DOLLARS & CENTS

- For August, we were \$2,471 below par. That is, our expenses totaled \$17,100 but our regular giving totaled \$14,629. Looks like our typical summer pattern, eh? Still, there was also a lot of special giving for particular causes, as you'll see below.
- On Noisy Offering Sunday, the children's buckets were filled with \$191 for Lutheran Disaster Response's efforts to address the recent flooding in Kentucky and Texas.
- The Justice and Mercy Account helped three different people and one nonprofit agency in August, totaling \$1,350 worth of assistance. We still have a good supply of gift cards for people who are hungry or nearly out of gas, but our reserve funds are running low.




- Sometimes when we put out a call to meet a special need, you generously contribute even more than we sought. That's what happened with the special collection for a refrigerator to help a member of our worship family. The money above and beyond what we needed for the fridge will be used to buy new tires and brakes for the same person. "Thank you to everyone who was able to give," Pastor Tom said.
- Members aren't the only ones who donate to such causes. Visitors do, too. One of the guests who came for the recent baptism returned two days later with a check. She asked for it to go toward the refrigerator and to help reimburse the Hospitality Committee for the lovely reception after the baptism.

In ways large and small, mostly anonymously, we stand together as a congregation to make life a little easier for some of the people around us. "I cannot thank you enough," Pastor Tom said, "for your gifts and the loving aid they supply people."



'STEP OUT AND GO'



For many years, Karen Olson was a reporter and columnist for the Tallahassee Democrat. Her specialty was spotlighting people of faith, people in need, people whose stories otherwise wouldn't be told. She collected many of those stories in the heavyweight book she published in 2018, "Frogs, Turtles and Pineapples: Notes From a Pilgrim in Progress." We're going to excerpt inspiring passages from her book in the newsletter from time to time. Here's an excerpt from an April 14, 2002, Democrat story titled "Mother Jackson shares life's abundance," about a beloved community volunteer.

Although she says she's never owned a car or a house, Mother Jackson sees her life as one of abundance. "It doesn't take a car or a house or a beautiful place in order to serve the Lord. I've been serving the Lord since I was 15 years old, and I hardly had a place to stay."

... Mother Jackson has no inhibitions about praying on demand, discussing her relationship with God or urging discouraged guests [at The Shelter] to keep pursuing a better future. "If you get up and make one step, God will take two," she'll tell them. "But you have to step out and go out the door." She believes people listen because she knows God. Guests say it's because she knows them. "She's a special lady," said Ernest Johnson, a 66-year-old laborer. "She's been doing this a long, long, long time. She knows my name."

FEMUR FRACTURE

Two weeks ago Tuesday, Linda fell while exiting the car in front of the Oak Valley Publix. Paramedics were there in no time at all to administer aid. They

gave her two injections of pain medicine and headed for TMH. After several X-rays, it was determined that she had fractured her femur [thigh bone]. Within minutes she was booked into the orthopedic ward. After two more days of another X-ray, CT scan and numerous blood draws, she was prepped for surgery. She had a rod with six screws installed to support the femur.

With a minimal amount of physical therapy, she was discharged on Labor

Day. She is making remarkable progress via in-home physical therapy twice a week and continuing support from her Cabana Boy. She is also receiving support of many meals from family and friends. I know she would be very pleased with prayers from her St. Stephen family for a speedy and full recovery.

INSTEAD OF A SLICE OF PASTOR TOM'S SERMON...

Here's an excerpt from a Sept. 8 New York Times interview with religious scholar Karen Armstrong.

- (Q) Are there religious historians or scholars you especially admire?
- (A) My understanding of religion was transformed nearly 30 years ago by the great Muslim scholar and mystic Ibn al-Arabi (1165-1240).
- (B) Sadly, he is little known in the West. A truly religious person, he insisted in "Fusus al-Hikam," was equally at home in a synagogue, temple, church or mosque, since no faith has the monopoly of truth:

"Do not praise your own faith so exclusively that you disbelieve all the rest. If you do this, you will fail to recognize the real truth of the matter. God, the omnipresent and omnipotent, cannot be confined to any one creed, for he says, 'Wheresoever ye turn, there is the face of Allah.' (Quran 2:115). Everybody praises what he believes; his god is his own creature and in praising it he praises himself. Consequently, he blames the beliefs of others, which he would not do if he were just, but his dislike is based on ignorance."

I immediately copied this extract and pinned it onto the bulletin board beside my desk. It has remained absolutely essential to my work. When I am lecturing in Pakistan, for example, my host always tells me to finish by quoting these words and you can almost feel the relief in the room.


