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# From the Pastor's Desk

“Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies it produces many seeds.” - John 12:24

If you know me, you might be aware of my fondness for random trivia. This week I learned that the word “mortgage” comes from the old French words “mort” (meaning death) and “gage” (meaning pledge). So, a literal translation of the word would be something like “death pledge”. That sounds a bit morbid, but we use this word in the context of buying and lending property. A person pledges the property to the lender, and that pledge (or “gage”) dies (or becomes “mort”) once their debt is paid in full. So a more contextual understanding of the word “mortgage” is that it’s “a pledge (gage) with its own death (mort) built-in from the start.”

In John chapter 12, Jesus is explaining to His disciples that He would soon be offered up to die, and interestingly He ponders, “What shall I say? ‘Father, save me from this hour’? No, it is for this purpose that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify Your name!” (v.27) In effect, Jesus is revealing here that His whole earthly life has been like a mortgage note - a pledge with its own death built-in from the start. After all, what is another word for pledge? Covenant. As in, “This cup is the new covenant in My blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.” (Luke 22:20). We hear those words of institution when we celebrate communion, reminding us of Christ’s atoning death and resurrection that procured our salvation. On the cross, one of the last words Jesus spoke was the Greek word “tetelestai”, which we translate as “it is finished.” However, this word was also used in legal terms at that time as a seal of satisfaction; that a particular debt had been paid in full. When Jesus died, our “mortgage note” was paid in full, transferring upon us ownership of salvation.

Jesus’ analogy of a kernel of wheat falling to the ground and dying so that it can produce much fruit is one of those spiritual truths that is multi-layered. There’s the layer I just spoke of: Jesus’ death, like that wheat, produced a harvest of righteousness - countless souls across time that would be saved because of His sacrifice. But this principle also applies to our lives. If we are to bear much fruit for the Kingdom of God, we need to be willing to die - die to ourselves, die to our old sinful habits, die to unproductive ways of thinking that keep us stuck in patterns of spiritual stagnation. Jesus came to give us life - abundant life - but that comes with the cost of taking up our own cross and following Him. In this season of harvest, it would benefit us greatly to consider what parts of ourselves need to die so that a Godly harvest may spring up. Pride, selfishness, stubbornness, laziness, apathy - these are the weeds that sprout up and choke out the good seed which has been planted in us. Where might the Holy Spirit desire to prune your heart this month? Where would your time, effort and energy be best served for the Kingdom? Where might He desire to prune the ministry of St. Andrew so that all of our efforts are poised for Kingdom impact? Let’s practice the spiritual discipline of cultivation and pray expectantly for the harvest that is to come!

# Kid's Korner

Each month we will include an activity you can do as a family to keep at home or help in the community!

Consider a family project of creating kits for your home, as well as, kits to donate to friends, neighbors, The Son Light House etc.

## FIRST AID KITS

A well-stocked first aid kit is a handy thing to have. To be prepared for emergencies:

1. Keep a first aid kit in your home and in your car.
2. Carry a first aid kit with you or know where you can find one.
3. Find out the location of first aid kits where you work.

First aid kits come in many shapes and sizes. Your local drug store may sell them. You can also make your own. Some kits are designed for specific activities, such as, hiking, camping or boating.

Whether you buy a first aid kit or put one together, make sure it has all the items you may need:

- Include any personal items, such as medications and emergency phone numbers or other items your health-care provider may suggest.
- Check the kit regularly.
- Check expiration dates and replace any used or out-of-date contents.

The Red Cross recommends that all first aid kits for a family of four include the following:

- 2 absorbent compress dressings (5x9 inches)
- 25 adhesive bandages (assorted sizes)
- 1 adhesive cloth tape (10 yards x 1 inch)
- 5 antibiotic ointment packets (approx. 1 gram)
- 2 packets of aspirin (81mg each)
- 1 emergency blanket
- 1 breathing barrier (with one-way valve)
- 1 Instant cold compress
- 2 pair of non-latex gloves (size: large)
- 2 hydrocortisone ointment packets (approx. 1 gram)
- 1 - 3in. gauze roll (roller) bandage
- 1 roller bandage (4 inches wide)
- 5 - 3in x 3in sterile gauze pads
- Oral thermometer (non-mercury/nonglass)
- 2 triangular bandage
- Tweezers
- Emergency First Aid instructions



# Emergency Preparedness Kit

In case of a disaster, a family should also have an emergency preparedness kit within easy reach. Place the items in a backpack or duffle bag, so it can be easily grabbed if necessary to evacuate your house. For supplies at home, the Red Cross recommends keeping enough non-perishable food and fresh water for two weeks.

Roles can be assigned to each member of a family to more quickly leave the house in case of emergency. One person should be in charge of calling for immediate help and another in charge of making sure pets are taken care of. Older children can make sure their younger siblings get out of bed and leave the house.

In the event of a sudden emergency, such as a fire, families should always have an established meeting place near their house where they can conduct a head count of members and further assess their situation.

The Red Cross recommends having the following items in an Emergency Preparedness Kit:

- One gallon of water per person
- Non-perishable, easy to prepare food items
- Flashlights
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio
- Spare batteries
- First aid kit
- Seven-day supply of medications & medical items
- Multi-purpose tool
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents; proof of address, insurance policies, medication lists, deed to home & passports
- Cell phone charger
- Family & Emergency contact information
- Extra Cash
- Emergency blanket

## Health Kits

People who flee their homes quickly often do not have time to pack essential items. Health kits can help maintain personal hygiene until they are able to return home or make arrangements.

Wrap smaller items in the washcloth; wrap washcloth and remaining items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn (no rubber bands). Do not enclose the kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

Include the following items in each health kit:

- 1 hand towel, dark color recommended
- 1 washcloth, dark color recommended
- 1 bath-size bar (4-5oz) soap, in original packaging
- 1 tube toothpaste, in original packaging
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail file or nail clippers with file attached, remove packaging (do not substitute cardboard emery boards for file)
- 6 Band-Aids (or similar brand), preferably 1/2" to 3/4"; secure together with a rubber band.

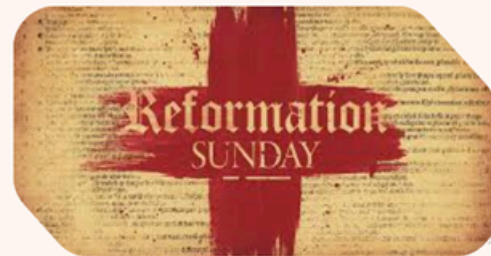
