

A couple of people studying the proposed signs wondered aloud why that round





'CATHOLIC' QUESTION

Have you wondered why we say "catholic" in the Apostles' Creed and Nicene Creed? If so, you're not alone. For different reasons, the word can make people uncomfortable. Until blue in the face, pastors and church scholars have

explained that small-"c" "catholic" means universal, not a denomination. So, we profess belief in the holy, universal and apostolic church. However, a growing concern is how many hear "catholic" and become distracted or, worse, feel hurt. In the past year, a few members have asked our Worship and Music Committee to consider making the change. With Council approval, St. Stephen will



discuss that and possibly vote to change "catholic" in our creeds to "universal." If you have any questions before our meeting, please contact me. Our next congregational meeting follows worship on Jan. 22.

LAST MONTH'S NOISY OFFERING...

Our Ministry Minute speaker three Sundays ago was Jeanette Sickel. Jeanette, who lives in Whigham, Georgia, had worked for years with colleagues who were blind and, upon her retirement, she felt compelled to help improve vision

services in Georgia. "As an advocate, I work to connect persons who are visually impaired with the resources that will allow each individual to develop to his or her full potential," she told us that day. "At present, these resources are not well-developed in Georgia. This is particularly true in rural South Georgia.... In many communities, an idea hangs on from decades ago that blind people can't do very much."

Jeanette is a member of the Georgia Council of the Blind, as well as the Blind Lions of Georgia. Both of those groups, she said, seek to make the public aware that although lack of sight certainly



is an inconvenience, it does not shut a person down. All proceeds from November's monthly Noisy Offering were given to support the good work that Jeanette and the Blind Lions of Georgia are doing. The total donated: \$200.

... AND THIS MONTH'S NOISY OFFERING

Here in December, our Ministry Minute speaker is a local celebrity. She's Adrian Fogelin, author of numerous works of young-adult fiction, and half of



the musical duo Hot Tamale. She also happens to live in Seminole Manor, the same southwest neighborhood as our own Karen Olson. Both Karen and Adrian regularly seek out ways to assist their neighbors, many of whom face multiple challenges. On Dec. 18, Adrian will fill us in on ways we can become involved in Seminole Manor's food ministry. Please note: Usually with Ministry Minute, we hear the speaker and then wait until the next Sunday to collect a Noisy Offering for that ministry. This month, however,

the "next Sunday" is Christmas! So on Dec. 18, we'll have both the guest speaker AND the Noisy Offering. In other words ... come prepared Dec. 18! Bring your checkbook!

EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... Back then John was not baptizing to make people feel bad – or good – about themselves. He was enlisting people in a cause. He was doing his part in repairing the broken.

He's telling you, and me, that it is time to have the heart to take a stand and follow the way of Jesus. There will always be something to be afraid of ... be it spiders and snakes or failure or disrespect or being laughed at or even shunned ... So we need this place (this Holy Ground) to discover the process of divine repair and holy welcome and reignited hearts.





The truth is, we really need Advent to be longer than just four weeks ... Not because we need more shopping time! We need more Advent time because there is much to repair in our world. But God promises to not let things stay the way they are. God promises to repair!...


