


#### Port Stephens & Nelson Bay – Cruise Report

Not everyone has the luxury of TIME! Yes some of us have to work! That meant our planned trip to the Gold Coast for the 2018, Queensland, Whittley Regatta was restricted to two weeks of annual leave. This had to include, 3 days travel to get to the gold Coast, arriving at Couran Cove on the Wednesday 25 April, one day before the Regatta started to enjoy the Resort, we had 5 nights at Couran Cove, before heading south for a night in a caravan park in Arrawarra just north of Cofts Harbour. On Tuesday 1 May, 5 boats arrived at Port Stephens for a 4 night stay.



In the weeks before the Regatta we had contacted Angie and Alex Munz from the NSW & now Queensland, Whittley clubs and asked their recommendations for a cruise destination above or below Sydney to break our trip about half way home. They strongly recommended Port Stephens for its clear waters, great sheltered coves, wide rivers, safe accessible entrance, good boat ramps, good Marinas and great places to dine.

Unfortunately, we had lost two crew members from the 5 boats that planned the cruise on Port Stephens. Marisca Seinen had to fly home on Sunday 29 April to work and Dael Jackson had broken her hip while riding a bike at Couran Cove the day before the regatta. Dael missed the entire Regatta but we saw before we left for Port Stephens, at her sister's house on the Gold Coast, where she spent the following week recovering from a Hip replacement.

So we launched the boats at Soldiers Point boat ramp. It is a very good ramp for boats our size. Deep water, protected from the wind, with floating pontoon jetties on each side of the double ramp and a safe, well light vehicle and trailer parking area.


Figure 5 - Mahalo Hamering it across the glassy waters of Port Stephens off Nelson Bay

We cruised about 10 kms from soldiers point to Nelson Bay Marina, were we had reserved berths. Port Stephens is quite deep in places but has a shallow area in the middle of the bay. It is very well marked and corresponds to the maps we had purchased and the GPS. It is fed by 11 rivers, three that are navigable for our size boats, the Tilligrry, the Karuah and the Myall.



The entrance is wide, deep and quite accessible. There are four islands just outside the entrance, Shark, Little, Boondelbah and Cabbage Tree islands, which provide shelter when fishing. There are three large Marinas, Soldiers Point, Corlette and Nelson Bay. The biggest is at Nelson Bay and this also has the largest shopping centre, the most dining areas and shore accommodation.


That's where Lucky Us, found Ruby Tuesday, just after sunrise and they already had caught some great fish which Eric cooked for all of us as an entrée that night.

We came back to Nelson Bay in time for breakfast and a much needed coffee before heading off on our first cruise through Port Stephens and a kilometre past the Pacific Highway bridge up the Karuah River where we had some lunch. It is a very wide river but you have to be aware of the Oyster lease racks on the edge of the rivers and in the shallows of Port Stephens. They are everywhere and you must be carefully not to mistake the oyster rack poles for channel markers.




Figure 14 -Cabbage tree Island
