GET READY FOR A BIG MEETING JAN. 24

Mark those calendars for Jan. 24 at 11:30 a.m., when we'll gather in person and on Zoom for our January congregational meeting. During the meeting we'll vote on the 2021 financial budget presented by the Church Council; elect officials to Council; and vote on moving forward with the construction and renovation project in the sanctuary. (See more about that project below.)

All people from the worship community are welcome to attend, but only members are permitted to vote. If you'd like to be in church in person, please let Office Manager Lori Zengel or me know.

NOW, ABOUT THAT BIG PROJECT...

We caught a glimpse of the Building Design Team in action Sunday, during the latest Zoom update on our sanctuary repair and renovation project. (In case you missed Sunday's meeting and want to catch up on it, here's a link:

Providing an overview, committee leader Denise Bookwalter said the main focus is fixing the sanctuary structure - you know, the "roof thrusting" we've heard so much about. At the same time, the committee is exploring options for improving the interior view of our stained glass, making our building "greener" and possibly taking steps to bring it up to code, where feasible.

Lots of fact-gathering has been going on. There've been discussions with the architect. Huddles with the Church Council. Conversations about everything from flooring to "hurricane straps." Talks with the worship team about acoustics and more. As Denise said, the goal is to be transparent and open.

At the Jan. 24 meeting, we'll get an estimate on how much this project is likely to cost. Pastor Tom repeated that, so far, we have more than \$120,000 in gifts and pledges for the upcoming work. Treasurer Jennifer Dritt gave an overview of congregational finances – which seem healthy, especially considering we're in the middle of a global pandemic.

Congregation President Val Sullivan said a capital campaign will be launched Jan. 24 but assured us that "we will only do what we can afford." Later in the meeting, St. Stephen member Karen Olson urged congregational leaders not to be shy about asking for what we need to do a thorough job. Some potential donors might be inspired to give if they know more about the various options under consideration, she said.

It was an inspiring meeting – and it's important that all of us show up for the next step on Jan. 24. If you have more questions before the upcoming congregational meeting, ask Denise or Pastor Tom. (You'll find their contact information in your church directory. If you've lost yours, check with Lori.)

Many thanks to our congregational leaders. May God continue to bless your work in our behalf.

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AN ALTERNATIVE WAY TO DONATE

In this age of technology and the internet, a weekly envelope in the offering plate is no longer the only way to donate to the church. Many members of the congregation are now making their offerings using a Venmo app. Here's another way.



In general, for those who are retired and have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA), funds may be withdrawn without penalty. Any distribution to the account owner is taxable income. Funds that are directly distributed to a "qualified charitable organization," however, are not considered taxable income.

This becomes particularly relevant when the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) takes effect.

This occurs when the owner of the IRA reaches age $70\frac{1}{2}$. (A law signed in 2019 says that if your 70th birthday is July 1, 2019, or later, you don't have to take withdrawals until you reach age 72.)

The RMD for any given year is based upon the balance of the account at the end of the prior calendar year and a factor on a life expectancy table. At least that amount must be distributed from the account by the end of the year to avoid paying a penalty. The account owner may direct the brokerage firm to send designated amounts to a church, such as St. Stephen, or other qualified charities, thus fulfilling some portion of the RMD tax-free.

(I'm not a tax expert. You're advised to do your own research and seek advice from those knowledgeable about retirement plans and tax laws.)

'GOD LET LOOSE IN THE WORLD': EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

"... This past week we encountered a shaking in the foundation of our own government and society. Zealots, insurrectionists and thugs stormed into the sacred spaces of our democracy and stained our history of over 200 years of peaceful transfer of power. We watched from the safety of our homes but felt the panic as the people in the Capitol were under attack – driven by conspiracy theories, lies and a man who cannot accept defeat even when it means people's lives are threatened.

"What are we to do with this as people of faith? It is tempting to load our own weapons and fight for the good that we know exists in the world, yet this violence would only beget more violence. As people of faith, we looked for God in the crisis and we saw the Holy Spirit in those charged with the solemn duty to protect the innocent. I saw the work of God in the determination of senators and representatives to reconvene in order to complete their task of certifying a fair election. In one moment, it looked like everything had fallen apart and turned to dust by these hundreds of rioters and terrorists attempting a coup, but then beauty came out of the ruins.

"Evil flexed its very real muscle and for a brief moment assumed its victory, but not for long. For we saw God let loose in the world. The movement of the Spirit in our midst...."
