#### **BOOM TIMES ALONG THE BEACHES**

By Wayne Ayers, Author, Tampa Bay's Gulf Beaches: The Fabulous 1950s and 1960s

The era following World War II was a time of awakening along our Gulf beach strip. During the 1950s and 1960s, the shoreline was transformed from a collection of sleepy hamlets into a booming tourist destination loaded with attractions, snazzy art-deco accommodations, and homesites created from land, dredged from the sea.

The Aquatarium, located at St. Pete Beach from 1964 to 1977, was billed as the world's largest marine attraction. The 18-acre site featured dolphin and sea lion acts held under a futuristic geo-desic dome and a main exhibit tank over 3 stories high that held 1.24 million gallons of water.

Famous celebrities of the day, such as Marilyn Monroe, Joe DeMaggio, Tyrone Power and Ronald Reagan took refuge at the Tides Hotel and Bath Club on Redington Beach.

The beaches also touted nationally famed Tiki Gardens, a South Seas paradise located in Indian Rocks Beach South Shore, across from a beach access today, on Indian Shores. The gardens'


trademark was the giant tiki's which towered over grounds that featured jungle trails, lagoons, torch lighting ceremonies and ten themed gift shops.

Florida's longest fishing pier was built in 1959, in Indian Rocks Beach. The structure attracted thousands of anglers and sightseers until it was destroyed by Hurricane Elena in 1985.

Millions of acres of land were literally created from the sea in dredging operations which took place all along the bay side of the barrier islands during the postwar years. The land became the site of new sub-divisions that accommodated scores of new residents who arrived to call our beaches home.

Tampa Bay's Gulf Beaches: The Fabulous 1950s and 1960s, by R. Wayne Ayers contains over 200 vintage photographic images picturing the sites and attractions that transformed the barrier islands into a major tourist destination.

#### NORTH CLEARWATER BEACH



Moon jellies feed in quiet bays like our own Tampa Bay. These alienlooking creatures are named for their translucent, moonlike circular bells. Instead of long, trailing tentacles, moon jellies have a short, fine fringe (cilia) that sweeps food toward the mucous layer on the edges of the bells. Prey is stored in pouches until the oral arms pick it up to digest it. The majority of moon jellies are between eight and twelve inches wide. Although they have a sting, they pose little threat to humans.

#### Oysters at Work

Oysters are a type of shellfish called **bivalves** because their shells have two halves. They live in one place their entire lives and their shells form **oyster bars or reefs.** Their strong muscles pump sea water through their gills which filter out the food they need.

At the same time, oysters are a food source for birds and the many small marine creatures that live among them. Those animals, in turn, provide food for larger fish and wildlife. So oysters are a key component in the food chain.

#### **AMAZING FACT:**

A single oyster can filter up to 50 gallons of seawater per day, removing sediment and algae.

### Rays of Tampa Bay

Giant Manta Ray Manta birostris

The World's largest species of ray. The Giant Manta Ray can weigh up to 4,000 lbs and has an average wingspan of 22 feet.

Cownose Ray Rhinoptera bonasus

Cownose rays are strong swimmers, and known for migrating in large schools of up to 10,000 rays. They migrate clockwise from Florida to Mexico.

**Atlantic Devil Ray** *Mobula hypostoma*In addition to the Tampa Bay area, the Atlantic Devil Ray can also be found in open ocean waters. Its name comes from its distinctive horns.

**Spotted Eagle Ray** *Aetobatus narinari*Due to its spots, the spotted eagle ray is the easiest to identify. They can be found I shallow inshore waters and often swim near the water's surface.



#### INFORMATION ON SALTWATER FISHING IN FLORIDA

Saltwater fishing licenses are sold at all county tax collectors' offices and many bait and tackle shops, including Clearwater Bait and Tackle in Clearwater (listed below). Licenses may also be obtained by calling 1-888-347-4356. Licenses are available on-line at: myfwc.com/license. An additional fee is charged for these services.

#### You do NOT need a license if you are:

- Any child under 16 years of age.
- Fishing from a for-hire vessel guide, charter, party boat that has a valid vessel license.
- A nonresident fishing for recreational purposes from a pier that has a valid pier saltwater fishing license.
- Fishing from a boat that has a valid recreational vessel fishing license.
- Any resident 65 years of age or older with proof of age & residency.

## Clearwater's Story

The Timucuan Indians who inhabited the Clearwater area called it "Pocotopaug", meaning "clear water". The name came from the many freshwater springs that bubbled up along the shore. The springs, now lost to the effects of tides and fill operations, were an important water source for the Indians and for the first white settlers who arrived years later.

The area which is now Clearwater was first visited by Europeans when Panfilo De Narvaez, a Spanish explorer, landed with 600 soldiers and 5 ships in 1528, fifteen years after Ponce De Leon discovered Florida.

In 1841, the U.S. Government established Fort Harrison, named after General William Henry Harrison, later the ninth President of the United States. The fort was built on the bluffs overlooking what is known as Clear Water Harbor. The fort housed wounded soldiers during their recuperation after fighting Indians on the Florida frontier. Later that year, the fort was abandoned and parts of it disassembled. The territory was then opened by the federal government for homesteading in less than six months.

Land was granted to settlers willing to bear arms for protection against hostile Indians hiding in the area. The first homesteader was James Stevens known as the "father of Clearwater." Stevens received the first land title in 1842 which included hundreds of acres...today's downtown Clearwater. The early settlement of this area grew as an agricultural and fishing community.

#### **Timeline**

- 1921 The first Capitol Theatre opened as a venue for vaudeville shows and silent films. It reopened in 2014 after an elaborate restoration.
- **1941** The war brought military service personnel to Clearwater; the major hotels were taken over by the military.
- **1947** The Philadelphia Phillies came to Clearwater to play spring training baseball.
- 1959 Clearwater's Sister City relationship with Nagano, Japan began.
- 2011 The movie Dolphin Tale was released, based on the story of Winter, a dolphin with a prosthetic tail residing at the Clearwater Marine Aquarium. In 2014, the movie Dolphin Tale 2 was released introducing a baby dolphin named Hope.

#### A Brief History of Ft. De Soto - America's #1 Beach

On May 30, 1539, a well-known Spanish explorer came to the Tampa Bay area and began a conquest which would change the world. Hernando De Soto came ashore on or near the south shores of Tampa Bay. He began his expedition of the southeastern region of what is now the United States, encountering Indians and hard times as he passed through this beautiful territory. He died on May 21, 1542, and was buried in the Mississippi River to prevent his body from being taken by the Indians.

The recorded history of the island known as Mullet Key began in February, 1849 when a group of U.S. Army Engineers, aboard the schooner Phoenix, anchored offshore to survey the coastline for possible use as a coastal defense area. The Civil War broke out in 1861, with no fortification on either Mullet or Egmont Keys. The two islands played a minor role during the Civil War. Union troops set up a blockade using the two islands. Any confederates attempting to run the blockade could be seen by troops perched atop the Egmont Key lighthouse.

The first signs of construction on the Mullet Key military post began in November, 1898. On April 4, 1900, the military reservation was named Fort De Soto after the Spanish explorer Hernando De Soto. Fort De Soto was officially named a sub-post of Fort Dade on Egmont Key at that time.

Post buildings were constructed between early 1900 and 1906. There were 29 buildings including a 100 foot long barracks, a hospital, a stable, a guardhouse, a shop for blacksmiths and carpenters,

an administration office, a mess hall and kitchen, a bake house and a storehouse. If you go there, you will see some of the concrete pillars that still exist. Take the walking tour along the cobblestone walkway and see photos of the actual buildings. Through its long history as a protector of Tampa Bay waters, never once had a shell been fired at an enemy.

During WWII, Fort De Soto was used for bombing practice. Around 1989, a county worker using a backhoe came across an undetonated bomb. A few days later, the bomb was detonated and the explosion could be heard 10 miles away.

Fort De Soto Park is located at the southern tip of Pinellas County (see map pages 26/27). It has lush vegetation, two fishing piers, beaches, a camp site and bicycle trails. It is considered one of Florida's true natural and historical treasures!








# **John's Pass**



John Levick, aka Juan Levique, & Joe Silva were Spanish fisherman & local squatters. They were fortunate enough to be en route to New Orleans when, on Sept. 25, 1848, a hurricane roared through Pinellas County. Returning a month later, the friends navigated Boca Ciega Bay through a new pass cut by the storm — now called John's Pass in honor of this discovery.

A bridge was built across the pass in 1875 & soon small shops catering to the local commercial fishermen were built nearby. The barrier islands, by the turn of the century, were nearly devoid of wildlife and ready for development. The bridge built in 1927 was replaced by a new bridge in 1971, moving the structure about a block west & re-routing the road. Wilson Hubbard helped convince the city to permit building of a public waterfront boardwalk along John's Pass in 1980. The shops adjusted with the development of John's Pass Village. In 2011, a twin span of new drawbridges was completed at a higher elevation to the delight of motorists!

# THE TAMPA TRIANGLE



That's what commercial fishermen and people who work on the waterfront call the waters of Tampa Bay and the Gulf of Mexico. Fishermen are a hardy bunch of people. They work long, hot hours in the sun and go out on the darkest, coldest nights of the year to bring you a fresh harvest of fish. #### THE DEAD ZONE

On Tampa Bay's 48 mile long shipping channel, another group

of men and women earn their living in the fellowship of the merchant marine. They fearlessly sail the world aboard tugs and ships, providing transportation for international commerce. But there is one small stretch of the 48 mile shipping channel that strikes fear into the most seasoned professional. This is an area where some of the worst maritime shipping disasters in history have occurred. Mariners call the area of water between the Sunshine Skyway Bridge and the Sea Buoy in the Gulf of Mexico, the Dead Zone.

Dependable engines that have propelled vessels across vast oceans abruptly stop. Electric motors suddenly fail, hydraulic systems go bad, radar screens cloud up with false echoes and freak, ferocious rain squalls develop. Skilled professional mariners make bad decisions. Bad things happen in the Dead Zone.

The greatest incidence of paranormal activity in the Dead Zone occurs between the Skyway Bridge and the Egmont Key Lighthouse. In one thirteen year period, 58 people have died in three major

shipwrecks. Countless innocent people have disappeared.

Compare the record of the Dead Zone with New York Harbor, one of the busiest ports in the world. Every hour of the day, New York harbor is jammed with ship traffic. You'd expect New York to have tons of shipwrecks. Not so; most of the harbor's shipping collisions are confined to bumps and dents. These are mere fender benders compared to the tragic shipwrecks of the Tampa Triangle Dead Zone.



# THE COREY STORY



Transportation projects in Pinellas County may have had no greater friend than S. Jack Corey. The young Commissioner from southwest St. Petersburg came into office in 1926 with many years of experience in the travel business – initially, as an agent for the Seaboard Air Line Railway and later, as President of the city's Motor Club. A member of the board of both the Gulf Coast Scenic Highway and Tamiami Trail Associations, his vision for the local road system always included a toll-free, modern bridge to the beach.

So, early in 1927, when there were delays in the construction of the link from St. Petersburg to Pass-a-Grille Key (the name then for the whole island of St. Pete Beach), Corey took it upon himself to make a special trip to the state capital to get the job going again. Corey also oversaw the beautification of the approaches, personally choosing Washingtonian palms, Australian pines and a variety of flowering shrubs for the rights-of-way.

Then, shortly after winning re-election to the Pinellas Commission by the largest margin in history and being unanimously selected its Chair, Corey fell seriously ill. Certainly, no one expected the vibrant 36 year old man to die, but he did – on July 16, 1929. The father of three minor-age children had just become President of St. Petersburg's leading insurance agency and was active in the Y.M.C.A., Elks Club, Masons, Egypt Temple Shrine, Boy Scouts, Yacht Club, Red Cross, Democratic Party and First Methodist Church.

His long-term legacy, however, was guaranteed when, one week after his death, the Pinellas County Commission voted to change the name of the bridge and boulevard in Corey's district from the "Boca Ciega" to the "Corey" Causeway. Corey's widow, Emma, was a special guest at the formal dedication on February 13, 1937.

In 1936, the development of Corey Avenue was a direct extension of that original bridge. It became a bustling street that housed clothing, sundries, shoes, accessories, a drug store, hardware store, a theatre, restaurants and bars, and even a Fruit Company!

Proud of their heritage, Corey's descendants continued to live in the area. They were understandably outraged in 1966 when the state replaced Jack's bridge with a larger span, called the "St. Petersburg Beach Causeway." Petitioned by the family – with support from the cities of South Pasadena and St. Pete Beach, 1996 legislators again designated it the "Corey" bridge.

The author, Roberta Whipple, was a third generation Floridian who grew up on St. Pete Beach. She was the administrator of the *St. Pete Beach Library*, the Secretary of the *Corey Area Business Association* and a longtime member of the *Friends of the Gulf Beaches Historical Museum*.





# Golf – <u>Did You Kno</u>w...

- The term birdie comes from an American named Ab Smith. While playing at the Atlantic City Golf Club in 1899, he played what he described as a "bird of a shot", which became "birdie" over time.
- 125,000 Golf balls a year are hit into the water at the famous 17th hole of the Stadium Course at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra, Florida.
- In a golf tournament, a golfer has 5 minutes to find a lost ball. If not found, the Pros place a new ball at the spot where the original ball was last played.
- . A regulation golf ball has 336 dimples.
- The first golf balls were made of thin leather stuffed with feathers. Tightly packed feathers made balls that flew the farthest. Feather balls were used until 1848.
- The chances of making two holes-in-one in a round of golf are one in 67 million.
- Balls travel much further on hot days. A golfer swinging a club at about 100 mph will carry the driver up to eight yards longer for each increase in air temperature of 25° F.


