TELLING THE EASTER STORY

Once again, it's the high holy season of the Christian calendar – the festival celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus. Music, flowers, crowds of visitors all proclaim a surging sense of new life.

And once again, ministers find themselves wrestling with the age-old dilemma of finding new ways to tell the same story. In some respects, the Easter message is a minister's delight – so profound, upbeat and exciting that it can hardly fall flat. In other respects, it represents the preacher's greatest challenge.

"It's almost scarier to preach on Easter than any other Sunday," said the Rev. Sara Holben, associate pastor of Faith Presbyterian Church. "It is scary because it is so familiar sometimes people come and tune it out."

On one level, ministers said, they're telling a straightforward story of a love so strong it overcomes death. On another level, the message is so astonishing it transcends any efforts at human interpretation. To complicate matters further, Holben noted, the visitors who come only once a year hear only one chapter of that story. They've missed the preparation of Lent, the mourning of Good Friday.

So how do you nurture the mature believer, while reaching out to throngs of people who come only once a year – and whose faith is perhaps a marginal affair? Deep inside, Holben believes, all her listeners retain a haunting sense of their separation from God – a knowledge that they aren't what they were meant to be, and a longing for reconciliation.

"We have all done wrong, and we all need to know that there is love and hope...," agreed the Rev. Bob Tindale

of Killearn United Methodist Church. "Easter is, of all holidays, certainly the symbol of that hope."


