

IF YOU HAVEN'T ALREADY PLEDGED...

Last Sunday, St. Stephen people started turning in their estimates of giving for 2026. If you haven't done so already, now is the time. In his stewardship message Sunday, Rudy Hehn reminded us why our giving to St. Stephen is so important. Below is an excerpt.



This is a special place and we want it to prosper. It needs money to do that. That was true 2,000 years ago. Jesus and the early church spoke of money often. And we continue to use your donations as a tool to fulfill our mission: Feed people who are hungry; make quilts for people who are cold; encourage one another through our worship and music; give infants in our community a car seat; make sure that every child has presents under their Christmas tree; donate school supplies so kids returning to school can succeed. We need a church that clearly says the gender of your spouse or partner does not matter to God, and that being queer is OK.

That's why we need to give back to St. Stephen. The past couple of years, we either have just broken even or have run a small deficit. The finance committee went through our budget carefully to be sure we made wise decisions about our expenses. We trimmed where we could and looked for the best way to use our funds. To do our best as a church, we need your help. What we are asking is a 10% increase in our giving in 2026. If you can give a little more than 10%, great. Your larger share will assist someone who perhaps is having a difficult time and cannot do more now. We also request an estimate of giving, to help guide the people constructing our budget. It can be on paper or in an email to the church office. You can even send it by passenger pigeon – just so long as it reaches us! As our previous stewardship speakers said, this is our home. Let's make it the best it can be.

EXCERPT FROM PASTOR TOM'S SERMON

Fire is mentioned in this section of Matthew in connection with the Holy Spirit, and it's mentioned in connection with chaff at the end. The wheat is gathered and the chaff is burned with unquenchable fire. God's fire is painful. It's judgment language that, too often, is carelessly thrown around by irresponsible religious leaders.

The incredibly popular John the Baptist used the image of this "Other One" who's coming with winnowing fork in hand. We immediately think of good people being separated from bad people. Thoughtless religious leaders weaponize this interpretation to note who's in and who's out, playing like they are God....

While we might conclude that John's words here revealed he didn't fully comprehend just what this "Other One" was about to do, we can also look deeper into the images ... to see that wheat and chaff are parts of the same cereal plant. So instead of dividing people, this interpretation leads us to see that we are the cereal plant, you and I. This Jesus, the One who is coming, will keep the valuable (precious, unique) you and me. The parts that make Tom, Tom, and the parts that make you, you, will be kept. Call it the soul, the self or the inner spirit. That's kept safe and secure while the dry, scaly husk gets tossed, burned or blown away. That's the good news of this text.
