However much you traveled this summer, chances are you didn't log nearly as many miles as the Muchuruzas, beloved former members who now live in Central Florida. Eunice and Victor took their children, Vince and Vivien, to Tanzania – 8,000 miles away. For about a month, the kids got to immerse themselves in this land where their parents grew up. "We created so many memories with family," Eunice wrote to Ruth. "Everything was an adventure for the kids. Some was culture shock for them – especially the Maasai."

In the photo above, they're all wearing a traditional Maasai robe, or shuka. Besides the colorful cloth, Eunice said, the women wear beaded necklaces and shave their heads, and the men carry an iron rod as a weapon. That building

behind them, she explained, is a traditional house for a family of seven to 10, with a low roof and no windows. "Women are builders of these traditional houses," Eunice wrote proudly, adding a smiley face.

One of many highlights was the trip to Safari National Park and their climb up Mount Kilimanjaro. (In the smaller photo, the man on the right is their guide. Victor had to miss the climb.) Best of all, Eunice said, was seeing Vince and Vivien "spending time with their grandparents and family and friends. Those are memories they will treasure forever"

'I WAS A REFUGEE, AND YOU REACHED OUT TO ME'

Since the International Rescue Committee opened its doors here in 2015, Tallahassee has become home to 90 refugee families from Afghanistan, Syria, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Colombia and El Salvador. With the war in Ukraine and other world crises, the number is expected to increase. On Sept. 19, you're invited to an informational meeting to learn how your congregation, club or informal group can support the important work of successfully resettling these new neighbors. The one-hour meeting will include:



- A refugee sharing how help from community members is crucial and deeply appreciated.
- Karen Duncan, the director of development at IRC of Tallahassee, explaining the community's significant role in empowering refugees to become self-sustaining.
- And a Housing Outreach Mentorship Education team member sharing what the sponsorship experience has meant to the team and the family served.

You'll get to gather printed materials and learn from experienced volunteers and IRC staff about logistics and opportunities. The meeting is set to start at 6:30 p.m. in the fellowship hall of Faith Presbyterian, 2200 N. Meridian Road, across from St. Stephen. Among those planning to attend is Sharon Simmons, our outreach coordinator. So you'll have someone familiar to sit with.

I was fortunate to be able to watch on Zoom and found that I was as anxious for him during that morning as I was during those math competitions back in middle school!



Michael's area of focus is experiment design, and he'll be putting his knowledge and skills to work as a data scientist with Google, in its NYC office. His girlfriend, Laura, just finished her clinical rotation at Western Psychiatric Institute in Pittsburgh, completing the requirements for her Ph.D. in clinical psychology.

Michael was able to complete his research and tutoring responsibilities remotely during this past year, and I've been spending lots of time in Pittsburgh, getting to see them and the rest of my family. [Wednesday] morning, Drs. McKibben and Machlin headed out for the Big Apple, and new adventures. Laura is taking a position as a postdoctoral fellow in Katie McLaughlin's lab at Harvard. The lab studies how early-life trauma impacts structure and function and risk for mental-health symptoms.

I have really come to appreciate how much work – real work, 'til one's brain hurts – goes into obtaining higher degrees. I'm embarrassed to say that when I was younger, I thought things came easier to smart people because, well, they're smarter. I've seen with Michael and his friends how much discipline and fortitude go into the process. There are so many hurdles along the way. The first couple years were so tough, and we wouldn't have been surprised if he had mastered out, as several from his cohort did. I'm looking forward to the graduation ceremony in December.

[After we expressed our delight with Michael's news, Barb added:]
Our St. Stephen kids are all pretty special, aren't they? Michael was fortunate to grow up surrounded by so much love and interested adults. As a parent, I truly appreciate that and the influence it had on him, especially since we didn't live near any extended family.

SPEAKING OF BARB...

We asked her to elaborate on her own adventures.

I am doing well, and enjoying all the time I'm spending in the 'Burgh. [That's Pittsburgh to the rest of us.] The city has a lot going on in the summer that I enjoy – outdoor concerts, summer musical-theater series, and lots of parks and trails for hiking and biking. Pitt has an active OLLI program, and I'm taking a couple in-person courses this summer. So I think I've adjusted to retirement – as many people say, you wonder how you had time to work.
