DWCUP MEETING RECAP of May 20, 2024

May's meeting was a week early due to the Memorial Day holiday, but our agenda was as full as ever! Several members had just returned from the Democratic Women's Club of Florida state convention in Orlando with lots to report on (see article on Convention).

The featured speaker was District 60 **State Representative Lindsay Cross**, one of the few elected Democrats in Pinellas County. She reiterated the Florida Democratic motto that each Floridian deserves the right to be healthy, prosperous, and safe. With her background in Environmental Science, she has worked on Red Tide with the Tampa Bay Estuary Program, which resulted in a cleaner Tampa Bay than it has been in 50 years! She was able to get two pieces of legislation passed this year regarding Florida's environment: the EPA will compile a list of all our water treatment plants and fund those who need it most. Also, there had been no requirement for local governments to notify swimmers when it was deemed unsafe to swim in local waters. Further, she made the point that the Republican super majority legislature has done nothing to improve the insurance crisis in Florida. We have an opportunity to pick up Democratic seats in November's election, and Rep. Cross urged us all to give until it hurts—and then it will feel good!

The Club was delighted with local activist **Bryan Beckman**'s announcement of his candidacy for State House District 58. His opponent is an incumbent who serves only the Republican party, not our local citizens. Bryan has served as President of the Sierra Club and District Chair. His top issue is lowering costs to our citizens.

Nancy Armitage encouraged everyone to sign petitions for Clean Water and Medicaid Expansion. She handed out packets for members to get their friends and neighbors to sign petitions as well.

District Chair Ilene Heinke discussed the need for all of us to become PCPs (Precinct Chairpersons) and reviewed the procedure for doing so. This is the best way to grow our grass roots campaigning!

VP Nancy Vellucci discussed the need for poll watchers and poll workers in the upcoming elections. (See info in this newsletter if you are willing to serve in either of these roles.)

Monday, June 10th is our Democratic Women's Night Out at the Lucky Lobster in Dunedin from 6-8pm. No speeches, no agenda, just food, drink and conversation! Please join us and bring a friend!

When talking to people, share your stories and focus on how issues affect you or someone you know. Bread and butter, not divisive rhetoric. Less "them" messaging like

the Republicans do, it's all about "us." We hear about people skipping voting. We can express that skipping is not a protest, it is a surrender.

Avoid silos. Join and participate in other clubs and activities - Black, young, LGBTQIA - Invite them. Participate in Juneteenth. Find and use Blue businesses. Volunteer at charity events.

Poll Watcher Deadlines:

August 20, 2024 Primary Election -

- Early Voting Deadline: Prior to NOON, July 27
- Election Day Deadline: Prior to NOON, August 6

November 5, 2024 General Election -

- Early Voting Deadline: Prior to NOON, October 7
- Election Day Deadline: Prior to NOON, October 22

Procedures and Forms for Designation of Poll Watchers - Section 101.131, Florida Statutes

- The deadline to submit Early Voting poll watcher designations is PRIOR TO NOON (12:00 p.m.) at least 14 days before early voting begins.
- The deadline to submit Election Day poll watcher designations is PRIOR TO NOON (12:00 p.m.) the second Tuesday preceding the election.
- The deadline for designating early voting poll watchers is **at least 14 days prior to the start of early voting**; the deadline for designating election day poll watchers is **PRIOR TO NOON THE SECOND TUESDAY** preceding the election.
- A poll watcher must be a Pinellas County registered voter.
- No candidate, sheriff, deputy sheriff, police officer, or other law enforcement officer may be designated as a poll watcher. Candidates CANNOT serve as poll workers if they are opposed in an election.
- FORMS CANNOT BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE DEADLINE

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

The 2024 legislative session ended on March 8. See the April newsletter for a text summary of the bills passed/good, passed/bad, not passed/good, not passed/bad.

As legislative liaison, I attended zoom meetings during the session where leads for various bill categories would report on the bills that they were following. We decided whether to support or oppose the bills. Alerts were generated for some of them, encouraging people to contact the legislators. Our chair, Dr. Spano, maintained a spreadsheet to capture comments/position.

I had written software to scrape the websites and create a spreadsheet containing information on each bill. I wrote additional software to incorporate Dr. Spano's spreadsheet. Many bills are related to each other which made studying the data somewhat difficult. A House bill would have a companion bill in the Senate, for example. I updated my software to group related bills together. There are 1903 bills, 672 'groups', and 227 bills not in any group (like Jimmy Buffet Day). I made assumptions on position in Dr. Spano's data for bills in the same group, which was helpful. I don't think the spreadsheet made available to me had all of the position cells filled out, so I made a few of my own assessments (good/bad) too.
