CATCHING UP ON ST. STEPHEN NEWS

VACCINES – Lawana Lamb-Daniels arranged for staff members from the Publix Pharmacy to visit St. Stephen on Sept. 29 to offer vaccines to people before church. They administered more than 50 vaccines to around 28 people, including the Stover children! Lawana wishes to thank everyone who participated. (Where did Lawana get this idea? "It was my Goddaughter Alex. She works part time in the pharmacy at Publix and told me that Publix was now offering to come out to schools, businesses and churches to vaccinate those who wanted it. I thought it was a good idea and convenient - one could come to worship and not make a special trip to be vaccinated.")

Without Limits," by Jacqueline Bussie. In our book study there are no requirements to attend each and every class, nor is anyone forced to read out loud. I urge you to pick up a copy of the book even if you can't make our Sunday-morning class. Pastor/Professor Bussie tells of growing up around conditional love from family and church and how she came to know the heart of Jesus' true message: a radical Love Without Limits.

ON DIVORCE: EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

... "People were bringing little children to Jesus in order that He might touch them." This is probably a familiar passage to you all.... What we might never have considered is: Who brought the children? Pretty sure that 95% of those who brought the children were single mothers. Mothers trying to eke out a living after a man signed a certificate of divorce and left them destitute. Children and women who were suffering. These groups were often exploited and made to live on the margins because they were seen more as property than human beings.

This is the emphasis here. Not to make people who divorced and remarried today feel guilty, but to point to the injustice that divorce without good reason puts upon people who are vulnerable in society. Jesus here, again, showed that he was still worrying about the exploitation he was seeing people put upon other people. Especially children.

So isn't God telling us that the real point of this lesson from Jesus is how to navigate committed relationships? Doesn't it make more sense to see these lessons to be teaching us about what it means to be in love and then teach us how to live together and be in committed relationship with well-fitting partners? That's very clear, if you ask me.

No one should go into a marriage thinking, "Well, if this doesn't work out I'm outta here." But there are also abusers and users who want to dominate their partner. There are tyrants and low-lifes who want to drag down others into the mess they've created. There are real reasons for divorce.

But most of all, if we believe in death and resurrection, then the death of divorce should lead to hope and new life
