

### YOU'RE INVITED TO 'LOVE WITHOUT LIMITS'

In our book study there are no requirements to attend each and every class, nor is anyone forced to read out loud. Pastor/Professor Bussie tells of growing up around conditional love from family and church and how she came to know the heart of Jesus' true message: a radical Love Without Limits.

# SPEAKING OF BOOKS...

St. Stephen's own Marda Messick has been making a name for herself as a poet. Marda, who was our pastor from 2008 to 2016, is the author of "Feral Princess," a collection of poems published this month by Apalachee Press.

Though your newsletter editor hasn't yet gotten his hands on a copy, he read the recent glowing review in the *Tallahassee Democrat*. James Kimbrell, head of creative writing at Florida State University and a faculty poet, wrote: "Rarely do we see a contemporary poet this bold in her use of narrative structure: we travel with a



central speaker, beginning with childhood and onward through the myriad stages of life until mortality itself looms over the journey like a second character, sometimes nemesis, sometimes source of light."

He ended his review this way: "... Messick is not writing poems that are meant merely to entertain, though there is deep pleasure here. Messick sets for herself the goal of not only taking the reader on a journey, but creating feelings in the reader that are palpable, undeniable.



"Take 'Coronary,' for instance, a poem that depicts the near death of the speaker's son in the middle of a basketball game, when 'for close to a minute / on the fatal clock / his blocked heart stopped.' As a reader, my heart rate sped up during this poem that, when finished, left me wanting to find my son just to give him a hug and to rejoice in the simple fact of his breathing.

"Employing a combination of narrative, musicality, and haunting imagery, Messick has delivered a masterful and evocative volume of which any poet should be proud. Much like the wished-for presence in 'Let Me Be Met,' Messick becomes over the course of this collection, 'a kind escort, someone in light, a beckoning....'

"That this is her first volume is simply remarkable and bodes well for the poems that will surely follow this outstanding debut."

## CHRIS BISCHOFF: 1940-2024

Pastor Tom learned Sunday that former member Chris Bischoff, who joined St. Stephen in 1963, had passed away. Here are excerpts from the obituary published by Merkle Funeral Service in North Monroe, Michigan.

Christina Lamson Bischoff, 83, of Monroe, Michigan, passed away in her home Sunday surrounded by family.

Chris was born Dec. 14, 1940, in Toledo, Ohio. After graduating from Burnham High School in Sylvania, Ohio, Chris furthered her education by taking classes at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania.

While raising her three beloved children, Helen, Cathy, and Jack, Chris' creative spirit shone brightly. She delighted in knitting and sewing, crafting outfits for her children. Faith was also an anchor in Chris' life. For more than five decades, she was a devoted member of St. Stephen Lutheran Church in Tallahassee. Her commitment to her faith community brought a deep sense of purpose and belonging.



Outside her home, Chris enjoyed bowling and playing bridge and was often seen bicycling through the neighborhood with local ladies. Her heart, however, found true peace at the beach. The relentless waves and sands of Destin, Florida, offered a tranquil escape.

To cherish her memory, she leaves three children, Helen (the late Curtis) Heminway of Munford, Tennessee, Cathy (Tom) Pottorff of Monroe, Michigan, and Jack Albright of Charleston, South Carolina; four grandchildren, Thomas, Brittany, Edward and Jonathan; five great-grandchildren; a sister, Ann (the late lan) Greig of Phoenix, Arizona; and a sister-in-law, Linda, of Holland, Ohio.
