

CONTINUING OUR 'CATHOLIC' CONVERSATION

One little word ... "catholic." Thank you for your responses to last week's newsletter, where I wrote that some members had asked about the word "catholic" in our creeds, and had wondered whether it could be replaced with "universal." Since then, some have welcomed the desire to better communicate our beliefs, while others have expressed caution about changing the historical/theological content and meaning behind the word.

Please rest assured that the brief article did not reflect rigorous thought, discussion or prayer processes. Nor will we, as a congregation, rush to any conclusion. I am reaching out to the Office of the Bishop for advice and informally seeking counsel from a clergy group. To date, I'm finding that the once-popular "universal" definition is not such a good one to replace "catholic."



Some find "catholic" the best word, while to others it's a stumbling block.

In Luther's Large Catechism we find, in his explanation of the "Third Article" of the Creed, how he translated into German: "I believe in the Holy Spirit, one holy *Christian* church, the *community* of saints, the forgiveness of sins,

the resurrection of the flesh, and the life everlasting. Amen." *(Italics mine)* Luther also found the word "communion" (as in communion of saints) to be better translated into "community." Not as a separate belief, but as a clarifier to the "one holy Christian church." To be continued!

OUTREACH UPDATES

GOING PLACES: Members and friends of St. Stephen are generous and caring. Last week Justin Barfield *(pictured here with Pastor Tom)* came by to pick up



the many donations for CCYS Going Places and to receive the check for the bicycle we helped purchase for one of their clients. The CCYS tub in our fellowship hall is empty and waiting for items such as sweatshirts, socks, toiletries (any size), sanitary supplies, reusable water bottles and backpack-ready snacks.

IRC: The Outreach Committee invites you to join us in expanding our support of the International Rescue Committee by collecting household cleaning supplies such as laundry detergent, counter spray, toilet-bowl cleaner, mop fluid/general cleaning solution (Mr. Clean) and personal hygiene items such as deodorant (men or women), body lotion, shampoo, conditioner, body wash/bar soap and

maxi pads. Place items in the IRC tub in the fellowship hall. When it's full, those items will go immediately to the IRC for distribution. Cleaning and hygiene supplies are important because they can't be purchased with WIC or food stamps.

TNT: Our upcoming joint initiative with New Mount Zion AME Church will begin in January. It's TNT time! No, we're not blowing anything up; it's Toilet Paper 'N' Toiletries. There'll be a box in the fellowship hall beginning Jan. 1, and collections will run through Jan. 29. Those items will go to the Kearney Center.

EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... John angered the religious leaders and we know he angered the political leaders, but isn't it interesting that he probably angered his own followers, too? With his sureness that the Messiah to come would bring military might and military liberation from Roman occupation – and with his truth about religious puppets. Zealots of every age never proclaim a God that is a mystery to humankind, but speak of a vengeful God...

John's zeal now was dissolved and he wondered, like we all would have wondered: Was it all worth it? He'd pointed out Jesus, named him the Lamb of God, but he hadn't known the kind of message Jesus would bring - and still not one sword had been picked up. Not a single army formed. No messianic army coming to rescue him. He'd laid it all on the line and now, in a cold, dark cell, he wondered ... for what? Maybe you've had similar feelings after trying to do something good or something you felt important to your faith - only to later have doubts and wonder if Jesus really is the One.

I can only imagine what it feels like to wait behind bars in prison. And I really want to find fault in John the Baptizer for his doubting of Jesus the One...But who among us in times and suffering hasn't had the same doubt?



'A SIXTH SENSE FOR TROUBLE'



... In an era without electricity, telephones or pavement, Sister Sophia [Moeller, a Lutheran deaconess nurse] was something of a local legend. Her hair-raising, heroic feats have been told and retold in mythic proportions. People say she had a sixth sense for trouble, braving blizzards on foot in response to some mysterious, telepathic cry for help.

That's not how Sister Sophia sees it. She's a feisty, no-nonsense woman who likes puppies, people and speaking her peace. She doesn't mind telling off the pregnant woman who refuses to get prenatal care: "If something goes wrong with your baby's delivery, I want you to hear it's all your fault."

... The most celebrated Sister Sophia story harks back to March of '42, when Catherine Weaver came due in a blizzard. She was bleeding seriously, five and a half miles from the road, marooned by drifts of snow several feet deep. Her husband, Wade, had a telephone because he worked for the Forest Service. Sophia called a doctor up from Damascus [Virginia] and had the Norfolk & Western railroad hold the train at Whitetop Gap, three or four miles away.

She hitched a sled to a couple of horses. With several men pulling the sled through the deepest drifts, Sophia and Mrs. Weaver got to the train on time. Thirty-five volunteers were pulling them near the end of the trip. Doctors at the hospital in Abingdon performed "the fastest Caesarean section I ever saw in my



life," Sister Sophia recalls.


Mother and newborn son survived. He was named Dickie Field Norwest Weaver – "Norwest" for the railway that carried him. If he'd been a girl, he'd probably be named Sophia....
