..... FOREWORD.....

The Mary Lamphere Society was the first C.A.R. Society in Washington State. It was organized in 1896 by Mrs.Eleanor Freneau Lamphier Noel and was sponsored by the Mary Ball Chapter DAR. Her daughter, Jacqueline Noel, was the first Washington State C.A.R. member with the National Number 921.

This year, 1996, marks the 100th anniversary of that event. As Senior State President, I began a two year project in 1994 to research the history of C.A.R. in Washington State. Although some information is incomplete and a few discrepancies exist between various records, I have put together as complete an outline as possible.

Members helped me find a treasure in a long forgotten book, "History and Register of the Washington State Society Children of the American Revolution 1896-1952" which was compiled by Mrs. Richard Irving Sampson, the organizer of our State Society. I also found a copy of the first W.S.S.C.A.R. Newsletter, which was issued in March of 1950. These two historical documents, along with a short history and a list of all State Societies 1896-1996 comprise this book.

I am sure if you read the information contained in these pages you will be left with an abiding respect for those committed C.A.R. leaders who, with dedication to their children and their patriotic duty, led Washington State C.A.R. for 100 years. This book is dedicated to the memory of those leaders.

WASHINGTON STATE C.A.R. HISTORY

100 YEARS

For 100 years Washington State Children of the American Revolution members have dressed in patriotic costumes and marched in parades, attended President's Day Celebrations and hundreds of other teas, banquets, meetings, gatherings, programs and presentations. They have served their local, state and national Societies as officers and chairmen. They have attended their State Conferences, National Conventions, Western Regional Meetings, Summer Packet Meetings and their local Society Meetings.

They have furnished a children's room in a museum and participated in "Patriotic Education Week"; decorated dozens of bulletin boards and windows with patriotic and historical themes. They have written programs, plays, articles, essays, and skits about their ancestors, their flag, and their country. They have represented their Societies, their communities and their State with poise, dignity and loyalty. They have grown in character as they used their influence "to create a deeper love of country, a loyal respect for its Constitution and a reverence for its Flag, among the young people with whom they come in contact."

For 100 years Washington State C.A.R. members have learned about citizenship and pride as they have striven to become "most worthy descendants of worthy ancestry". They have been members of a patriotic organization and done service for their country.

The Children of the American Revolution was founded in 1895 by Mrs. Daniel Lothrop of Concord, Massachusetts. She presented her suggestion to the newly organized National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution and it was unanimously adopted, followed by a resolution to aid and assist the new youth organization. National members realized the value of a junior group to foster patriotism and to provide future membership. The first Society was Old North Church Society in Concord, Massachusetts.

As early as March, 1896, the first C.A.R. Society was organized in Tacoma, Washington State by Mrs. Eleanor Franeau Lamphier Noel. This first Society was sponsored by the Mary Ball Chapter WSSDAR, which was the first DAR Chapter in the State. This new Society was called the Mary Lamphere Society and started with ten organizing members, including the first Washington State member, Jacqueline Noel, daughter of the Organizer.

Soon, new Societies began to spring up rapidly. The second Society was the Thomas Pickering Society, organized in 1897 by Rainier Chapter, with 42 members. In 1902 The Kitty Livingston Society, Seattle, was organized by Lady Stirling with 60 members. Two years later, in 1904, the Liberty Flag Society was organized by the Esther Reed Chapter in Spokane with 22 members. The Elisha P. Ferry Society, named for Washington's first Governor, was organized in Seattle by Rainier Chapter in 1912. In 1920, Marcus Whitman Chapter organized the George Washington Society in Everett.

Not much is known about these early Societies, but in fact, most of them had disbanded, or become inactive by 1924. It is believed that the once flourishing Societies that had existed prior to WWI were ignored due to the furor of Red Cross Work during the war years.

In 1924, the WSSDAR State Regent, Mrs. Willis G. Hopkins, felt the urgency of re-establishing the Children of the American Revolution in Washington State. She named Mrs. Cyrus C. Phillips as State Director and she, in turn, urged Mrs. Chal Page Bryant to reorganize the Elisha P. Ferry Society. A call was sent out for all DAR and SAR members to come or send their children to an organizing party. Thirty-eight signed the Charter membership and regular meetings were begun. Due to the large size of the group, a decision was made to separate the membership into age groups. In June 1924, the Ada L. McCleary Society, was organized in memory of a beloved DAR member of Mary Ball Chapter, who had served as Regent of Mary Ball, Regent of WSSDAR and headed a committee which designed our State Flag. This Society also was organized by Rainier Chapter and was established for the younger members, ages 6-12.

During the 1920's three other Societies were organized. Auburn Society was organized in Auburn in 1925, Henry Hudson Society was organized in Spokane in 1926, and the Alice Clarissa Whitman Society was organized in Vancouver in 1928. Again, however, the Children of the American Revolution Societies soon declined. By 1934 only the Ada L. McCleary Society remained. Miss Gertrude Chamberlin defied the lack of interest in C.A.R. and held a little troupe of six members together for many years during this time.

In 1944 the Washington State Children of the American Revolution was given the boost it needed with the appointment of Mrs. Helen Mar Miller Sampson (Mrs. R.I. Sampson) as State Director. Mrs. Sampson served as State Director, and later as Senior State President from 1944 through 1949. During this term, she organized the State Society and through her unflagging encouragement, the number of Societies rose from one to fourteen and membership rose from six to over three hundred!

Mrs. Sampson used the little band of Ada L. McCleary members as the nucleus for a reactivation of C.A.R. With diligent work, she organized Cameahwait Society of Tacoma, Trail Blazers Society of Olympia and Kamiakin Society of Yakima. Then, having four Societies, she organized the Washington State Society Children of the American Revolution, which was formally recognized on August 1, 1947.

In 1948 the first Washington State C.A.R. Conference was held at the Rainier Chapter House, where it continued to be held annually for many years. This first Conference was attended by the National Senior President of C.A.R., Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams as guest of honor.

In 1949, through the Grandmothers' Committee and the generosity of the DAR and SAR, the State Society sent its first State President, Elizabeth Kefauver, to represent the State at the National C.A.R. Convention in Washington D.C. State Presidents at the time served two year terms, and so this was done every other year.

During the years, 1947-1950, special financial help was given by WSSDAR, and with this encouragement many new Societies were organized in rapid succession. Alice Clarissa Whitman Society was reorganized in Vancouver, Baptiste Society was organized in Chehalis, Fort Walla Walla Society in Walla Walla, Teekelet Society in Bremerton, Kulshan Society in Bellingham, Skagit Chief Society in Anacortes, Princess Angeline Society in Seattle, Colonel Henry Peyton Society in Spokane, Captain Robert Gray Society of Seaview and Sarah Livingston Society in Kent.

The 1950's brought many years of W.S.S.C.A.R. activity and many wonderful leaders. But again, sadly, slowly declining membership during the later years. Four new Societies were added, including, Johnny King Society in Seattle in 1951, Jacob Ebey Society in 1955, Totem Pole Society in Seattle in 1956 and Fort Nisqually Society was organized in Tacoma by Tahoma Chapter DAR in 1958.

Some 1950 highlights included: In March, 1950 the first Washington State C.A.R. Newsletter was sent out by Mrs. Sampson. On October 17, 1958, Mrs. Jewell M. Campbell, C.A.R. Senior State President sponsored a resolution in Washington State to proclaim the week of October 19 through 25 as "Patriotic Education Week". The proclamation was signed by Governor Albert D. Rosellini. The week was set aside "to honor the Children of the American Revolution and to remind the prople of the significance of our American History". Patriotic Education Week began on Columbus Day and ended on the Anniversary of Yorktown. In 1959 members assisted in furnishing the Children's Room at the Fort Columbia Museum.

During the 1960's W.S.S.C.A.R. continued to work hard. The dues were 10 cents in 1964 and in 1968 six members attended National Convention. Numbers continued to drop despite three new Societies and two reorganizing Societies. These included, Juan de Fuca Society, organized in Port Angeles by Michael Trebert Chapter DAR in 1964, Savannah Society, organized in Kennewick by Columbia River Chapter DAR in 1964, Baptiste Society, reorganized in Olympia by Sacajawea Chapter DAR, and the Sally Glacken Society was organized by Olympus Chapter DAR in Seattle.

Despite dwindling numbers, loyal leaders and members made the 1970's and 1980's memorable years for many Washington State C.A.R. children. Members were active in state functions and attended Western Regional Meetings and National Conventions. W.S.S.C.A.R. members continued to hold national officer and chairman positions. In 1970, the Henry Francisco Society was organized in Everett by Marcus Whitman DAR and in 1975 Kulshan Society was reorganized. Despite much hard work, by the end of the 1980's only 5 Societies remained active. These included, Ada L. McCleary, Princess Angeline, Totem Pole, Fort Nisqually and Sally Glacken Societies.

Some highlights during these years included: In 1975 Mrs. Wikberg made and gave the first quilt to the W.S.S.C.A.R. for a drawing. In 1983 the first C.A.R. Debutants, Denise Andresen and Elizabeth Turnipseed were presented at the DAR State Conference. For years an energetic and unstoppable leader, Mrs. Helen Chase Keliehor, drove dozens of C.A.R. members to local meetings, Western Regional Meetings, archaeological digs, searches for gravesites and visits to many interesting places.

In May of 1990, Chakawah Society was organized in Moses Lake by Karneetsa Chapter DAR. It was the first new Society in W.S.S.C.A.R. to organize in twenty years. With the addition of this new Society, membership has remained quite constant during the first half of the 90's. At this time, on our 100th Birthday of C.A.R. in Washington State, we have 155 members. Again, despite low numbers, loyal and hard working members continue to work diligently for the ideals and objects of C.A.R. We currently have three organizing Societies in Mount Vernon, Spokane and Chehalis.

Despite the fact that all of our early Societies are disbanded, with the seed planted in those early days, we again have Societies of the Children of the American Revolution flourishing in Washington State. It is our hope that as we begin our second hundred years of C.A.R. the members of the DAR and SAR will see it as their duty, their hope and their privilege to support the Children of the American Revolution in Washington State. In the words of Mrs. Helen M.M. Sampson "We have graduated many C.A.R. members and fortunate is the Chapter whose pleasure and privilege it is to secure one of these young members. They have been trained to appreciate their heritage and will live up to their motto: For God and Country."

As the oldest youth organization in America, C.A.R. offers opportunities to develop self confidence, leadership, decision making abilities and poise that will remain throughout one's life. Again in the words of Mrs Sampson "It has taken time to impress upon the members of the Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution that the growth of their Chapters depends greatly on the growth of the C.A.R. Placing their children in our organization is a splendid investment for them and gives a greater return for money expended than any other. In a few short years the few dollars invested in a member of the C.A.R. brings in return a full fledged DAR or SAR who will be a member of the parent organization for life, and an American Citizen who will be a credit to our Country."

It is with a mixture of regret and pleasure that I complete this History of the Children of the American Revolution of the State of Washington...Regret that I have been unable to verify each number with its owner and to ascertain that I have every name in Washington C. A. R.; regret also that I have not been able to get more detailed history of the early societies; pleased, however, that I was able to learn as much of their early history as I have, and that I could obtain the continuity I have in tieing them all together.

It was quite by accident that I learned that these early societies had ever existed. In our 1924 and 1941 histories no mention is made of any society earlier than 1924. Miss Elizabeth Cornell of Spokane gave me a booklet she had found among her mother's treasures. It was a year book of the National Society in 1907 and there was listed in it five societies. When I went to the National Convention in 1950, I planned to get all the information I could relating to the beginnings of C. A. R. in our state. Permission was given me to peruse all the early records beginning with Book I which gave the name of Margaret Lothrop, daughter of founder Mrs. Daniel J. Lothrop, as C. A. R. member No. I. These early records were not alphabetized nor listed by states, so it was necessary to scan each page for mention of a Washington city or the name of our state. I was intensely interested, the time flew by, and I stayed an extra day after the C. A. R. National Convention closed in order to complete the task begun. On reaching the 1945 names, I knew I could get the names for that and subsequent years from the societies organized during my regime as State President.

If I had not had the understanding and encouragement of my husband, who was a National Promoter of C. A. R., this history might not have been written for future generations to know. It has been quite a task but it has been most interesting to place the pieces of information together

until at last the picture was complete.

All early members have been much interested in recalling happy times and giving to me little items of interest. I hope through this renewed interest in these almost forgotten societies that we can build a large and far-reaching organization of the Children of the American Revolution in this state. There should be a definite increase in membership — not only in the C. A. R., but also in the D. A. R. and the S. A. R., because these early C. A. R. members are good prespective material, as well as their offspring.

My heartfelt thanks to the Sons of the American Revolution of Washington State and to Mrs. Chal Page Bryant for assisting in financing this history. STATE CONFERENCES

The first State Conference: was held in Rainier Chapter House on June

23, 1948, with Princess Angeline Society, Seattle, as Hostess. Miss Elizabeth Ann Kefauver, Junior State President presided. The Guest of Honor was Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams, National President, C.A.R.

The second State Conference was held in Tacoma, June 11, 1949, with Cameahwait Society as Hostess, with Miss Elizabeth Ann Kefauver presiding. Miss Georgianna Jeklin was appointed Junior State President for the coming were to take the place of Elizabeth Kefauver wastened as she had been year to take the place of Elizabeth Kefauver, resigned, as she had been elected to the National Junior Board, as Junior National Vice President.

The third State Conference was held in Rainier Chapter House, Seattle, with Miss Georgianna Jeklin presiding on June 21, 1950, with Ada L. Mc-Cleary Society as Hostess. The Guest of Honor was Miss Elizabeth Ann Kefauver, Junior National Vice President as Guest of Honor.

The fourth State Conference was held in Seattle at the Rainier Chapter House on June , 1951, with the Princess Angeline Society as Hostess. Miss Ann McGilchrist, Junior Vice President presided in the absence of Georgianna Jeklin, Junior State President. As Georgianna was graduating into D.A.R. during the coming year, Ann McGilchrist was appointed Junior State President by Mrs. Charles T. Lill, Senior State President.

- John Alden Ryan gave the first report of Washington State C.A.R. at a National Convention. He was a member of Elisha P. 1932 Ferry Society II.

MARY LAMPHERE SOCIETY, C.A.R.

The Mary Lamphere Society, Children of the American Revolution, was the first Society organized in the State of Washington, and existed from 1896-1898. It was spensored by Mary Ball Chapter, D.A.R., Tacoma, which had just organized in 1894, and was the first Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in our State. It seems rather fitting that the first Chapter D.A.R. should spensor the first Society of C.A.R.

Mrs. Eleanor Freneau Lamphier Noel was the organizer and the first president. She had transferred to Mary Ball Chapter in 1895, from an eastern chapter in Connecticut. Her Revolutionary ancestors were Philip Freneau, James Lamphier, James Lamphier, Jr. and John Dodge. She evidently brought with her the enthusiasm of her Eastern State for this newly organized National Society, and organized this Society the year after her arrival in the West.

When Mrs. Noel came to the choosing of a name for the new society, she decided on the name of a little heroine of the Revolution, Mary Lamphier. The Lamphiers lived in New Bedford, Connecticut, during the Revolutionary War. When New Bedford was attacked by the Red-Coats, pillaged and burned, the Lamphiers stacked their rescued household possessions and bedding as far from the flames as possible and placed little Mary on the bedding telling her to beat out any sparks that fell and keep it safe, till they came back. They knew they would be captured unless they fled.

When the soldiers came there was only a little girl, and she was left unharmed. She was rescued later, and the family belongings were saved. She was indeed a little Heroine!

Miss Jacqueline Noel has the honor of being the first member of the Children of the American Revolution in the State of Washington, with a National number 921.

THOMAS PICKERING SOCIETY, C.A.R.

Thomas Pickering Society, Children of the American Revolution, was organized in Seattle in 1897 by Mrs. Roscoe R. Drummond and sponsored by Rainier Chapter, D.A.R. It was the first C.A.R. Society in Seattle.

It is believed that the Society took its name in honor of Captain Thomas Pickering, who lost his life when in command of a privateer, during the War of the Revolution.

The Society was disbanded in 1909.

KITTY LIVINGSTON SOCIETY, C.A.R.

The Kitty Livingston Society, Children of the American Revolution, was organized in 1902 by Mrs. M.E.P.R. Phelps of Seattle. It was sponsored by the newly organized Lady Stirling Chapter, D.A.R., also organized by Mrs. Phelps. It grew rapidly and consisted of, for the most part, the children of these members.

"Kitty Livingston, the younger daughter of Governor Livinston of New Jersey at the time of the Revolution, figured in the National tapestry as the recipient of the favor of George Washington as expressed in the very human note written amid the hardships of that most desolate of all American camps in the Revolution. The note: "General Washington having been informed lately of the Honor done him by Miss Kitty Livingston in wishing for a lock of his hair, takes the liberty of enclosing one accompanied by his most respectful compliments. Camp Valley Forge, March 18, 1778."

THE LIBERTY FIAG SOCIETY, C.A.R.

The Liberty Flag Society, Children of the American Revolution, of Spokane, was organized by Mrs. Leonard B. Cornell in March, 1904, and sponsored by Esther Reed Chapter, D.A.R.

The Liberty Flag was the earliest flag displayed in the South, and was raised in Charleston, South Carolina, in 1775. It was a blue flag with a white crescent. Later the word "Liberty" in white was added. Reference: The Flag of the United States and Its History, by J. A. Moss.

In 1907 a Colonial Ball was given and the music was named for Revolutionary Statesmen and heroes, such as George Washington March, Martha Washington Waltz, Patrick Henry Two Step, Liberty Flag Waltz, and in the middle of the evening the Minuet was danced in costume. It was held in Hotel Spokane, January the Fourth, Ninetten Hundred Seven.

In 1905, Mrs. Moses A. Phelps, Washington State Regent, D.A.R., wrote the music to the words of a poem, Our Flag of Liberty, written by Mrs. Daniel J. Lothrop, Founder of the National Society, Children of the American Revolution. This song was "dedicated to the Liberty Flag Chapter, Children of the American Revolution" in Spekane, and was presented to Mrs. Richard I. Sampson, then President of the Washington State Society, C.A.R., by Miss Elisabeth Cornell, daughter of the organizer and President of the "Liberty Flag Society" of Spokane, 1904-1906. While the information at the top of the page may be the Liberty Flag (original) more than likely the name of this Society was inspired by this lovely poem written by our Founder, Mrs. Lothrop.

Last verse of poem:

"Then stars like thine with radiant light, Shall make this land of promise bright, When all her youth shall loyal be, To thee, Oh, Flag of liberty."

ELISHA P. FERRY SOCIETY, C.A.R., I.

Elisha P. Ferry Society, Children of the American Revolution, was organized in February, 1912 and sponsored by Rainier Chapter, D.A.R. The organizing President was Mrs. Byron Thorpe Carr. It was named for the Hon. Elisha P. Ferry, the first governor of the State of Washington, whose daughter, Mrs. Eliza Ferry Leary, was a much loved member of Rainier Chapter. This Society was disbanded in 1921.

GEORGE WASHINGTON SOCIETY, C.A.R.

George Washington Society, Children of the American Revolution, was organized in Everett in September, 1920 by Mrs. W. A. Killien as Organizing President, and spensored by Marcus Whitman Chapter, DAR.

The name "George Washington" needs no explanation, but a fortunate group, indeed, who fell heir to it. At the time that the Society was disbanded, an attempt was made to reorganize but it was not successful. The name was relinquished and is now carried proudly by a Society in the District of Columbia. The Society was disbanded by the National Society October 12, 1945.

Mrs. Willis G. Hopkins, State Regent of Washington Daughters of the American Revolution in 1924, felt the urgency of re-establishing the Children of the American Revolution in our State. Flourishing Chapters had existed prior to World War I, but in the fervor of Red Cross Work the leaders had spent their time elsewhere, not realizing that in C.A.R. work the seeds of truest patriotism can be planted. Mrs. Cyrus C. Phillips became State director. She urged Mrs. Chal Page Bryant to re-organize the Elisha P. Ferry Society, and with seven potential members in her own family it seemed appropriate to do so. A call was sent out for all D.A.R. and S.A.R. members to come or send their children to an organization party at Mrs. Bryant's home. Many eligible children were invited, whose parents were not members of the Senior Society. Mrs. David Bowen and Mrs. Carr gave inspirational talks. Young girls in Colonial costumes danced the Minuet. Colorful decorations attracted the group to the dining room, after which a social hour of dancing and games served to get the young people, from all parts of town, acquainted. Thirty-eight signed the Charter membership roll. For two winters regular meetings were held, most of them at the home of Mrs. Bryant. The high light of the season was a beautiful party given by Mrs. Eliza Ferry Leary, who was specially interested as the group bore her father's name. Mrs. Paul Watt told of the landing of her ancestors at Alki Point. Clam juice was served as a reminder of the baby, Roland Denny, who had to be raised on clam juice, as there was no milk. Chocolate logs were served to represent the logs of the first cabin. There was an average attendance of fifty, parents and children. Many of the girls had Colonial costumes and powdered wigs, and often served at patriotic functions. They placed a wreath on the Washington Monument on February 22nd, and attended the ceremony in a group. A number of the group became active members of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Sons of the American Revolution. One member became the Regent of the University of Washington Chapter, D.A.R. And so the work pays dividends.

Mrs. Chal Page Bryant

Mrs. Harry W. Dye, who was Senior President from 1929-1931 tells of interesting episodes in her Regime, as follows: During the years of my presidency, Colonel Blethen, now deceased, Editor of the Seattle Times, sponsored an essay contest in the Elisha P. Ferry Society by donating fifty dollars to be used as awards for the three best essays on some historical subject. There were many contestants. The subject, selected by me was on some phase on the life of George Washington. The essays were returned to me and forwarded to the State Director, Mrs. Phillips, who with her judges made the selections. The D.A.R. House ball room was donated for a Spring Dance and party for the C.A.R., at which time the awards were presented to the children. The first prize was \$25.00, the second prize was \$15.00, and the third prize was \$10.00. During my last year, the Bi-Centennial of George Washington was celebrated all over the United States. Our Society put on a Flag Pageant at Volunteer Park which was quite outstanding. June 14th being Flag Day was an appropriate time for our Pageant, and the weather, bright and sunny, drew a large crowd. The flag bearers were in period costume from the Revolutionary time to the present day. Our own State Flag was included in the procession as they marched to the tune of "The Stars and Stripes Forever," followed by the President of the S.A.R., as Uncle Sam, then came George Washington, Miss Liberty and Betsy Ross. Next in line came the four essay winners, the three C.A.R. members, and the fourth, sponsored by the S.A.R. Uncle Sam led the Pledge of Allegiance; Miss Liberty, the Americans' Creed, and Betsy Ross carried a Flag. My daughter, Frances, in cap and gown denoting Education, led the procession carrying our beautiful American Flag, which seemed more beautiful than ever on that day, the 14th of June, 1931. The essays were given orally by the Children."

ELISHA P. FERRY SOCIETY, C.A.R. II.

Elisha P. Ferry Society, Children of the American Revolution, was reorganized in January, 1925, with Mrs. Chal Page Bryant, Organizing President. There were thirty-eight charter members. It was sponsored by Rainier Chapter, D.A.R., Seattle.

The organizing officers were:

ADA L. MCCLEARY SOCIETY, C.A.R.

In July of 1924 plans were made for a picnic lunch in Volunteer Park for the purpose of forming a new Society of the Children of the American Revolution. The committee in charge of this meeting was headed by Mrs. Cyrus C. Phillips, who represented the National Society as organizer for the State of Washington, Mrs. Chal Page Bryant, leader of the Elisha P. Ferry Society (organized in March) and Mrs. Hampton Moran, who was to become the Leader and President of the new Society. The age limit of members was twelve years, at this age they graduated to the Senior

Society, Elisha P. Ferry.

"Ada L. McCleary" was the name proposed for the new Chapter, honoring Mrs. Ada L. McCleary, the wife of Henry McCleary. She was an honored member of Mary Ball Chapter, Daughters of the American from 1905 until she passed on in 1923. She had served as Chapter Regent, State Regent, and Vice President General from Washington from 1920-1923. It was while she was State Regent that a request came from National Society D.A.R. that a Washington State Flag be sent to be hung in Memorial Continental Hall. It was then discovered that Washington State did not have an official Flag. She headed a Committee who designed a flag with a dark green background, since Washington is the "Evergreen State," and with the Seal of the State of Washington in the center. This Flag was presented by Mrs. McCleary at the Continental Congress in April, 1915. This later became the official Flag of Washington. At the meeting of the National Board of management of the Children of the American Revolution held February 12, 1925, the name "Ada L. McCleary" was confirmed and Mrs. Hampton Moran was appointed President for the years 1925-1927. During her regime, the membership increased from twelve members to thirty-five or forty.

The Society was officially organized June 12, 192h, and the name "Ada L. McCleary Society" was confirmed on February 12, 1925. The first formal meeting of the Ada L. McCleary Society was held at the home of the Senior President, Mrs. Hampton Moran, on September 27, 192h, with Mrs. Cyrus

Phillips and Mrs. Chal Page Bryant assisting hostesses.

During the next ten years the following served this Society: Mrs. C. F. Moe, April 14, 1927 to May 9, 1929; Mrs. Proctor, May 9, 1929, to May 8, 1930; Mrs. Harriet C. Saunderson, May 8, 1930 to Dedember 11, 1932; Mrs. H. G. Lambert, December 11, 1930 to October 13, 1932; Mrs. J. L. Mears, October 13, 1932 to December 13, 1934; and Miss Gertrude Chamberlin

December 13, 1934 to December 14, 1951.

Miss Gertrude Chamberlin remained Senior President till her untimely death on December 14, 1951. Her group of six she kept on her books in good standing. She had little meetings with those members of an age to come, and each February 22nd she arranged for the Colonial costumed "George and Martha" to place a wreath on the Washington monument by the only C.A.R. Society at the time, the Ada L. McCleary Society. It was always the high light of the ceremonies, and rain or shine, Miss Chamberlin was there, with her two little members, to show honor and reverence to the Father of his Country. We miss her sadly, - never again will there be one more devoted to the cause of Patriotism, love of Country, and loyalty to her beloved Ada L. McCleary Society, Children of the American Revolution.
