The Capital City Youth Services-Going Places container for supplies is in the fellowship hall. CCYS-Going Places continues to need backpack-size snacks, juice boxes, individual bottles of water, socks,

new underwear (male/female), shorts, T-shirts, laundry detergent, and toiletries (shampoo, deodorant, soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes) in all sizes. The International Rescue Committee continues to welcome new residents to Tallahassee from around the world. They need housewares, linens, blankets, furniture (beds, tables, chairs, couches), children's clothing, baby clothing and supplies (diapers, changing tables), children's board games and children's books (any age). You can bring small items to the fellowship hall with my name on them and I'll deliver them. If you'd like to deliver smaller items yourself, contact IRC representative Karen Duncan at Kduncan.irc@gmail.com and she'll set up an appointment. Contact her at the same email to set up pickup/delivery of furniture.

WORSHIPPING ONLINE

For two years now, starting when COVID kept us confined to our homes, St. Stephen has been providing virtual worship. In recent months, as the CDC has lifted many of its restrictions, more of our members and friends are gradually returning to in-person worship. So you might be wondering how many people these days are viewing our liturgy via Facebook Live.

You won't be surprised to learn that Pastor Tom has been tracking the numbers.

"About 15 people watch the service live," he said this week. "Most log off after the sermon. By noon, the numbers are up to about 35" – meaning that some people watch the recorded liturgy later on – "and by Monday the count is around 50. We have no way of knowing how long these viewers stay watching."

Don't worry, online fans: Pastor Tom and the Worship Committee agree that we're getting enough watchers to continue this important ministry.

A POETIC LINE FROM PASTOR'S SERMON

Each parable is about God's reckless love for all humanity.



ALL ABOUT 'PRODIGAL': EXCERPT FROM SUNDAY'S SERMON

"It is not found in the text. 'Prodigal' is part of the title of the [Prodigal Son] parable, added years later, and not in the parable itself. Who knows what 'prodigal' means? You're hesitant. So was I! So I looked it up and found I missed knowing what it means. I thought it had something to do with lost or wandering or sinful, but it means 'a person who spends money recklessly or in extravagant ways; wastefully extravagant.' It's an adjective that can be used to describe the actions of the son [in this parable], but it can also be an adjective used to describe the actions of the father. Stay with me a second, if you think I am just reaching here. Just think, when we take all three parables [from Chapter 15 of Luke] into account, we find some very reckless and extravagantly wasteful heroes and heroines.



"The shepherd was reckless to leave the 99 to go and find the one lost sheep, yet he is the hero. The woman was extravagantly wasteful to throw a party just because she found one of her lost silver coins, yet she is the heroine. And then there's the father in the third parable ... who recklessly gave an inheritance to the young son and then was extravagantly wasteful to throw a massive celebration at his return. The father is the hero for the forgiveness and grace poured out. And that is exactly what God does.

"Shepherd, woman and father all exhibit attributes of who God is and what God does. I don't think this is the Parable of the Prodigal Son. This is the Parable of the Prodigal God. The Parable of God's Extravagant Waste. Poured out and lavished on people who are lost and hurting. Each parable today and the red thread that runs through all the lessons teaches us about God's reckless love for all humanity."
