Terri Albrecht-Schmitt wanted you to know that thousands of concerned Floridians will rally outside the Old Capitol on Monday in support of public education. Why now? Because the legislative session is about to begin. These supporters plan to demand improved funding for students and schools, fair pay for all education employees, and an end to policies that have led to the over-testing of students and the loss of local control in school districts.

Here's the schedule for Jan. 13:

- 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Buses arriving from across the state at the Civic Center.
- 12:30 p.m. Feeder marches begin from FAMU and FSU.
- 1:30 p.m. March from Civic Center to Florida's Old Capitol
- 2 to 4 p.m. Take On Tallahassee Rally at Old Capitol.
- **10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.** Trolleys will shuttle between Civic Center and Capitol for those needing assistance.


