Excerpt from Pastor Tom's sermon

A FAVORITE FUND

Sharon composed this overview especially for our new members, who might not know about this legacy of the Hingst family.

In 2021, the late Pastor Emeritus Emory Hingst and his wife, Ann Hingst, gifted St. Stephen \$25,000 with the express intent of setting up an endowment to fund future peace and justice initiatives throughout our church community and the community at large. In 2022 and 2023, a committee met with Pastor Ana, our synodical legacy-giving planner, on the legalities of setting up an endowment.

By the end of 2023 a continuing resolution setting up the St. Stephen Peace & Justice Endowment Fund had been approved by the Church Council and the congregation. Funds had been deposited and the Outreach Committee became the guardian of the endowment. Distributions cannot touch the original donation or be used for purposes other than the specified intent.

By 2025 the endowment had grown to \$30,000 through interest and designated fund donations from congregation members. In March 2025 we funded grants to the Seminole Manor Neighborhood Association, Grace Mission and Just Love Advocacy. Now the endowment fund has grown to approximately \$33,000, and we are waiting to receive a new round of applications by the Feb. 1 deadline.

We remember the generosity of the Hingsts and members of the congregation who designate gifts to sustain and grow this peace and justice ministry in our community.



A CAR IN NEED OF REPAIR
