FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Do not judge, or you will be judged. For with the same judgment you pronounce, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." - Matthew 7:1-2

You've probably heard about the controversial sermon delivered on January 21st at the Washington National Cathedral by Bishop Mariann Budde. Many government officials were in attendance, including President Trump, and Bishop Budde used the opportunity to issue a plea for social justice, particularly for the LGBTQ+ community and undocumented individuals. Trump took offense and called for Budde's apology, and her sermon has since gone viral.

While I am optimistic whenever the Christian sphere gains notice in the public eye, I am equally hesitant. I am also extremely cautious when it comes to critiquing other preachers because of exactly what Jesus says in Matthew 7:1-2 - that with the judgment I use, I too will be judged. This verse, however, is often misunderstood. Jesus is not saying that we should never judge anyone or anything (that would be impossible; we use our God-given judgment to navigate the world every single day). What He is saying is that we should exercise extreme caution and discernment in the use of our judgment, lest we be guilty of leaving the proverbial plank in our own eye whilst attempting to remove the speck from our brother's.

That being said, I will throw out my two cents for the sake of reflection. My first observation while listening to Reverend Budde's sermon was that I did not disagree with the overall message of unity - we are called to be peacemakers, that is true. The main issue, in my opinion, is that she failed to rightly divide the Word of God. "Rightly dividing the Word of Truth" (2 Timothy 2:15) means to handle God's Word reverently, to teach it correctly and without bias. It is impossible to rightly divide the Word of Truth when the Word of Truth is never spoken. There was zero Scripture given in Reverend Budde's message, apart from two or three passing references to the Sermon on the Mount (which, ironically, is also where the above Scripture is taken from). Even then, the passing references were used in such a manner that displayed a clear bias. For example, she addressed "honoring the dignity of every human being," (particularly LGBTQ+ and undocumented individuals) but she failed to address the dignity of unborn human lives. This seems a very convenient omission, especially given her broad appeal to the dignity of human life.

She also gave three foundations of unity: honoring human dignity, honesty and humility. She cautions everyone to practice humility, or else run the risk of labeling ourselves "the good people" and everyone else "the bad people." This again is something that I would agree with at face value. However, by revealing her clear political bias, Reverend Budde flirted with violating her own principle and labeling anyone who disagrees with her political views as "dangerous" or divisive (i.e. a bad person).

In regards to honesty, she said, "There is a lot working against the truth now, but when we know what is true, it's incumbent upon us to speak the truth; even when - especially when - it costs us." I agree here as well, and the unfortunate truth is that Rev. Budde had a prime opportunity to share the Truth of the gospel of Jesus Christ with a large number of people in places of power and she opted to deliver a message other than Jesus Christ and Him crucified.

My intention here is not to condemn or divide, but to draw our attention back to Christ - the only perfect Judge. If we desire to see true, lasting unity, then there is only one foundation we can turn to. As virtuous as honor, honesty and humility are, they are as fallible as any other human effort. It is only the gospel of Jesus Christ which has the power to save, transform and unite broken, sinful people.

I share these thoughts with you at the risk of opening myself up for judgment, but if I be judged for proclaiming the gospel, then I gladly accept it. "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes" (Romans 1:16). May the overwhelming love and grace of the gospel be the lens by which we live and move and have our being.
