'IT'S BEEN THE PERFECT MATCH'

Twenty-two years after moving to Tallahassee, and 13 years after St. Stephen wisely hired her as office manager, Lori Zengel is moving away. After next week, she'll be using up some days off, and her last official day on the job will be July 31. But we didn't want to wait until the last minute to start our celebration of Lori's time with us. Everyone who has dealt with her at church agrees that she's top-notch.



It was 2003 when the Zengels moved here from Columbia, South Carolina. Husband Scott took a job as an environmental scientist. Lori was pregnant and confined to bed rest.

Before this job, Lori always had run after-school programs for at-risk kids. Hartsfield Elementary's after-school program is where she met Sue Williams, who in 2012 told her about St. Stephen's office vacancy. "I didn't know I'd even want a job like this," Lori recalled. "I was used to helping kids."

But after some challenges during their baby's early years, Lori changed her mind and happily snagged the

church job. "I could do the job effectively and not take it home," she said. She started in August 2012, succeeding Karen Dennis.

Now, as she prepares to leave the job, Lori says: "I feel like it's been the perfect match." She's had three good bosses: Pastor Marda Messick, interim Pastor Mary Nesmith and, since 2018, Pastor Tom Holdcraft. She has enjoyed the job's flexibility, the church members' thoughtfulness and genuineness, the scarcity of workplace drama and the quickness of people to offer their help – though Lori concedes she rarely asks for help. Her reputation among Church Council members and others is that Lori can handle just about anything – and that if she doesn't know how, she'll look it up.

Early on, before COVID, she had this dream team of weekly volunteers: Harriet Temanson, Edita Joshua and Martha Marky. "Having Martha here was so helpful with all things related to the Altar Guild," she said. Part of the Friday-morning routine was preparing the Sunday bulletins and changing the banners in preparation for the liturgy. Who better than Martha to be her mentor? And Martha still comes by at least once a week.

Actually, when it comes to help from the congregation, large and small, there are too many examples to fit here. Like Caroline Collins always picking up the altar flowers on Fridays when Lori was out of town. And when Lori took over the bookkeeping duties, there was Jennifer Dritt providing support and oversight during the transition – and Karen Olson helpfully pointing out how the financial information could be organized in a way that was easier for members to digest.

Now, for the Zengels, it's time for a change. Daughter Zoey, who's interested in a career as a crime-scene investigator, is sticking around here to wrap up her

education. But Lori and Scott are moving to North Carolina. They'll live in Brevard (here's a photo of their view), where they'll be perfectly situated to help her aging parents and visit her sister in Charlotte. Besides North Carolina's multiple other charms, its politics also suit the Zengels just fine, for a variety of reasons.



Let's just say the Free State of Florida was not a great match.

Asked whether she could recommend any changes for her successor in the church office, or if there were any negatives to the job that she wanted to report, she said she couldn't think of any. "I feel very blessed to be here," she said. "St. Stephen came to me at a time when I didn't know I needed it. If I could pick it up and take it to Brevard with me, I would."


