NOISY OFFERING: SEW FOR HOPE

Some of you might have wondered what's behind the door at the far end of The Rev. Emory Hingst Fellowship Hall. Way back in the day, it was Emory's office. Later it became a choir office and rehearsal space. For the past few years, though, it has been filled with ingredients for quilts. The group called Sew for Hope meets at St. Stephen the first and third Saturdays of the month to carry out its mission: making quilts for children. Last Sunday, as part of the Outreach Committee's Ministry Minute series, Sew for Hope coordinator Sandra Tate spoke words of appreciation and invitation during the liturgy. When the group was born in 2008, she said, its goal was to provide a blanket for every child at the Hope Community – now known as Family Promise of the Big Bend.

"We continue to serve children at Family Promise," Sandra said. "Each child gets to choose a quilt that is theirs to keep. In 2010 we expanded our mission to the Migrant Farm Worker Summer Daycare Program in Quincy. For a period we made weighted therapy blankets for children with autism or trauma. We've donated blankets to various agencies around Tallahassee. We even sent blankets to a quilter in North Carolina after Hurricane Helene devastated the area."

One of her messages Sunday was "Thank you" to St. Stephen: "For sharing space with us, for your kindness, for your support and for your interest in what we do." She also invited us to take part: "Know how to sew? Come. Want to learn? Come on. Want to iron, fold or cut fabric? We have a job for you. We happily welcome you, just as you have welcomed us."



There may be other things since the majority is throwing everything out there that they can think of."


