THIS NEW COMMITTEE IS REACHING OUT

God's loving outreach to the world has been active at St. Stephen for years – especially through our work with ECHO backpacks, Leon County Schools' Giving Tree and Manna on Meridian, a joint food ministry with other local congregations. These are continuing programs. The newly formed Outreach Committee - made up of Janet Barber, Caroline Collins, Barbara Ehlmann, Pastor Tom, Erin Kenney, Mike Martinez, Andrea Notley, Cassandra White and me – has begun identifying ways to expand the hand of God into other areas of our community.

Manna on Meridian needs help with collection and distribution of food bags. If this program speaks to your heart, please contact Mike (850-443-4498) so he can get you trained and on the schedule. COVID safety protocols are enforced at Faith Presbyterian, where Manna items are stored, so be sure you have your mask in place.



The Outreach Committee has researched and will implement continuous



support of the Going Places Street Outreach Program and Drop-in Center, one of several programs operated by Capital City Youth Services. Going Places works with young people ages 11-21 who are LGBTQ+, homeless,

runaways and/or sex-trafficked. Approximately 30% are living on the street, and CCYS staff members take them needed supplies. The Drop-in Center offers a safe space where the young people can study, shower, wash their clothes and have a snack. By next week, a plastic container labeled "Going Places" will be in the fellowship hall. When you drop off your Manna food or church offerings, please consider dropping off supplies for Going Places as well (see list below). Even though our congregation can't gather yet, we can hold our community and especially our children in our hearts.

The committee is also trying to enlist other churches to work with us on the car-seat ministry of Lutheran Social Services of North Florida. Since COVID has forced LSSNF to scale back its fundraising efforts, it's looking for help in continuing this program that provides car seats free of charge to families in need.



We'll continue to support and promote the Justice and Mercy Initiative coordinated by Pastor Tom. Thanks to the support of St. Stephen members, we help local families meet crucial needs. Please remember to contribute when you can – whether through financial contributions, pledged giving or gift cards for gas or Publix.



FAMILIAR NAMES

Dave Suhrweir also passed this item along. The following people were mentioned in a recent edition of the newsletter Takeaways From Tallahassee.

 Pastor Tom was quoted on legislation that would require Florida employers to provide paid family leave to employees: "Having to choose between your newborn and your paycheck is an impossible, immoral choice, but it's reality for too many working families. It's one that I have faced as well as many in the pews." (Jon Harris Maurer, public policy director with Equality Florida, applauded Pastor Tom's statement in an email to Cheryl Stuart and Dave. Maurer was our RIC Sunday keynote speaker in 2019.)



State Sen. Shevrin Jones, our keynote speaker at last year's RIC Sunday luncheon, is one of the legislators proposing to bar candidates from seeking office if they owe certain unpaid fines or are under the scope of the Commission on Ethics. "This bill is an important step in reforming a system that's enabled special interests to game the system in their favor and further stack the deck against real people," he said. Jones, whose district includes southeastern Broward County, is the first openly LGBT black person elected to the Florida Legislature.

'IF YOU STICK YOUR NECK OUT': EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SUNDAY SERMON

"... This teaching [Mark 8:31-38] is what scholars call the Passion Prediction. This is the first time in Mark that Jesus makes such a teaching. But it is not good for business, Jesus. The disciples didn't want to hear this, and preachers do not want to deliver sermons on the topic of selflessness and discipleship, especially when it is connected to giving away the treasures we store up in our closets, bank vaults, and in our hearts.

"Yet, this is exactly what Jesus openly taught. Followers of Christ set their minds on divine things, not on human things. The hard truth is given — the road to messianic glory runs through Golgotha, and the disciples are following Jesus to a cross.

"In a moment we will sing 'I Want Jesus to Walk With Me,' but Jesus will not walk with us if we do not walk the path of the Way. If we are not on the pilgrim way, Jesus will not walk with thee. The truth is, what Jesus taught here is ... the reality that suffering will occur when one does the things that Jesus did.

"If you speak out against the empire, be ready for persecution. If you stand up for people that are cast out as second-class citizens by the government, you may be beaten down with a baton. If you stick your neck out to stop racism or demand common-sense gun legislation, the guillotine's gonna fall on you...."
