This work deals with the fear of being persecuted, hurt, or killed for being myself, but it also celebrates all of the gifts that this community has given me. The "in-between" is where I have found the most beautiful and amazing people who are just as heartbroken yet joyous as I am— and there is a shared beauty in authenticity and vulnerability.

The illusions our minds can fall for when we compare ourselves to one another can keep us blind from seeing our true selves. The in-between of being one foot in reality and one foot in your delusions can keep you isolated in that in-between limbo state and cut off from creating authentic connection.



The Diagnosis

To me the "In-Between" refers to those moments where you find yourself at the edge of a life changing discovery or decision. I drew this artwork in charcoal while waiting to do lab work just minutes after being told I was HIV + and it's an exact representation of how I felt at the time.

The woman sits alone at a bar while smoking a cigarette, she's alone and she's in deep thought. Maybe she's waiting for someone, or maybe that person had already come and gone. She's devastated, but she's also strong, she's not defeated. Right now she "In-Between" what she was and what she's supposed to be. She just needs to figure out how to get there.

Lovers in Blue: Friendship through the Sapphic Gaze #1 and #2

"Lovers in Blue: Friendship through the Sapphic Gaze" is a series of cyanotype prints inspired by a playful photoshoot of the artist's childhood friends taken during the COVID19 lockdown. Interposed between natural meadows and intimate living room settings, they evoke feelings of be(longing), adoration, and ambiguity, as the nature of the relationship between the figures shown in the images, the figures and the artist, and the figures and the viewer holds all the possibilities of romance, desire, and fantasy.

In sapphic friendships, desire, attraction, and romance can exist beyond the mandates of patriarchal and heteronormative scripts for relationships. They provide nurturing ground for relational fulfillment, interdependent care, and embodied pleasure that show us what sovereignty and liberation feels like. In her poem, "Dreaming of Lesbos", Tatiana de la Tierra writes of her eternal dream, to live in a planet of women, that "we always dream paradise, we make it ours. There, we find each other and live in our collective memory."

The "In-Between" of queer relationships is in the presence and beauty of existing in loving relationships as complex, queer, and interdependent as the earth's ecological webs. To witness each other, to play and be present in our nakedness, and to bring that eternal dream into being through our love and care for each other, is a timeless practice of world-making and a source of immense power that we fight to protect and embody every day as sappics.



When Will I Feel Complete?



This piece was created following a photographic project that I made in an effort to process my complicated emotions surrounding my tumultuous top surgery healing journey. The act of making this print brought together my two main areas of focus, photography and printmaking, and allowed me to explore and manipulate my photos further than I ever have before. Through six layers of silk screen and hand mixed inks I was able to

navigate what it meant to truly reconnect with my new body, and find peace in the most vulnerable fragments of myself. During its creation I was stuck in an uncomfortable in-between phase, but with the completion of this project I was able to move forward and find the peace I was so desperately searching for.



Light

We are brought into this world naked and vulnerable. The figure is nude and seated, with head turned away, and streams of light moving through them. While the figure may seem vulnerable in their nude state, stripped away of everything, this is when we see their true light. This piece looks at how in a state of complete vulnerability, naked to the world, potentially uncomfortable and exposed, it is at this moment that we really are our true selves, with nothing to hide.

To Drink Coffee Alone

The date on the painting reads "12/31", the day before the New Year. The figure sits, drinking coffee, surrounded by a thick black border, with unknown figures in the background. The painting poses many questions. "Is the figure lonely, drinking coffee, cut off from the outside world?" Or, "Is the figure comfortable drinking coffee alone, having found comfort in who they are, quiet and thoughtful in a state of growth and ready for the new age to come?"





The Cowpoke

The cowboy is seen as being tough and rugged, depicted as being a hyper-masculine figure. Yet this figure has a cracked face, and a barbed wire hat that is filled with flowers. The reality of the "hyper-masculine" cowboy isn't the truth. There are many people out there who fit the stereotype of the cowboy, but their true selves might be stuck behind a stiff face and a barbed wire hat. The title isn't "Cowboy" or "Cowgirl", it's "The Cowpoke" because anyone can be just that.

Wanderer Amongst the Fog

This painting explores the liminal space where queer intimacy, love, and community take shape. I'm drawn to moments that exist between definitions—where connection is neither entirely seen nor hidden, where tenderness and uncertainty intertwine.

The figures in this piece embrace in a way that is both protective and vulnerable. One figure's gaze meets the viewer, half-shielded by their lover's shoulder, as if caught between exposure and safety. The swirling forms surrounding them represent the intangible forces that shape queer relationships: memory, longing, resistance, and care. These ribbons act as both barriers and threads of connection, emphasizing how queer bonds exist within and beyond the constraints of societal expectation.

In this work, I explore how self acceptance is a form of love. The eroticization of myself to myself becomes a way to embrace my queerness. For me, this work is about the spaces we carve out for ourselves and each other—where belonging isn't given but created, where love thrives in its own language, and where being seen is an act of both courage and tenderness.




Closeness in You

The In-between means many things to me, specifically being a pansexual and nonbinary person. I fall in a place where our country's hetero culture doesn't understand. There appear to be these clear markers set by our society of gay or straight, male or female and my identity is both or neither. After moving to Texas I was able to find my queer community. They helped me discover things about myself that I never would have realized on my own. My artwork "Closeness in You" is a collage or memory of myself discovering and accepting my nonbinary identity. The metamorphosis of becoming who I was meant to be all along. The feeling of being seen, the first time my partner used my pronouns. This piece is a love letter to the queer community of Texas. The softness and kindness I received from them. Knowing that they see me and accept me and in return I see them and accept them. The focal point of this piece is a caterpillar going through metamorphosis. This speaks to me in many ways as a queer person in the South. Growing into who I was meant to become and helping my loved ones in their journeys. I also used icon Texas imagery like the monarch butterfly and blue bonnets. found and ethically sourced by me in Texas.

There Are Universes in You

This piece created in 2023, is an exploration of my newly discovered nonbinary identity. "There Are Universes in You" is made up of three layers. The viewer looks through the clouds and rippled glass revealing the piece's inner mechanism. The moveable circles, the focal point of the work, calls attention to the different phases or the magical parts of our life. The turning of the inner mechanism is symbolic of a pattern of moments and experiences entering and leaving our lives. The third layer is a mirror bouncing our reflection back Reminding the viewer that they are seen and are still themselves no matter what passes.



The Dinner Table

To be queer is to struggle, or so the media says. We wake up, have breakfast, and get ready for work or school. And from the minute we walk out the front door into society, we are put under a microscope as our identities are examined and probed. We are representatives thrown into the fray until we come back home, and the world can forget we ever existed.

This narrative isolates us and wrongly suggests that queer people lose everything to live their truth. But we eat at the dinner table with our families and friends just like any other person. In-between the moments we live in agony are the times we find happiness. The meals I share with my family, at a dinner table that has over the years seen our relationship crackle and calm, are my reminders that I and my existence are loved.

Golden Child

"Golden Child" embodies the experience of coming out. Posture is regal with the pride of self-knowing. Legs crossed in timidity. The rainbow emanates beautifully, the figure refracting through the colors.





Self-Intimacy

"The In-Between" is the intimate space where self-exploration meets self-realization. This series of drawings depicts positions in which I self-soothe — holding my own hand, feeling my own warmth, accepting my own love — showing myself how I can provide the nurturing care that I so craved. The body acts as a symbol of the queer experience; how this marginalized community must bend and console itself in a world that does not treat it as kindly.

"Hold Your Breath" + "Don't Tell" Diptych

The queer experience can be complicated for those from religious backgrounds. These two pieces, "Hold Your Breath" and "Don't Tell", narrate a story of being in "The In-Between" of a religious childhood home and a queer adulthood reckoning. The water acts as a visual metaphor of floating in "The In-Between.




Sing Echo

This piece is inspired by the myth of Narcissus, a youth who fell insatiably in love after glimpsing an intoxicatingly beautiful man.

This photo was taken at Ladies' Night at Sahara Lounge, which quickly became me and a bunch of my queer girl friends favorite place to dance. This photo is of my friend Claire, a queen of Ladies' Night, dancing away probably to Abba. This night is a monthly ritual for my friends for the eclectic atmosphere of Sahara Lounge and its beautiful diversity. Something hard to find in Austin sometimes. When we go we dance in a circle for hours until they kick us out. This photo is intimate and dynamic in the layers of color, light, and subject. It was taken on sole admiration for Claire and her contagious joy at an intimate angle. It shows who we are in the dark sometimes just needs a light from someone else to shine on.





Getting ready with your girls is the most exciting part of the night. Full of anticipation, gossip, and stress we all get ready for wherever the night takes us. This is my friend Chrissy who I caught mid sentence sitting so nicely and patiently in a trashed bathroom. I couldn't have ever discovered who I was without my friends hyping me up on my outfit before a party. We need people close who make us feel good about ourselves when we want to try something new, and better yet who go do it with us.

firmament

I love how "The In-Between" theme seems to center around queer community, intimacy and love. I feel those concepts have been especially and consistently relevant in my life as a gay trans man. The three pieces I am submitting in turn seem to follow these three facets of queer belonging- this first piece representing community. I made this first piece as an anniversary gift for my best friend and their partner, who I met through a trans support group when I first came to Austin. We all have been close friends together for the past six years, and have always been there for eachother during our best and worst times. My friend's partner has realized more recently that she's trans, while I myself have made milestones in my own transition. I feel that these friends are my chosen family and am so grateful to have known eachother through our respective gender journeys.



dream scene

This second piece centers around sexuality and intimacy as a gay trans man; I was inspired by a dream I had of my partner (at the time) and I, where we were laying naked on a beach together in the sun. It felt so real and calming, everything was white and warm and bright yet fresh. It's not often I've felt that way, so the dream and memory stood out to me. It reminds me that there are moments where I can feel entirely safe and happy with myself and loved ones as a trans man. The background image of the print is a still from gay filmmaker Derek Jarman's film Sebastiane, in which there's a montage of two men playing in water and embracing eachother. It's another rare moment I wanted to cherish and printembracing all the sensitivity and gentleness in my identity as a gay trans man.

ANDY DEAN

attrition

This last piece I made in Spring 2023, almost 7 months before I would get top surgery. At the time I didn't know when I would be able to get top surgery; I had worked for years throughout high school and in college to save upwards of \$5000 for my surgery. I lost all of my saved funds to an unexpected financial setback in 2021, and tried to schedule a surgery date in 2022, only to be set back again because I couldn't afford to pay the deposit at the time. By then I had been wanting and working towards surgery for almost 9 years, and was feeling utterly defeated. I knew though that in order to get surgery though. I would have to continue no matter what. I would have to make peace with myself pre-surgery, I would have to keep working to afford my surgery, and I would just have to keep surviving until I got to that surgery. This piece embodies the height of my feelings of both helplessness and hopefulness in my transition, two feelings I often felt simultaneously.

My current body of work helps me navigate the world. After moving home to a small island off North Carolina, I found myself scared to leave the house, wary of running into locals who proudly support the current administration. I'd spent nine summers waitressing and bartending at a local restaurant, where I was harassed by customers and employees alike. Despite being female-run, the environment was hostile—and I was told to lighten up when I pushed back.

I've never felt at home here, yet I've found one in the community of others who never fit the mold. Together we grow, resist, and reclaim our power. Sometimes, fighting back means stepping away from what harms you.

On a walk, I read a plaque about how freshwater plants are protected by surrounding trees—a metaphor for resilient Southern communities that thrive despite stereotypes. My piece, Southern Live Oak Hammock, depicts platonic love, shelter, and interconnectedness. Native plants symbolize our growth, and fragmented figures ask what we give and take in relationships.
