
READY TO WORSHIP IN PERSON AGAIN?

With immense joy, the Worship Committee announces the resumption of live worship beginning this Sunday. We'll be following the updated guidelines that the CDC provided last week: It's safe for people who are fully vaccinated to resume activities without masks. What incredible news for St. Stephen. People

who are not fully vaccinated still need to wear masks to protect against disease, since the virus continues to exist. We won't police mask-wearing, but we request that you follow the CDC guidelines.

What does that mean for St. Stephen? We'd like to take a cautious approach as we resume congregating. That includes asking everyone to wear a mask when we're singing together; having communion once per month rather than every week; waving at each other or bumping elbows rather than shaking hands or hugging during the Sharing of the Peace; forgoing the nursery and children's time temporarily; and using SignUpGenius.com to reserve a place for your in-person attendance which will also allow us to arrange and assign seating for family

SPEAKING OF THE SANCTUARY ...

As we wait for the engineer to specifically update blueprints, which hopefully will be completed this week, the Interior Design Team has made some important decisions. We met Tuesday with Tabitha from MLD Architects and her intern for two hours in the church. We began with the lighting engineer. Thanks to prior planning from Ann Hingst and David Butler, our team passed our wants to the lighting expert.

After that, Denise Bookwalter, Jim Sampson, David, Ann and I looked over varieties of flooring and paint colors. We asked for a quote to install carpet squares on the entire floor with vinyl wood laminate in the chancel area to match the communion rails. We also asked for a quote to use carpet squares throughout the long portion of the sanctuary and vinyl wood laminate in the "alcoves." The second bid will be more expensive, but we wanted to know our options.

The Interior Design Team is proposing we remove the installation of ceiling fans from the original work order – for aesthetic and virus-spread-risk reasons. You'll hear (and see) more when the Church Council has the chance to approve the sub-team's selections.



By the way ... at the Council meeting Sunday, Treasurer Jen Dritt reported that St. Stephen (thanks be to God and you, God's faithful givers) is receiving plate offerings that meet our budget requirements. Every separate financial gift given to the capital campaign remains secure for the repair and renovation work those gifts were meant for. What a great gift of generosity your donations have made to St. Stephen!


community-service points can earn them through this program.


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A CIRCULAR SWIRL OF NONSTOP COLOR

Perhaps the most dazzling stop in last weekend's tour of gardens benefiting Friends of Maclay Gardens was a colorful corner of Florida State University. FSU's labyrinth was created several years ago, but this year its plants have really hit their stride. One of the people responsible is Jake Hartung. He was on hand last Friday and Saturday to answer questions from roughly 200 visitors – and he took the photo above, which shows only about a third of the giant labyrinth.

"My role is to supervise the maintenance and planting of everything that goes



into gardens on campus," Jake said. "I organize other crews to trim and pull weeds, but I really like to plant flowers; so I had my hands on everything that was planted at the labyrinth. This garden contains around 600 plants and at least 20 different varieties of plants.

"When it was created, soil was trucked in to create a raised garden and boulders were brought in by crane. I didn't get to draw the design, but I was involved with choosing the color palette and purchasing the flowers. These flowers are constantly updated and swapped out, just like at Disney – normally just a little at a time, but with major transitions in spring and fall. I love the creative vibes that flow through this garden,

and the fact that it provides a sense of peace and calm." God's work, Jake's green thumbs.
