

## Oakley Vale Community Centre

#### A SHORT HISTORY

Doors opened to the public on 8<sup>th</sup> July 2013 with an official opening by Cllr. Judy Caine the Mayor of Corby later that year on 21<sup>st</sup> September.



#### **OUR COMMUNITY CENTRE EVOLVES ...**

In 2010 a steering group of local residents started consulting with Corby Borough Council as to what our Community Centre should look like. The council presented plans from the tenders sent out and a design was chosen.

However, it was not plain sailing as the plan chosen was too expensive and on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2012 Corby Borough Council's Development Control Committee received a revised proposal for our community centre.

The original proposal included changing rooms - the revised proposal removed these at the original build stage with the idea of adding them later using 106 money. Section 106 funding is paid by developers and is used on community infrastructure projects.



Spring 2013 its really starting to take shape, inside and out ...




#### Nearly there ...
