HERE'S OUR CONTRACTOR, **ESTIMATE AND FINAL PLEA**

With excitement and joy, I announce that our general contractor has been selected and approved by the Bid Review Team and the Church Council. Oliver-Sperry Renovation presented the most concise and competitive estimate to complete the repair and renovation of our sanctuary. The company's past work with other churches, its fine reputation and


its ability to listen to our specific needs made this a simple decision.



The estimate from OliverSperry is

\$163,383. That price includes repairing the initial roof-thrust problem by removing wooden crossbeams and installing steel rods and brackets; replacing clerestory windows; repairing uneven concrete; replacing carpet in the entire sanctuary; installing vinyl wood plank in the sacristy; rewiring church lighting and switches; installing new light fixtures; replacing five exterior doors; painting all drywall; and completing a few other smaller projects. St. Stephen purchased the light fixtures and bulbs on our own to save delivery time and money, at a cost of \$13,623. The total cost of the project is \$196,999, when the light fixtures and bulbs are added together with the architect's fee of \$19,993.

Here are the numbers: Total cost: \$196,999 Total donations received: \$132,868 Funds pledged but not yet received: \$23,450 Funds needed to complete the project: \$40,681 Continued from pg. 1



This is our Capital Campaign challenge: to raise \$40,681 by Thanksgiving to meet the current construction bid. A few donors have been waiting for the general contractor's selection and bid. We humbly present these figures, our general contractor's bid – and here we stand. Please, if you are able and have been waiting, come to the table with an offering designated for these needed repairs and renovations to our church.

As for the timeline, we're now at the mercy of the permitting department. We hope to get our permits in 30 days, but it could take as long as 90 days. Once the work begins, OliverSperry thinks it'll take 30 days or less. When the timeline becomes clear, we'll schedule that workday for clearing out the sanctuary and setting up the fellowship hall as our temporary worship space.

The finish line is in sight, and together we'll cross it, with arms raised in praise to our God.
