

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Rays of Tampa Bay

Giant Manta Ray Manta birostris

The World's largest species of ray. The Giant Manta Ray can weigh up to 4,000 lbs and has an average wingspan of 22 feet.

Cownose Ray Rhinoptera bonasus

Cownose rays are strong swimmers, and known for migrating in large schools of up to 10,000 rays. They migrate clockwise from Florida to Mexico.

Atlantic Devil Ray Mobula hypostoma

In addition to the Tampa Bay area, the Atlantic Devil Ray can also be found in open ocean waters. Its name comes from its distinctive horns.

Spotted Eagle Ray Aetobatus narinari

Due to its spots, the spotted eagle ray is the easiest to identify. They can be found I shallow inshore waters and often swim near the water's surface.

Shuffleboard celebrated its 100th year anniversary in Florida in 2013. It started in St. Petersburg in 1923. In 1924, the St. Petersburg Shuffleboard Club opened & soon 8,000 members were playing on more than 100 courts! This club established the rules that would become the standards of the game. Shuffleboard courts spread across the country during the 1930's & 1940's. The Works Projects Administration (WPA) even built shuffleboard courts on playgrounds!

Each player uses a cue (long stick) & takes turns pushing weighted discs to a scoring diagram on the opposite end of the court. Score more points than your opponent by either knocking his discs off, or, by sliding your discs past his into a higher score zone!

Cuban Sandwich




The Spanish brought the fine ham, the Sicilians the Genoa salami, the Cubans the Mojo marinated Roast Pork, the Germans and Jews the Swiss Cheese, pickle and mustard. Put

each ingredient layered on top of one another, in between sliced Cuban bread, usually brushed with butter on top and pressed to a crispy finish.

In 2012, the "Historic Tampa Cuban Sandwich" was designated as the "signature sandwich of the city of Tampa" by the Tampa City Council.

A Brief History of Ft. De Soto - America's #1 Beach

On May 30, 1539, a well-known Spanish explorer came to the Tampa Bay area and began a conquest which would change the world. Hernando De Soto came ashore on or near the south shores of Tampa Bay. He began his expedition of the southeastern region of what is now the United States, encountering Indians and hard times as he passed through this beautiful territory. He died on May 21, 1542, and was buried in the Mississippi River to prevent his body from being taken by the Indians.

The recorded history of the island known as Mullet Key began in February, 1849 when a group of U.S. Army Engineers, aboard the schooner Phoenix, anchored offshore to survey the coastline for possible use as a coastal defense area. The Civil War broke out in 1861, with no fortification on either Mullet or Egmont Keys. The two islands played a minor role during the Civil War. Union troops set up a blockade using the two islands. Any confederates attempting to run the blockade could be seen by troops perched atop the Egmont Key lighthouse.

The first signs of construction on the Mullet Key military post began in November, 1898. On April 4, 1900, the military reservation was named Fort De Soto after the Spanish explorer Hernando De Soto. Fort De Soto was officially named a sub-post of Fort Dade on Egmont Key at that time.

Post buildings were constructed between early 1900 and 1906. There were 29 buildings including a 100 foot long barracks, a hospital, a stable, a guardhouse, a shop for blacksmiths and carpenters,

an administration office, a mess hall and kitchen, a bake house and a storehouse. If you go there, you will see some of the concrete pillars that still exist. Take the walking tour along the cobblestone walkway and see photos of the actual buildings. Through its long history as a protector of Tampa Bay waters, never once had a shell been fired at an enemy.

During WWII, Fort De Soto was used for bombing practice. Around 1989, a county worker using a backhoe came across an undetonated bomb. A few days later, the bomb was detonated and the explosion could be heard 10 miles away.

Fort De Soto Park is located at the southern tip of Pinellas County (see map pages 26/27). It has lush vegetation, two fishing piers, beaches, a camp site and bicycle trails. It is considered one of Florida's true natural and historical treasures!






DOWNTOWN TAMPA / YBOR CITY MAP

Each year from April 1st to October 31st, sea turtles migrate to Florida for mating and nesting purposes.

The most common species of sea turtle nesting in Florida is the Loggerhead Sea Turtle (*Caretta caretta*). Currently, Florida is home to the largest population of loggerheads nesting in the world. Each year thousands of hatchlings make it safely to the water to begin their journey to maturity, due to our conservation efforts. During their journey, they face many obstacles. The following is a brief history of the life cycle of loggerhead sea turtles:

Under the cover of darkness, the female loggerheads come ashore to find suitable habitat to deposit their eggs. The eggs then incubate underground for 50 days, at which time the hatchlings will emerge. Loggerheads are the only species in which the hatchlings emerge completely at night. Sea turtle hatchlings use light as a visual cue that leads them to the water. However, artificial lighting from beach development results in hatchling death and disorientation by leading the hatchlings in the wrong direction. During the hatching season, from June to October, staff and volunteers from the Clearwater Marine Aquarium monitor caged nests to ensure that all emerged hatchlings have the opportunity to get to the water.

Once the hatchlings have made it to the water, they must swim frantically in order to make it to the shelter of sargassum (seaweed) rafts offshore. During this journey, the hatchlings are vulnerable to prey by anything larger in size; this includes fish, birds and crabs. The turtles will stay in this environment until they reach a size roughly equal to 42 centimeters of their upper shell. At this size, the turtles are less vulnerable to prey and will begin to move from the 'open ocean' environment to the 'near shore' environment, such as that offered by the Indian River on Florida's East Coast.

Once in the 'near shore' environment, the turtles will continue to grow until they reach a size approximately greater than 80 centimeters of their upper shell. Adult loggerheads can continue to spend much of the year in sheltered areas, moving into the 'open ocean' environment during reproductive migrations. Loggerheads typically nest in sub-tropical climates, north of the equator.

The Clearwater Marine Aquarium, located at 249 Windward Passage just off Clearwater Beach, is dedicated to the continued protection and conservation of sea turtles, their nests, and their habitat.

1513 Juan Ponce de Leon lands on east coast of Florida, near present-day St. Augustine & names the peninsula 'Florida' as the season was 'Pascua Florida' (Flowery Easter).

1521 After serving time as governor of Puerto Rico, Ponce de Leon returns to Florida in search of gold. Contracted by the Spanish crown to colonize & Christianize the native peoples, Ponce de Leon was killed in South Florida.

1528 Spanish explorer Panfilo de Narvaez led a second expedition into Florida which was a failure. Tales of mythical cities of gold inspired future expeditions to North America.

1539-1543 Spanish explorer Hernando de Soto, invades the Incas in Peru then lands in Florida. After De Soto was killed in 1542, the 300 remaining in his expedition left for Cuba.

1559 Tristan de Luna attempted Florida's first settlement, Puerto de Santa Maria (today's Pensacola Naval Air Station).

1562 The French, under Jean Ribault, first explore Florida.

1565 Under Pedro Menendez de Aviles, Spain established St. Augustine, first permanent European settlement in North America. The Spanish expelled the French.

1763 At the end of French & Indian Seven Years War, Florida was transferred from Spain to England.

1776 The American Revolution begins. Florida did not join the thirteen English colonies in the revolution & remained loyal to England.

1783 The Spanish take control of Florida.

1817-1818 First Seminole War — Conflict between the United States territory & the Seminole Indians of Florida. It was fought to defend those individuals of African descent, living among the Indians, from capture & returning them for enslavement.

1821 Florida becomes a United States territory & Andrew Jackson its first governor. Hand-colored Spanish land grant maps were among the documents used to establish ownership of land in Florida.

1835-1842 All Indians in Florida were supposed to migrate to the Indian Territory west of the Mississippi (later known as Oklahoma). Many migrated; the leader of the Seminole Indians, Osceola, refused. After brief imprisonment, Osceola commenced attacks on Americans. The Second Seminole War began. Osceola was arrested & died in prison in 1838. By 1842, many followers died or were sent to the western Indian Territory.

1845 Florida becomes a state on March 3, 1845, by the 28th Congress. Florida continued expansion of the plantation system.

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Alligators have a broad, rounded snout with no lower teeth visible when their jaw is closed. Adult alligators are primarily dark gray in color with a lighter color underside. Its powerful tail which is half the gators length, helps propel it through the water. While alligators move quickly in the water, they are generally slow-moving on land.

The alligator (and other nocturnal vertebrates) possesses an eye-shine caused by a layer of cells called the tapetum ludicum, meaning 'bright carpet' in Latin. This structure beneath the cells in the retina, reflects light back into the cells to increase the amount of light detected, improving an alligator's vision in low light conditions. In alligators, this eye-shine is red, but different colors in other species.

Courtship begins in early April, and mating occurs in May or June. Females build a mound nest of soil, vegetation or debris and deposit an average of 32 to 46 eggs in late June or early July. Incubation requires approximately 63 to 68 days, and hatching occurs from mid-August through early September. Although gators have no vocal cords, males bellow loudly to attract mates and warn off other males by sucking air into their lungs and blowing it out in intermittent, deep-toned roars.

Alligators were depleted from many parts of their range as a result of

market hunting and loss of habitat. In 1967, the alligator was listed as an endangered species (under a law that preceded the Endangered Species Act of 1973), meaning it was considered in danger of extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range. Today, gators are no longer on the endangered list and are thriving more than ever.

Alligators are found from southeast Oklahoma and east Texas to North Carolina and Florida in the east. They prefer fresh water lakes and slow-moving rivers and their associated wetlands, but they also can be found in brackish water habitats.

What is the state record length for a gator in Florida? Female alligators rarely exceed 10 feet in length. Males grow much larger. The Florida state record for length is a 14 feet 3 ½ inch male from Lake Washington in Brevard County.

What is the state record for weight? The Florida record for weight is a 1,043 pound (13 feet 10 1/2 inches long) male from Orange Lake in Alachua County.

Diet: Includes prey species that are abundant and easily accessible. Juvenile alligators eat primarily insects, amphibians, small fish and other invertebrates. Adult alligators eat fish, snakes, turtles, small mammals and birds.

Have many gators are in Florida? In 2017, about 1.25 million

Florida State ANIMALS & MAMMALS



MANATEE (trichechus manatus latirostris) Florida's State Marine Mammal

Manatees, known as 'sea cows', are gray in color with a rounded, flattened tail for swimming. Their eye muscles close in a circular motion, and has a lid-like membrane that closes over their eyes for protection while under water.

Manatees are agile in the water swimming upside down, rolling, doing somersaults or moving vertically in the water.



AMERICAN ALLIGATOR (alligator mississippiensis) Florida's State Reptile

Alligators have a broad, rounded snout with no lower teeth visible when their jaw is closed. Its powerful tail, helps propel it through the water.

They regulate their body temperature by basking in the sun or moving to areas with warmer or cooler air or water temperatures. Alligators prefer fresh water lakes and slow-moving rivers (including in Florida), but are also found in brackish water habitats.



GOPHER TORTOISE (gopherus polyphemus) *Florida's State Tortoise*

A moderate-sized, terrestrial turtle averaging 9-11 inches in length, the gopher has a stumpy, elephantine hind feet and flattened, shovel-like forelimbs covered in thick scales. The adult's shell, is generally tan, brown or gray.

Breeding season occurs between March and October. Tortoises exhibit no maternal care of their eggs or young. They can live 40 to 60 years in the wild; captive ones may live 90+ years.



BOTTLENOSE DOLPHIN (tursiops truncatus) *Florida's State Saltwater Mammal*

The most common dolphin species is the bottlenosed dolphin, mistakenly called porpoises. They show a high degree of intelligence with a wide range of vocalizations. Dolphins are heard clicking which is not likely communication, but rather the sonar system used for navigation, food-finding and avoidance of predators. They live both inshore and offshore. Adults are typically 6 to 12 feet long and live into their 50's.



ocated in the mouth of Tampa Bay, Egmont Key has had a long military presence, beginning with the Spanish several centuries ago. In April of 1757, Francisco Maria Celi, a pilot of the Royal Spanish Fleet, surveyed all of Tampa Bay, beginning with Isla de San Blas y Barreda (Egmont Key). In 1763, British surveyor George Gauld renamed the island Egmont Key. Both British and Spanish explorers visited Tampa Bay throughout the 18th Century, encountering the Key. Even Cuban fishermen settled in the area, catching fish in and around the bay and selling the catch in Cuba.

The United States took over Florida in the 19th Century and saw the area in a different light. Once the military obtained a foothold in Tampa Bay, Egmont Key's importance grew. A lighthouse, constructed on the island in 1848, was severely damaged by a devastating hurricane shortly afterward. Congress appropriated funds for reconstruction. Brevet Colonel Robert E. Lee visited the island in March of 1849 with a group of U.S. Army Engineers. They surveyed the island and Mullet Key, suggesting the continued use of Egmont for military purposes. Egmont Key served as a prison camp for Seminole Indians being transferred west to "Indian Territory" and before the last prisoners were sent west in 1858, nearly 300 had been detained on the island.

The U.S.S. James L. Davis was stationed on the island in January, 1864. The ship participated in Union assaults on Tampa and the surrounding countryside. Members of the Second Florida Cavalry (Union) and the Second United States Colored Infantry, along with 54 sailors, sacked the town, killing or wounding several Confederates, capturing artillery pieces, mail and money. The invasion party was not aware that the Egmont lighthouse lens was hidden in downtown Tampa.





The Egmont Key Lighthouse was not back in operation until June 2, 1866.

In 1917 while local families bought victory bonds, men joined the military to fight in Europe. Tampa's shipbuilding industry boomed. Egmont Key became a training center for National Guard Coast Artillery units.

After the first World War, the military considered Fort Dade and Fort DeSoto on Mullet Key, obsolete. On August 31, 1921, the fort was deactivated. Eventually, all of the personnel were transferred to Key West, except an 18 person caretaking unit. On May 25, 1923, the crew was removed and a sole caretaker remained to care for the lighthouse.

On July 10, 1974, Egmont Key was designated a National Wildlife Refuge, with most of the island – except the Coast Guard's holdings and the pilots association land – transferred to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. In 1978, it was listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

On September 30, 1989, the lighthouse became fully automated, and the State of Florida took over management of the Key, making it a state park.

Egmont Key National Wildlife Refuge (located in Hillsborough County) is accessible only by boat, about a 15 minute boat ride from Fort DeSoto Park (south of St. Petersburg). See map on page 30-31 for location.

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



Licenses may also be obtained by calling 1-888-347-4356. Licenses are available on-line at: myfwc.com/license. An additional fee is charged for these services.

You do NOT need a license if you are:

- Any child under 16 years of age.
- Fishing from a for-hire vessel guide, charter, party boat that has a valid vessel license.
- A nonresident fishing for recreational purposes from a pier that has a valid pier saltwater fishing license.
- Fishing from a boat that has a valid recreational vessel fishing license.
- Any resident 65 years of age or older with proof of age & residency.

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
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

THREAT TO MANTA RAYS

The largest threat to manta rays is humans. Mantas are either purposefully hunted, or they die from being accidentally hooked on fishing lines, caught in fishing nets, struck by ships while on the surface of the water or even from eating ocean plastic. Giant manta rays are often hunted for their large gill rakers, large pieces of cartilage that help them filter-feed. Manta ray gill rakers are popular in Chinese medicine. They are thought to have a variety of medicinal qualities, but there is no actual medical science backing up these claims.

The demand for ray meat and gills in some countries has risen. In these same areas, manta ray sightings have decreased up to 95 percent. Giant manta ray populations have a low chance of recovery because they reproduce slowly. Mature females produce only one baby every two years!

Manta rays are protected in Florida waters and have been recently listed as a federally protected species. Recycling and keeping plastics out of our oceans can help. New protections worldwide are being put in place, too.

Golf – Did You Know..

- The term birdie comes from an American named Ab Smith. While playing at the Atlantic City Golf Club in 1899, he played what he described as a "bird of a shot", which became "birdie" over time.
- . 125,000 Golf balls a year are hit into the water at the famous 17th hole of the Stadium Course at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra, Florida.
- In a golf tournament, a golfer has 5 minutes to find a lost ball. If not found, the Pros place a new ball at the spot where the original ball was last played.
- A regulation golf ball has 336 dimples.
- The first golf balls were made of thin leather stuffed with feathers. Tightly packed feathers made balls that flew the farthest. Feather balls were used until 1848.
- The chances of making two holes-in-one in a round of golf are one in 67 million.
- Balls travel much further on hot days. A golfer swinging a club at about 100 mph will carry the driver up to eight yards longer for each increase in air temperature of 25° F.



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- One of the largest birds in North America.
- White pelicans have stark white plumage, a wing span of 9 feet and can weigh up to 30 pounds.
- Breeds on lakes throughout North America; strictly visitors to Florida in the winter...the original 'snowbird'!
- Tends to travel in large flocks.
- Does not dive for food, but floats on the surface of water, submerges their head and scoops up fish.
- Builds nests on the ground and rim it with dirt, sticks and debris.
- They still die after becoming tangled in discarded fishing lines.
- Tarpon Key near Ft. DeSoto is one of the most important protected bird habitats in Florida.
- A sea of white can be seen as the white pelicans roost along the shoreline.
