COOL-WEATHER WAYS TO SERVE

• A hot cup of coffee and a brisk sunny day have greeted many of us this week. For the most part, Tallahassee residents are glad to see less heat and fewer bugs. However, a drop in temperature for those who live on the street signals a new struggle: how to stay warm at night in their encampment, in a stairwell or in a park. The teenage clients of CCYS-Going Places are facing those challenges. So now, in addition to backpack-ready snacks, sanitary supplies and toiletries, they're requesting long-sleeve shirts, sweatshirts, heavy jackets, twin-size sheets (for their residential program), sleeping bags, blankets, reusable water bottles and laundry detergent. If you don't

By the way, CCYS-Going Places has started a transitional housing program to get young people off the street. So far, it has one transitional apart-



ment where a client can stay for three months while developing job security and learning how to take care of themselves in a traditional house. The young man for whom St. Stephen recently bought a bicycle was the apartment's first resident. Last week he received the keys to his own apartment. He'll have some furniture but may need other things. CCYS will let us know how we can support him as he moves forward. THE WOMAN WITH 'COLOR-VISION' EYES

A life of poverty can get plenty painful and plenty complicated. Experience has taught [Mary Wiley] Smith, above all, to wait – to just keep inching along, one painful step at a time, without looking too far ahead.... When Smith talks about God, however, she begins by giving thanks for her "color-vision" eyes – for the sight of a blue summer sky puffing with clouds, and the way the brightness splinters later into starshine.

"At night, when everything is real quiet, I get a peace when I just sit out and look at the stars," she said. "I have a direct connection with God. I look at those stars

twinkling up there, and I know man didn't put them there and I know science didn't put them there. Some nights, the clouds be so full of stars, they're just jammed tight. It's a dream vision for me. I get a deep release from all this tension. I sit there on the doorstep and I talk to God."



When the mosquitoes get too ferocious, she burns a pile of cotton rags to keep them at bay. And she just keeps waiting.

THE MUSTARD SEED: EXCERPT FROM PASTOR'S SERMON

... The Jesus in the Gospel of Luke could take some lessons from Mister Rogers and from Barney (the purple dinosaur) about making people feel special. On top of the lulus he gives today, we are wise to recognize how often this lesson is taken out of its context and then used to preach a message of shame to people. Lessons to admonish people. As if we should throw out everything we know about Jesus and assume this is the Lord's intent.

No, it is we pastors and priests who feel the need to twist it in ways that convince folks that things could have been better if they'd just had a bit of faith. Saying harmful things like "Healing could have occurred if you'd had a tiny fragment of faith." Or "Your grief could have disappeared if you had just a pinch of faith." These statements are terrible ways to interpret what Jesus was saying and doing.

But unless one spends time in the text, and reads or has someone to teach them about the thematic material, then it's easy to be led astray. So, we look for the context, and our boundary markers are: the story of the rich man and Lazarus and the problems that come from loving money above all else, and next week's lesson on the healing of the 10 lepers, which is about giving thanks. Within these markers, we find the connection of this text about "mustard-seed-sized faith," and then we can come to appreciate Jesus' honesty about the demands of discipleship without seeing them as ways to shame us....

Jesus did not warn his followers ... to not make mistakes or stumble. The warning is to not be the one who trips up <u>others</u> on their walk of faith. Warnings to not be the one who fails to be hospitable and forgiving, and not be the one who fails to minister as Jesus would. <u>This</u> is the warning here.
