# A CAPITAL CITY IS BORN

"We stumbled on the Tallahassee episode of 'Florida Road Trip' on WFSU tonight," Caroline Collins wrote in an email Monday, "and what favorite Lutheran historian do you think they interviewed?" It was none other than our own Erik Robinson. "I did get a screenshot of Erik but, even better, found the whole episode (first aired two months ago) on the 'Florida Road Trip' channel on YouTube. Here's a tasty excerpt from the interview with Erik: "Tallahassee was a planned and intentional city. It was planned to be a capital because of the trouble getting

from place to place in early frontier Florida. The United States took over Florida in 1821 and had their first territorial legislative council in Pensacola the next year, in 1822. They decided that they would go to St. Augustine the year after, but because there was no land route to it, they decided that they needed a place that they could meet in the middle. So they sent a surveyor, and



he went to approximately the middle between Pensacola and St. Augustine, and that was this place."

# EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S 'GET BEHIND ME, SATAN' SERMON

... So, did Jesus overreact? I mean, he called Peter -- Satan. That's not a good thing! :-)

Was the language too harsh? Maybe, but it was done in love and done because humans think too small. A joyful life is not only about ourselves. And while we call Jesus a personal Savior and we seek to have a personal relationship with the Son of Man, we don't know everything God is up to. And then we find that our thinking might be too small like Peter's thinking was, or we just picture God as an old man on a throne far away, angry all the time. And it is just too small....

God is neither male nor female. God is not far away and not always angry, and a joyful life is not only about ourselves. A joyful life is about pointing people to see God's love for them. And it's best done by taking up our cross and following him. That is, being of service to the other, the marginalized, to the least in our midst. This is our response because God came to us ... the marginalized and the least

And God did something unbelievable. God loved us into belief. And then said, "Come, follow me."

# **'I'M NOT AFRAID'**

... Nancy Delilah White was not inclined to panic several years ago, when an intruder appeared shortly after midnight in her sprawling yellow Queen Anne-style rooming house, which looms over the intersection of Monroe Street and Thomasville Road.

White, who will turn 95 in April, has always assumed that her rights will be respected. She began taking in guests a year after she bought the imposing landmark in 1940 with her late husband, Ernest Lee White. And nobody has ever lifted a hand to harm her, although she has evicted plenty of drunks and check bouncers.

So when she saw the lights go on unexpectedly one night in the vacant bedroom next to her own, White started dictating orders.

"You'd better tell me what you want, because I'm getting pretty nervous," the widow commanded with the unflappable voice of a campus housemother. "You know the way you came in, so you know the way to go out."

After calling the police, the landlady stepped out to face the interloper – a tipsy 23-year-old man....



"He could have killed me with one hand, but I wasn't afraid of him," she said. "The Lord's got me covered with both hands, so I'm not afraid. I'm not even worried...."
