BEHIND THE SCENES AT MANNA ON MERIDIAN

Manna is the food pantry that St. Stephen is part of, along with other congregations (both "on Meridian" and elsewhere). Cassandra White is our Manna rep. These are excerpts from a note that coordinator Carolyn Pardue sent out to interested parties.

[Last Saturday was] Another Great Manna Distribution Day:
310 households served (approx. 1,100 people). How many
volunteers does it take to run a smooth and successful Distribution Day? Today
37 volunteers signed in, logging a cumulative total of 99.5 hours (between 5 a.m.
and 10:30 a.m.).... Another great Manna morning.

Remember to check your calendar for times the week before the third Saturday (in July that will be week of July 15) and pencil Manna in on that Wed. and Friday. There are always opportunities to help....

A couple of things that are very popular on the free table and choice table (note: these are in addition to your continued financial contributions and contributions of food items):

- Disposable underwear/Depends for men and women. (There are families that receive/purchase these when a loved one is ill and have no idea what to do with them when they are no longer needed. Manna serves quite a few people who are older and/or who care for older parents. When we have them, they go quickly.)
- Laundry detergent. (Usually on sale at Walgreens in the 28- to 30-washload size. Unscented is best (for allergies when we store it in Manna building).)
- Bath soap and deodorant (especially in summer).

Manna is blessed to have a donor who provides approx. 100 rolls of toilet paper each month and a donor who provides toothbrushes, and, of course, Blue Tavern has provided funds for toothpaste for the past year. Manna willingly accepts additions to these, but other items above are needed more right now.

If food is what you want to provide, right now the most difficult things for Manna to get at a reasonable price (remember that Manna has to purchase 300 of everything a month):



- Black beans.
- One-pound bags of rice.
- Regular-size boxes of cereal.
- <u>Canned</u> pasta sauce.

EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... All of the visitors and voting members of the Florida-Bahamas Synod descended on Orlando to meet as a voting body to fellowship and do the work of the church. The keynote speaker was the amazing Rev. Dr. Rafael Malpica Padilla. At one part of his presentation, he asked for us in the large group to raise our hand if we "believe that the Church of Jesus Christ has a mission." It was a no-brainer, right?!? I raised my hand like probably half of the assembly did; the others were just afraid to be bold, I thought. Maybe they were, or maybe they knew something I didn't realize – because the Rev. Dr. Rafael said, "We don't want to believe that the Church of Jesus Christ has a mission. We want to believe that the mission of Jesus Christ has a church!"

You see the difference? The first way puts the entity of the church first, instead of the mission of Jesus Christ. We are a healthy church when we put the mission of Jesus Christ first because that is what makes us God's church and not a club, or a philanthropic entity, or only a meeting place. Putting the mission of Jesus first means that whatever we do, in accordance with that mission, is the will of God. If we put the church first, or (God forbid) the pastor first, then you and I will be looking for the will of God in discouraging places....

A TRUMPET-LESS BLAST FROM A CHURCH IN HAITI

In 1989, Karen E. Olson accompanied a team of medical missionaries on a trip to Haiti. This excerpt from the Tallahassee Democrat (Nov. 12, 1989) describes a cross-cultural church service.

An angel appeared to 21-year-old Noe Joseph one night in a dream, and promised him a special talent to be used for the church. In his vision, Joseph received a shining trumpet. In the clear light of day, he woke to find no such instrument – and no way to get one in his isolated corner of Haiti. This is a country, after all, where the voodoo drums far outnumber the hymnbooks.

That never stopped Joseph. Every Sunday, he purses his lips before the battery-operated microphone at Dumay's Bethel Church and unleashes a resounding imitation of the horn he has never seen. This modest blue concrete building, 30 by 60 feet, rocks with enough concertina music to demolish a new accordion every year. The ceiling is decked with crepe paper, a beach ball hanging in the middle like a chandelier. The pulpit is draped like a tablecloth bearing a printed fruit design.

"It's hard to come and tell these people something...," laments Jeff Fredrick, the Tallahassee founder of Adopt-a-Village-Missions. "To see people in church service, thanking God for nothing – it's awesome. It gets you right in the heart

and makes you feel like a worm."

He goes forward just long enough to thank the people for their songs, urge them to spread the faith and tell them the church in America needs their prayers. There is nothing more to say.
