### WHERE IS GOD IN GAZA?

Excerpt from the Oct. 12 New York Times section called Believing.

... [T]he war in Gaza has exposed the ugly, jagged edge of human experience. The war's grotesque details, live-streamed around the world, are an example of "the problem of evil," an idea attributed to the Greek philosopher Epicurus. It's an issue that has vexed people throughout history as they tried to reconcile the existence of suffering with the belief in a benevolent God. As David Hume, the 18<sup>th</sup>-century Scottish philosopher, put it: Is God "willing to prevent evil, but not able? Then he is impotent. Is he able, but not willing? Then he is malevolent. Is he both able and willing? Whence then is evil?"

Thinkers have wrestled with this idea in abstraction, and have even given it a fancy name: "theodicy." But it's also something people have to face practically in war and famine - in rebuilding makeshift shelters, sifting through a collapsed home and waiting for hours for food, only to be turned away to starve.

"The war has made so many people question God - his absence, his silence," said the Rev. Munther Isaac, a Palestinian Christian based in the Israelioccupied West Bank. It's the most common question he has gotten ... the past two years.... But anecdotes abound of survivors clinging to their faith, or finding it for the first time, in the rubble or the tunnels.

Palestinians often bookend their sentences with a hopeful "inshallah" - the Arabic word meaning "God willing." It was everywhere as the truce emerged last week. "Inshallah," there will be a cease-fire, Amjad Abdel Nabi told the BBC. "The people are very tired and some have been displaced 10 times, others 20 times." The Hebrew version ... is "B'ezrat Hashem," with God's help. "With God's help we will bring them all home," Benjamin Netanyahu posted on X moments after President Trump announced the deal on Wednesday night....

[A] Jerusalem Post study found that about a third of Israeli Jews report a

Tov, who spent 505 days in captivity in Gaza, is one of them. A secular Jew before his kidnapping on Oct. 7, Shem Tov [said] that he found God in Gaza's tunnels 130 feet underground. "Faith kept me going," he said, adding, "I always believed I would get home, though I didn't know how or when."

Shem Tov ... tried to keep kosher while in Gaza and developed a daily habit of reciting what he could remember of Psalm 20, an ancient plea for deliverance. "May the Lord answer you on a day of distress," he said again and again in the darkness. He didn't know that his mother, back

home in Herzliya, went into his empty bedroom each morning and recited the same Psalm....


