GOOD NEWS ABOUT NEXT YEAR'S GIVING By Pastor Tom

As of Tuesday, we had received 39 estimate-of-giving cards for 2025. Three other households give through Vanco and have not requested a change for 2025. Thirteen other households pledged support in 2024 and are still financially giving, but they haven't filled out a card yet. That makes a total of 55 households that are expected to financially contribute to St. Stephen's mission and ministry. The total



pledged amount for 2025 so far is \$228,610! For 2024, by comparison, we had 48 households that pledged for a total of \$192,220. That's an increase of almost 18%!

Other encouraging statistics: 20 households say they're able to increase their giving in 2025. And four households are pledging for the first time. These are clear confirmations that God is active in this congregation!

With thanksgiving, we humbly recognize how important giving is to our faith formation. With clarity, we view these figures as support for the values that St. Stephen holds. With purpose, we will steward these resources to continue to proclaim the Gospel, administer the sacraments, form relationships and help those who suffer economically.

Thank you, Holy Spirit. And thank you, St. Stephen, for being active and engaged in the ministry of Jesus Christ.

(Estimate-of-giving cards are in the narthex and can be dropped into the collection plate. You also have the option of pledging directly to Office Manager Lori via email or phone.)

.. AND AN UPDATE ON THIS YEAR'S GIVING



Well, this news is not quite as rosy as the item above. We still have a bit of work to do to finish 2024 in the black. Office Manager Lori reports: "Our giving has dropped in October and November (less than 18,000/month, when we need to be at \$23,052/month to meet

budget). I haven't reconciled November expenses yet, so as of Oct. 31, our non-restricted giving YTD was \$213,791.71 and our expenses were \$226,745. To make ends meet, we've had to dip into the GAP fund, which now has a balance of \$2,861. Mission support is up-to-date." For those of us who've fallen behind in our pledges and who are financially able, this is a gentle reminder to make December a bountiful month for St. Stephen. Thank you.

LOOKING FOR A BOOK TO INSPIRE YOU?

EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... There was a bicycle shop in a little town that was constantly busy with the run-up to Christmas. On this particular day, a young boy wandered into the shop. He was dirty-faced, poorly dressed and obviously not from a well-to-do family. At first the staff was worried he might shoplift something, but soon it became clear that he was just looking around. He'd come in, peruse the new bicycles that were waiting to be bought as Christmas gifts, and then stand out of the way to watch the repair people work.

One day, after a large group of customers left with their purchases, he made a beeline over to the repair shop side of the business. He laid a rusty old bolt on the counter in front of them. "Excuse me," he said politely, "can you put a new bike on this bolt?" Like us, the men there laughed at what he said. Only a child would think of putting a bike on a bolt instead of a bolt on a bike. Like ours, the laughter wasn't intended to be mean or harmful, but the little boy was cut to the quick. He didn't understand, but he knew he'd said something wrong, so he backed out and left the shop. The employees tried to catch him, but he was gone.

About a week later he came back. This time, though, he was even more reluctant to make eye contact with anyone in the store, but the girl at the counter saw him and let the repair shop know he was back. One of the guys called to him, "Hey kid!" The boy looked up. "You forgot your bolt the other day."

And with that he wheeled out and presented the boy a bicycle built entirely out of scrap parts that the workers had salvaged on their own time....
