MEANINGFUL MOMENTS AT SYNOD ASSEMBLY

This year the Synod Assembly was in person for the first time in 1,091 days. What a joy to be with almost 350 other members of the ELCA. Our major responsibility was to elect ministers and lay people to vacant synod-wide positions. Of the many meaningful moments, two stood out for Mark and me.

Keynote speaker Luis Torres, pictured right, addressed bias and prejudice.

Christians, he said, must demonstrate how to challenge bias in ways that lead to discussions, not shouting matches. The first step is recognizing that humans have been inherently biased since prehistoric times - suspicious of those outside your immediate clan because they could pose a danger. Even now, each of us belongs to many "clans" or



groups. The first step is recognizing which groups you belong to. Torres belongs to at least six: male, heterosexual, married, Puerto Rican, educated and Catholic. Being a member of a group can bring privilege to you, he said, or bring prejudice against you. "What happens when you call someone a racist?" he asked. The other person gets defensive, and all options for discussion are lost. He urged us to be agents for discussion in continually challenging bias in our communities.

The other meaningful moment? For that one you'll have to wait a few days. It's going to be part of Pastor Tom's sermon this Sunday. Pretty powerful.

By the way, Pastor Jenn from Grace Lutheran was elected to the Synod Council for our area. Also, Pastor Tom was elected to the synod Discipline Committee. The latter sounded pretty grim to me. Then I realized such a committee needed someone who could listen without judging, was compassionate and made decisions only after much prayer. Sound like someone you know?

The first picture shows Blake in her contest entry as Rian, from the Netflix show "The





Every week, WFSU-FM provides an audio snippet from community members telling about ways they're inspired. Featured last week was St. Stephen member Mark Mustian. Here's what he had to say.

I'm Mark Mustian. I'm an author and president of the Word of South Festival. I'm



a lawyer, husband, father, resident of Tallahassee for 50-plus years. We moved to Tallahassee when I was 5, and I went to school here, went away to college and law school, came back about three years later and I've been here ever since. I've been fortunate enough to have had a few novels published. And the last one that was published, I got invited to these literary festivals around the country. I had never been to one, and I went and said, "God, these are great. We should do something like this in Tallahassee."

I was on the City Commission then, and I decided I needed to get off [the commission] to do this, and I did. We decided to start this festival that combined books and music. We called it Word of South. It started in 2015, and it rained all weekend long. There was enough there that we decided to keep it going, and now we'll be in our ninth year next year. I want to keep doing sort of innovative stuff. It's great to bring national-level people to Tallahassee, but if that's all we're doing, that's not as much as we could do. So I'd like to do more stuff like the Adderley tribute that we did this year. One of the things we're going to do with the festival is also showcase the talent that is currently here. So the beauty of that whole program is we had national-level people come from all over the country to play, we got national-level people here that they played with, and a tribute to some people from Tallahassee that are absolute legends in the jazz field.

I think Tallahassee in a way is sort of like a little European community where people are willing to invest in the community, they're willing to invest for nice public things. I think we have a vibrant park community, we have a vibrant music community, and we have a vibrant intellectual community. It's a great place to live.
