
'I LITERALLY STARTED SCREAMING': **TERRI TELLS HER STORM STORY**

Around 1 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 9, a stealthy storm blew Terri Schmitt's domestic tranquility to smithereens. The storm knocked over a pine tree that towered over

her rental house, atop a hill just north of I-10 and west of Meridian. That tree came crashing through the roof. In fact, one limb (see photo) came close to skewering the bed where Terri and her dog, Pippin, were sleeping – and next to that limb was a live power line. Miraculously, no one was hurt.

"I felt like I was in a real-life horror movie after I heard the two colossal booms," Terri recalled – one boom for the main trunk and another for that limb. "I literally started screaming and kept screaming at every turn." Terri's first frantic phone call was to the city utilities emergency line, but she couldn't get through. So she called Rita Ford, whose stepdaughter owns the rental house. Then she called 911, who notified the fire department.





"Electrical wires were holding up the kitchen ceiling," Terri said. "I had to dig my way out the front door because so much had collapsed there. The side door was not an option, because the roof caused the wall to sag and jammed the door shut. A path had to be cut on the right of way in order for any vehicle to be able to make it to my home."

It's a home that she shared with quite an animal family. "I got my dog and lizard, Cherub, out before the first firefighter got to me," Terri said. "But there was also Moonlight, the great horned owl. Her home was smashed. [More about Moonlight in a moment.] The firefighters

also helped me transfer my three parrots to travel cages." Then they had to clear the path even more so they could get the cages out - and so Rath, Rita's husband, could get in. That was about 2 a.m. Rath took Terri to the Fords' residence so her animals could get settled in.

But there was still work to do. About 4 a.m. Terri and Rath drove back, on a Moonlight-the-Owl mission. "It was too dark to see," Terri said. "And we needed to avoid a downed power line. So I left the car running with the headlights shining at the owl's large enclosure. With flashlights we saw that about one-third of her roof had collapsed and her perches and safety box were down. But I was glad to see her eyes shining back at me when I opened the door.

"I had no gloves or other usual equipment. I had no carrier for her. But there was a sheet in the car. So I told Rath to stand in one corner of the owl house with the flashlight, while I rushed in to catch her in the sheet. I wrapped her in it and told Rath to drive my car. She struggled surprisingly little during the capture and car ride." They set her up in a dog crate until Terri could get her to the Florida Wild Mammal Association in Crawfordville, where she's been ever since – waiting for Terri's new house. The next day, by the time Pastor Tom and Colin Hackley arrived to help out, the tree was gone and the house had been tarped. Other St. Stephen people who've assisted in cleanup and more are Bob and Linda Eshleman, Mike Martinez and Nancy Staff, Beth Alexander, Sharon Simmons, and Margaret Bowers and her husband and son. "Plus a half-dozen non-St. Stephenites," Terri said. "My son, Isaac, and his girlfriend came on Friday and worked for several hours in the dark to collapse the dangerous kitchen ceiling, so I could get in to try to salvage some things. My sister, Cristy, came

to help two weeks later, and she really helped me to start moving on." Many others have contributed their concern and prayers – and money, though Terri never requested any.

Since that stormy night, Terri has been lodging with the Fords. The good news – yes, there is good news! – is that Terri's in the process of closing on a house. Closing date is Nov. 5. The new home on Faringdon Drive is five houses up the street from Anita Sawh, Rita's sister. Terri can't wait.



Meanwhile, she's filled with gratitude. "My critters are loud, demanding and relentless, so Rita's family is putting up with a lot," Terri said. "Usually Rita cooks at least two meals a day – and packs my lunch for me many days! I try to reciprocate by helping with dishes – and not letting my crew mess up her home too much. I'm so grateful to Rita, Rath and Ajay."



When we sent Rita this story, she replied: "I just wanted to cry reading this. I thank God every day for protecting Terri during such a traumatic experience. Terri is such a beautiful person and has become a part of my family. In all of her struggles God is there, blessing her and making her stronger. I know good things are coming her way."

FAREWELL TO CHERYL – AND MORE SYNOD NEWS

Along with husband Mark (and, of course, Pastor Tom), Sue represented St. Stephen at last week's virtual Florida-Bahamas Synod Assembly. We asked her to share her impressions.

At the outset, I kept getting distracted from what we were doing by how we were doing it. I was in awe that the Synod staff pulled off a very smooth two-day remote assembly for over 250 people. Just think about coping with the technical competence of that many people that ranged anywhere from zero to no problem. Add real-time remote voting to that miracle. We had a two-page ballot with candidates to fill about 30 open positions total among four Synod entities.

My lasting impressions:

- The Florida-Bahamas Synod benefits an amazing number of people through a broad scope of ministries. For example, we have Global Mission Partners in Haiti, Guyana, Surinam and Jamaica.
- A new ministry called Deaf Palms has been approved as a mission church. This church hopes to travel the state with a goal of increasing full access to worship for the hearing-impaired.
- Every young person in our Lutheran family is vital for the life of every congregation. None who want to attend the upcoming Youth Gathering should be denied the chance due to money. It costs \$1,000 per youth. If you don't have an eligible youth in your congregation, donate so that no Synod youth is left out.
- Cheryl Stuart concluded 12 years of service as vice president of the Synod



Council. Did you know she had served that long? I did not. She stirred the assembly in many ways. Here is one way she challenged all Synod congregations: Did you know that the man who murdered nine people at Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, S.C., in 2015 was raised Lutheran? He was confirmed and attended regularly. He reportedly continues to espouse white supremacy views. What message did he <u>not</u> hear in his Lutheran congregation? Does our silence on issues of racial inequality speak the loudest? What can we do to ensure that our Lutheran congregations are living out loud the messages Jesus taught?

The farewell for Cheryl was heartfelt and much deserved. I cannot imagine willingly putting in that much time on the business of the church. Bishop Suarez said Cheryl did so with compassion and competence that will be hard to replace.


FOUR FRIENDS
