'INDIFFERENCE': EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... [Jesus] takes on the mantle of the prophets and the true spirit of the Law which continually asks you and me: What is the purpose of your life? What is the purpose of my life?

It's not about what life will be after death ... it's about life right now!

We cannot ignore the reality noted a few verses earlier in Luke where we were told that the Pharisees were lovers of money and they began ridiculing Jesus. It's not hard to consider their response, because it plays out in our minds every time we pass by someone with a sign asking for spare change. We tell ourselves, "They'll just use the money for drugs." Thinking that "if they can stand there all day, why can't they get a job?" Then we avoid eye contact... We can't even affirm their presence.

Jesus' parable tells us that such behavior, the behavior of complacency and indifference, ... is the sin of omission....
