This Sunday, when our kids gallop toward you with shiny silver buckets, think back to last Sunday. Remember when Caroline Collins updated us on the progress that her FixieChicks team and other volunteer builders are making on

the WomenBuild house. Remember when she introduced us to Bernice Sherman, whose family will be living in that house. Remember when Caroline said: "This is my first Habitat build, and I got to learn how to cut and install soffits. With all the build experience Ms. Bernice has racked up in the two years since her application was accepted, she could probably build a house from scratch by now." Remember how Caroline put WomenBuild in context: "This is one way to address



the crisis in affordable housing, one family home at a time."

And remember when she told us that even though the response from St. Stephen and others has been heartening - "the building process has been longer than expected with lags in fundraising as well as difficulty getting subcontractors in a timely manner. Construction costs soar." Ideally, we would've paused right after Caroline's talk to whip out our checkbooks. Instead, that checkbook moment arrives this Sunday, during the Noisy Offering. Actually, maybe that moment is right now, as you're reading this, before your mind and your checkbook wander off.


LEARNING TO MINISTER TO AIDS PATIENTS

... In overcoming his own fears of contagion, [St. Stephen Pastor Emory] Hingst drew strength from the example of other caregivers. He admits to twinges of anxiety the first time he touched the doorknob, or shooed away a bloodthirsty mosquito. He had to squelch a nagging little voice that kept asking, "Is all the information accurate? Are they going to turn the page the next day and say, 'Oh, we made a mistake'?"

Hingst offered this advice for would-be caregivers:

- Relate to the patient primarily as a human being, rather than as a person with AIDS.
- Confront any fears in your own life regarding death or sexual orientation, so that you can convey an attitude of acceptance.
- Get the medical facts, which indicate that you won't catch AIDS by caring for its victims.
- Finally, accept that the Christian calling involves some risky challenges.



"The church should go where no one else will go," Hingst said. "Decide it's a risk you're going to take. If you're a Christian, that's where you're supposed to be anyway, and don't worry about it."

'THE SILENCE OF THE UNSPEAKABLE': EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... It was about 10 years ago. I stood at the door following worship to greet people on their way out of church. An usher tapped me on the shoulder and said there was an urgent phone call for me.... The call was from the emergency department at Bay Medical. A family had requested they call me to come and meet them in a room.... "How can I help?" I asked. There had been an accidental death of a child by gunshot. The words still ring in my ears. "What can I do?" "What will I say?" Questions ran through my head on the way to the hospital....

The room was silent. The dad was there, and his mom and dad were there, as well as a boy of 2 or 3. The child made the only sound in the room as he played with his cars on the table. The dad never took his eyes off his boy while the grandparents explained to me what had happened. While brother and sister were playing in a separate room, the dad (who was in training to be a police officer) was cleaning his firearm. The gun went off. The bullet went through a wall and hit his 6-year-old daughter and killed her instantly.

The desire to minister to the survivors of this tragedy was strong, but ... there was no way to right the wrong, no way to inspire a "Chin up" response, no way to lift the burden that was felt by the father and the family and about to hit the surrounding community. It was a time of complete helplessness. With nothing to say or do, we simply remained in the room together and shared the silence of the unspeakable and unthinkable.



But there was one thing that helped allow me to keep silent and stay, and that one thing was constant prayer. Nothing out loud, but it was the only answer in the present moment ... constant prayer ... nothing else would do.

Anyone who has lived a life of relationship, everyone who has loved knows an experience of anguish, loss or regret. You may even be recalling something similar in your own life when you felt helpless, speechless ... nothing in the toolbox to solve the situation. Only the dependence on prayer.
