AS HOLY WEEK APPROACHES

- PALMS: The palms for Palm Sunday – which is this Sunday – are ready for pickup in this lowly bucket under the big oak tree in front of our church, just like last year.
- MAUNDY THURSDAY: From noon to 1 p.m. on Maundy Thursday (April 1, one week from today), Pastor Tom will



be in the church parking lot to offer drive-up prayer and communion. Please come by during that time for fellowship and prayer and to receive the sacrament. The Maundy Thursday service is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. and will also include the celebration of communion. If you wish to partake of the Meal via Zoom, have your bread and wine/grape juice elements ready for worship.

A LITERAL WALK WITH JESUS: Walking with Jesus is what we're called to do this and every Easter season. This year we'll really be able to walk with Jesus on his way to the cross by following numbered ribbons with readings from the Gospel of John. This walk with Jesus will be available on Maundy Thursday during drive-through communion until the Saturday before Easter and will allow you to socially distance at stages around the St. Stephen property. 'THIS TENACIOUS AND PERSISTENT GOD': EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

(Jeremiah 31: 31-34)

"... I have come to find a fresh appreciation for this text from Jeremiah because I used to think that the writing of the covenant on the people's hearts was said and done in the past. But that is not so, is it? If the prophecy had been fulfilled, then there would be no need for rabbis, no need for pastors, no need for imams, no need for any religious teacher, because everyone would already know, it would be written on people's hearts, and there would be no need to teach about God.

"It wasn't fulfilled, because we still need them, yet we know what Jeremiah



meant with this promise of covenant written on people's hearts. We know the truth when we hear it, we know the gospel when it is professed, and we know that death is not the be-all end-all.

"All this really means is that the writing of the covenant on the hearts of human beings happened in the past, it happens in the present and it will need to continue to happen in the future. The promise that 'the days are surely

coming' is still a look toward hope for us as we lean in to know this tenacious and persistent God who is coming, and we are left to learn to wait for it "
