sang in the choir, and even played the organ there for several years while attending Westminster Choir College in Princeton, where she earned her Bachelor's in Music Education and Masters in Organ Performance.

Kathy was Organist at the First United Methodist Church in Morristown, NJ, for 19 years, before she became Principal Organist for the Benedictine monks at St. Mary's Abbey, also in Morristown. While there, she played 76 services a month and had 2 assistants who filled in the other services. Kathy enjoyed being able to substitute for Eric Plutz at Princeton U Chapel whenever there was a need, loved playing recitals, subbing for other local churches, accompanying major works for area churches, and keeping her teaching studio of 40 students.

In 2013, Kathy and her husband, Richard Baldwin, moved to Lake Junaluska and lived in her parents' home. Almost immediately upon relocating, Kathy got involved accompanying the Haywood Community Chorus (now the Haywood Choral Society), accepted the position of Organist/Choir Director at Grace Episcopal Church for 3 years, and then became Assistant Director of Music and Organist at First United Methodist Church in Waynesville. In 2016, Kathy became Director of the Haywood Choral Society, where she had the honor of conducting numerous major works and enjoying the chorus increase to over 100 members. Kathy was Associate Director and Accompanist for the Lake Junaluska Singers under the superb leadership of Mary Huff. She also established a music teaching studio in her wonderful music room. She is survived by her sister, Bonnie Geyer Florek, who has been here at her side since Kathy's most recent diagnosis.


