From this Sunday through Dec. 11, they'll be available for viewing and voting in the fellowship hall. They range in price from \$8,589 to \$9,389. The Council is asking you to pick out your two favorites – and please keep the cost in mind. So far, we've raised \$1,225 toward a new sign.

HERE'S A GIFT IDEA: MANNA

In case you're new to our congregation: Manna on Meridian is a joint ministry supported by Faith Presbyterian, Grace Lutheran, Saint Paul's United Methodist, Unitarian Universalist Church of Tallahassee and St. Stephen. In 2020, Manna provided nonperishable groceries, bread and fresh produce to 2,000 house-holds. The next year, that number grew to 2,400. So far this year, it has served 2,860 households, averaging 260 per month. 
... Most of the volunteers [at the Food Bank of Tallahassee] are well acquainted with their clients' struggles to survive. The news isn't always bad – one welfare mother of five, for example, is about to get a four-year business degree.

"She is the happiest person I've ever seen," said volunteer Ethus Snider, on loan to Killearn [United Methodist] from Trinity United Methodist Church. "She is bubbling over."

Too often, however, the conversations revolve around lost jobs, unpaid taxes and incurable illness. The consolation is a hug, a prayer and a promise to return.

In seeking the strength to come back, [volunteer Wayne] Swinney said he focuses on the gratitude he feels for the ease of his own life: "It can get to you. It's like, some people say, 'I couldn't do it.' But my goodness, if you don't do it, who will?"


CHRISTMAS POINSETTIAS
