Festive Atmosphere on May Day

The Democratic People's Republic of Korea celebrates May Day as a national holiday, holding colourful events including a national meeting. The streets in Pyongyang and provinces are decorated with billboards and national flags. Artistic performances, dancing parties, and sports and recreational games can be seen at factories, enterprises and cooperative farms, as well as in parks and pleasure grounds.

Senior officials in the capital city and provinces mingle with working people, giving pep talks to meritorious workers and visiting workers' dormitories and houses to encourage them to achieve greater successes in their work. They watch artistic performances and participate in sports and recreational games including volleyball, basketball, tug of war, *ssirum* (Korean wrestling), and *yut* game.

The rights to elect and to be elected to state power organs are regarded as the main criterion for assessing the citizens' political status. These benevolent policies are based on the Juche idea, the principles of which are that everything must be considered centering on the masses of the people and everything must serve them.
