

Case Study #1: The Structural Pivot

Sector: Midwest Community Health & Wellness Anchor

The Mission: Re-engineering a legacy pillar on the brink of systemic collapse.

The Site Survey: Identifying the Fault Lines

When **mach73** was contracted, this multi-generational, 80,000-square-foot community anchor wasn't just facing a budget gap—it was facing a structural failure. The "symptoms" were visible, but the root causes were buried in the foundation:

- **Infrastructure Decay:** A massive facility in dire need of \$3M+ in immediate repairs just to keep the doors open.
- **Leadership Vacuum:** Operating without a President/CEO during a period of peak volatility.
- **Financial Fragility:** Performance was trending toward insolvency, with back-room services being "subsidized" by national and regional affiliates.
- **Organizational Identity Crisis:** A choice between forced absorption into a regional "sister" organization or finding a radical path to independence.

The mach73 Assessment: A traditional "Handyman" fundraiser would have focused on a \$4M capital campaign—a move that focus groups proved would have failed. The organization didn't need a donation; it needed an **Architectural Intervention**.

Phase I: Shoring Up (Stabilization)

Before the "Build" could begin, we had to stabilize the site. mach73 moved from theory to operational oversight immediately:

- **Interim Leadership:** Switched the focus from an permanent search to securing an experienced interim leader to manage the recovery phase.
- **The Bridge Raise:** Engineered an immediate \$175,000 "bridge" fundraising effort to cover urgent operating expenses and provide a long-overdue pay raise for the frontline workforce.
- **Contract Renegotiation:** Audited and renegotiated critical vendor and governmental contracts to plug the "leaks" in the annual operating budget.

- **Operational Groundwork:** Addressed gaps in Marketing, Facilities, and Cleaning supervision to restore membership confidence.

Phase II: The Creative Design-Build Cornerstone

With the organization stabilizing, the "blueprint" for the future required a disruptive financial maneuver. The \$3 to \$4M need was too high for a standard community ask.

The Architectural Solution: The Sale-Leaseback Pivot.

mach73 identified the facility itself as the primary untapped asset. By engineering a **sale-and-leaseback agreement** with a community-minded investor, we achieved three critical objectives:

1. **Instant Capital:** Secured funds to address a large portion of the infrastructure backlog immediately.
 2. **Right-Sizing the Campaign:** By injecting sale proceeds into the project, we reduced the community fundraising goal to a reachable **\$1.5M**.
 3. **Securing Independence:** The liquidity provided by this move allowed the Board to decline the merger and maintain 100% local independence.

Phase III: Engineered Results

The project is currently nearing completion, proving that the "Design-Build" model delivers what traditional consulting cannot:

- **Financial Integrity:** The \$1.5M community campaign is nearing its goal, supported by a now-stable operating budget.
 - **Strategic Autonomy:** The organization remains independent, governed by a local board that has been revitalized and optimized for high-level oversight.
 - **Permanent Leadership:** With the "house in order," mach73 participated in the search and transition of a permanent President/CEO.
