- Jobs for kids: attaching toothpaste and toothbrushes, tearing handles off grocery bags, breaking down smaller boxes (jumping on them seems to be the favored method).

# THIS QUILT COULD BE YOURS

"This has been a particularly busy week," Executive Director Dottie Hinkle said the other day, "with 15 child safety seats being delivered for infants and children living in vulnerable families in our hometown. Some are arriving to begin a new life after enduring unbelievable situations around the world; some are local soon-to-be parents; and others are transitioning to a forward-facing safety seat because their toddlers have outgrown their 'baby' seat. All are extremely grateful for this assistance as they struggle to provide the basic necessities."

We had many great memories here at St. Stephen. We had cantatas. I remember one time Don was supposed to say "Feed my sheep" and he said "Feed my feet." The show went on! Of course, he loved the talent shows. And decorating. We decorated with members of the church here so many years – Christmas and Easter.

... His last few days here on earth, I would read the Bible to him every night ... and I would sing to him. [Nathan sang the chorus of "Coming Home," then asked everyone there to sing it with him.] I think it would just be a nice way to honor Don. 'Coming home, coming home, never more to roam. Open wide thine arms of love, Lord, I'm coming home."


At the 2022 Churchwide Assembly, the body directed the Churchwide Council to form the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church (CRLC). The CRLC was charged with reconsidering the statements of purpose for each of the three expressions of the ELCA (churchwide, synod and congregation) and the principles of its organizational structure, being particularly attentive to our shared commitment to dismantle racism. The CRLC is to bring recommendations to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly. I was appointed as one of 35 people on the commission. As part of this work, the CRLC is seeking input via an online survey. 
some copies to bring to church soon, so you can get a glimpse.
