


# GOD BLESS YOU FOR YOUR CONTINUED SUPPORT

#### **NOISY OFFERING: HAITIAN CHRISTIAN MINISTRIES**

St. Stephen members Rudy and Susan Hehn were the Ministry Minute speakers last Sunday. They first went to Haiti in 2011 and returned three years later. As many of you know, Rudy worked as a family physician in Thomasville for 20 years and then became a hospitalist. Susan worked as a registered nurse and later as director of children's ministries at First Presbyterian. They began attending St. Stephen in 2018. Here are excerpts from the notes Rudy typed up.

Our first trip to Haiti was sponsored by First Presbyterian Church in Thomasville. This was a year after Haiti had been devastated by an earthquake. The church had been destroyed and they were worshipping under a tarp with wooden benches. This was also our medical clinic. It was rewarding that we could offer a glimmer of hope and prayer. It was also discouraging, as the needs were overwhelming, and it seemed our brief visit offered no long-term solutions.

[The second trip, in 2012, was with a group called Haitian Christian Ministries.] Once again we saw overwhelming poverty and need. Electricity would come and go. Some areas had plumbing, some did not. Transportation was challenging. But this trip was different. The Haitians had built a church, basic but solid. There was a concrete block school, and there was a one-room medical clinic attached to that. They had a generator and a central water spigot. And working with the kids was amazing....

On Sunday we joined the Haitians in worship. The church was filled with music. Communion wafers came wrapped in tin foil to avoid spreading cholera. We didn't understand the language but it didn't matter. I got teary.

This trip was different for Susan and me because we saw an opportunity for change. HCM had been working in Haiti since 1989. Their mission statement is "Only the hope found in Jesus has the power to transform lives, families and communities." They have three goals: teach the word of God, plant churches and meet the physical needs of the people.



They started with a single church pastored by a Haitian minister. They now help to support eight churches, a medical clinic and three schools with 1,600 students. The schools are K-12 and center on learning skills, reading and math. Students get one hot meal a day, which is sometimes the only meal they get. They also get worm

medicine, immunizations, vitamins and medical care.

We support HCM because we believe they are making a difference in Haiti. The church communities are transforming the Word of God into better lives for Haitians, especially for Haitian children. The volunteer staff have a personal connection with the churches in Haiti. Despite the chaotic environment in Haiti, the dysfunctional government, and the logistical challenges, they've been able to get materials and funds to the right places. We've seen the results. The goal of the churches is to become financially independent, but right now they still need our help....

We'd like to go back, but all trips are suspended for now because of the risk of travel to Haiti. However, we're continuing our financial support. Of the 1,600 students, about half have a U.S. sponsor. If you're interested, it's \$35 a month to support a child. [Not \$40, as the flyers at church indicated.]

St. Stephen's Noisy Offering is this Sunday, and the proceeds will all go toward Haitian Christian Ministries. So come prepared! The irrepressible Rita Ford and her Thanksgiving guests will be celebrating the


holiday not at home but in our fellowship hall.

## 'DON'T BE ALARMED': EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... You are perhaps, like me, imagining some very dark times approaching. People I care about are being threatened. I know it is the same for you. Let me assure you, none of this is new, and one of the worst things we can do is separate from one another. The urge is to run away or seclude ourselves, but that's what the liars and deceivers want.

Jesus said, "Many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' And they will lead many astray." Jesus goes on to say, "Don't be alarmed. This must take place, but it will not be the end. It's the beginning of birth pangs."

And birthing is dangerous. Our task, then, is to keep our hearts true; hold fast to the hope Jesus gives; and provoke one another with love and good deeds. We are not the first to experience times like these, but we are prepared, and not alone; God is still with us.
